

Really, I can't forget the residents who support us so much. Dreamland is a wonderful place to live, so we have to work hard to keep it that way. Thank



If you are not familiar with Alexander McCall Smith's series about the No. 1 Ladies' Detective Agency, it might be nice to give yourself an early Christmas gift and ready this delightful novel.

Mma Ramotswe is a traditionally built Botswana native lady and the proprietor of The No. 1 Ladies Detective Agency. Mma Ramotswe is married to Mr. J.L.B. Matekoni, the proprietor of Tlokweng Road Speedy Motors who employs two apprentice mechanics. Mma Makutsi is Mma Ramotswe's assistant in all things. Mma Makutsi is known for her record 97 percent score at the Botswana Secretarial College, her poor complexion and her large round eyeglasses.

Mma Ramotswe and Mr. J.L.B. Matekoni are the foster parents of Motholeli and her younger brother Puso. Motholeli is paralyzed from the waist down and depends on a wheel chair to get around. Mr. J.L.B Matekoni has learned of a clinic in Johannesburg and, without consulting his wife, makes arrangements to take Motholeli across the border for treatment. Neither does he tell her that he has mortgaged his business to pay for the treatments. And, he leaves the business in the care of his impetuous young apprentice, Charlie, while he is gone for a week.

Mma Ramotswe's latest case involves Mma Sebina's request to find her a family. She believes she was adopted and wants to find her "real" family. During Mma Ramotswe's quest to track down possible relatives for Mme Sebina she ends up at the Orphan Farm where Motholeli and Puso spent their early years. Matron of the orphanage, Mma Potokwane, offers her usual tea and fruitcake snack and requests Mr. J.L.B. Matekoni's assistance with a mechanical problem. After that business is taken care of, she tells Mma Ramotswe the circumstances of Mma Sebina's family, and gives her the name of a brother, Mr. Sekape. Their mother, however, died in prison which is very sad. Easy Cooking

	3 cups	Flour
	$1 \frac{1}{2}$ tsp	Salt
	$1 \frac{1}{2}$ tsp	Baking Soda
ı.	2 tsps	Baking Powder
	1 tsp	Nutmeg
	1 tsp	Allspice
	2 tsps	Cinnamon
	Measure together	and set aside.
	5 cups	Sugar
	1 cup	Butter, Margarine or Crisco
1	3 eggs	-
	Combine in a boy	vl and mix with

2 cups pumpkin

Add to sugar mixture and mix well. Add dry ingredients and beat two minutes.

Pour into coated tube pan. Bake at 375 degrees for 45 minutes. Reduce heat to 325 degrees and bake for 45 minutes longer. Let stand for 5 minutes on wire rack, then invert pan and remove cake. Cool on wire rack. Serve warm or cold. Yum! Very good.

We are finally into those cooler days that we have been waiting on. I still don't see many people out, either working in their yards or sitting on their porches relaxing, or even walking, but we'll all get there before long. Opening our doors and windows to let in that fresh air is really a delight.

I need to make a correction in something that I wrote last month ----- I said that there was a charge for having hospital beds and some baby beds delivered. We do not charge for anything, but you do have to call in and set up time for delivery.

I see that houses in here are selling, so we probably have some new people here that may not know about us and how we might serve them in the future. So, here is a list of some of the things that we have in our warehouse to loan out to people in Dreamland Villa and Velda Rose Estates: hospital beds (not electric, but nice) walkers of all kinds, some with seats and hand brakes, crutches, knee walkers, for after ankle or foot surgeries, wheel chairs of all sizes, and the glider chairs that you can use to push someone around, like going to the zoo, or the big swap meet and places that they might not be able to go to otherwise. The first of these three places is the Queen Creek Olive Mill located at 25062 S. Meridian Road. in Queen Creek. However, it is just around the corner from Combs Road. There are daily tours featuring there olive oil tasting,

On site is also an expanded gourmet marketplace where you will find a selection of olive oils, vinegars, stuffed olives and tapenades jams, jelly, mustards wines as well as a line of bath and body products. The Superstition Coffee's on-site roaster and expresso bar offers high quality coffee. Nightlife is fun, too. On Friday and Saturday evenings they have special Arizona-style artisan pizzas (4:00 - 10:00 PM) and a happy hour from 4:00 - 7.00 PM. Each weekend there is a Harvest

Festival event going on through December 16. For more info you can go to www.queencreekolivemill.com; phone is 480-888-9290.

Glynn and I went out on October 21st to the Festival and found a delightful setting of picnic grounds, a few artist vendors and entertainment on the grounds. But best of all was the store and as mentioned above, it was hard to choose just what to purchase. We will go back.

The second place nearby (just 3 miles east of the Olive Mill) is the Pork Shop, located at 3359 E. Combs Road, Queen Creek. They are closed on Monday and Tuesday but, open Wednesday - Saturday 8:00 AM - 5:00 PM and on Sunday - 9:00 ÅM to 3:00 PM. Phone number is 480-987-0101.

They have their own hickory smoked, brown sugar cured hams and bacons as well as a large selection of smoked sausages, lunchmeats, old-fashioned hot dogs, capicola, and snack sausages. The Pork Shop is famous for bratwurst, sweet and hot Italians, and Polish sausages along with a great selection of breakfast sausage links, patties, and bulk sausages. Recently they added a line of fresh gourmet sausages that include maple syrup, green chili, potato, beer brats, apple cinnamon, andouille, and jalapeno. Charles suggested that we purchase KNOX BOX for both


Farnsworth and Read complexes. Discussion followed. Item will remain on agenda.

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

Nominating Committee: David Senke, Chairman - Some candidates have been identified, still looking for more. Dec. 3rd next committee meeting.



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
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
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
