

Citizen Book Review

A Barn in New England

by Joseph Monninger

Joseph Monninger has written several award winning Young Adult novels. This biographical book, *A Barn in New England; Making a Home on Three Acres,* is his account of the renovation of an old barn into his home. When he, Wendy and Pie, her son, move in to the barn, no one has ever lived in it year round.

A Barn in New England follows the trio from their first sighting of the barn, to the difficulty in purchasing it, through the first year of making it home. Renovating any six thousand square foot building would be a challenge but this one had a few extra quirks. It was built as a barn, likely in the 1800's. It is four stories tall of mostly open space. The frame is built of large beams from local lumber with a foundation of huge rocks. The basement is partially finished, partly dirt floored.

While Wendy and Joe are prioritizing lists of things to do and the cost of their renovations, eight-year-old Pie is dealing with his own moving trauma. His bedroom is high above the main floor of the barn, overlooking the "keeping room." A move for an eight-year-old always involves a new school and new friends. Joe builds a style over the fence so Pie can get to school easily. Joe and Pie eat breakfast on the porch, work together to build a fence and a fire pit while Pie quickly becomes involved in whatever is going on in his new neighborhood. Clarence, who had helped Joe with work around his old home, is a handy man who is willing to tackle any job. Clarence jacked up the barn when he discovered rotting beams and posts in the basement while he was repairing the foundation. He leveled the porch and replaced logs that were rotted. Joe called Clarence when the first fall storm revealed many leaks in the roof. Clarence knew what type of roof would be best for them, and who they should call to do the work. Wendy had learned carpentry "at her father's knee" and her skills enabled them to insulate the inside lower walls and to cut and use re-claimed lumber to finish the walls over the insulation. Wendy also tore out the existing kitchen and remodeled it with the help of a few friends the week before Thanksgiving. While the renovation was going on, Joe, Wendy, and Pie explored their new neighborhood. We learn about the history of a local covered bridge, go shopping with them in the local markets, watch as they plant trees, fence the yard and invite a local farmer's sheep to mow their meadow. This is a warm story of three people making themselves a home at the same time they make themselves a family. I recommend A Barn in New England to anyone who has ever dreamed of "going back to the earth."

Apple Cake:

- 3 cups Granny Smith apples, diced (about 2 apples)
- 1 cup Lightly toasted chopped walnuts
- 2 teaspoons Vanilla extract
- 2 teaspoons Ground cinnamon
- 3 cups All-purpose flour 1 teaspoon Baking soda
- 1 teaspoon Salt
- 2 cups Sugar
- 1 ¹/₄ cups Vegetable oil
- 3 Eggs
- Honey Glaze:
- 1 cup Confectionery sugar
- 2 tablespoons Honey 2 tablespoons Milk

Glaze: Add all ingredients in a small bowl and stir until

smooth. Set the bowl aside.

Cake: Preheat the oven to 325 degrees F. Lightly grease a Bundt or tube pan. In a bowl mix together the apples, walnuts, vanilla, and cinnamon. In a separate bowl sift together the flour, baking soda, and salt. Using an electric mixer beat the sugar, oil, and eggs in a large bowl. Add the dry ingredients and beat until completely combined. Fold in the apple mixture. Scrape the batter into the prepared Bundt pan and bake for one (1) hour and 30 (thirty) minutes or until a tester inserted into the middle of the cake comes out clean. After the cake cools in the pan (about one (1) hour), turn out onto a plate. Drizzle the apple cake with the honey glaze, serve, and enjoy.

Note: The cake can be wrapped tightly and stored in the refrigerator for 3 - 5 days.

February 15, 2012

The meeting was called to order at approximately 9:05 AM by President Westall followed by the Pledge of Allegiance. Board members present: Red Westall, Jim Cook, Judy Ford, Agnes Forsyth, Doris Gruner, Steve Holleque, Lyle Woods. Frances Skaggs, Patricia Thorpe, Gloria Wilson-White and Gordon Watson. Judy Ford, Chairperson of the Nominating Committee, reported the results of the election of new members to the Board of Directors held on February 14, 2012. The results are as follows:

Lyle Wood - 188 Votes - Elected to a 3 year term Larry Wilkens – 184 Votes – Elected to a 3 year term Gordon Watson – 179 Votes – Elected to a 3 year term Mary Kirk - 159 Votes - Elected to a 3 year term Judy Ford – 158 Votes – Elected to a 3 year term

Wendell Black – 142 Votes – Elected to a 1 year term Larry Wilkens was then sworn in as a replacement Board member to replace John Carpenter until the end of the current

Board year. Judy Ford moved to approve the January 10, 2012, minutes as written. The motion was passed unanimously.

Frances Skaggs moved to approve the February 7, 2012, Session minutes as Study written. The motion was passed unanimously.

Patricia Thorpe gave the Treasurer's report for the month ending January 31, 2012. Ms. Thorpe stated that 2012 dues received to

a complaint filed against a non-Club member is forwarded directly to the County and is not otherwise acted upon by the Complaints Committee.

Entertainment Committee - Dorothy Randall reviewed the upcoming entertainment events for the month of March.

Website Committee – Dorothy Randall reported that the DVCC website is now one year old and that its use is on the up swing. During this past January the website was visited 949 different times which involved the viewing of 5,187 pages. That amounts to roughly 30 visits per day and the viewing of approximately 5 pages on each visit. Ms. Randall also announced that the Citizen now appears in its entirety on the website. Library Committee - Agnes Forsyth reported that the library received a substantial number of new books during the month of January and that the collection of westerns, mysteries, general fiction including large print fiction is growing. Ms Forsyth also said that the Library is in need of volunteers during the upcoming summer months.

Changing the Composition of the Board of Directors -Judy Ford moved that this issue be tabled to the March Board meeting pending further review by the By-Laws Committee. The motion passed unanimously.

Ticketed Event Report Form - Patricia Thorpe reviewed the report form that will be required to be completed by all individuals in charge of any ticketed event.

Retrofit Lighting With Rebate - Larry Wilkens summarized the status of the review of possible energy conservation rebates on lighting and HVAC equipment.

Proposed Posse Carport – Larry Wilkens moved that the proposal by the DVCC Posse to install a canopy to cover three car spaces plus a handicapped space in the parking lot east of the Library be approved with the understanding security lighting will be included and that the Posse will be responsible for all costs associated with the total project. The motion passed unanimously. Art Department Request - Lyle Wood moved to waive the fees for the use of Farnsworth Hall by the DVCC Art Department for its Annual Fine Art Show in March. The motion passed unanimously. <u>Heating of the Lap Pool</u> – The issue of the heating of the lap pool resulted in considerable discussion regarding the water temperature of all pools. Frances Skaggs moved that the action by the President to turn off the heat in the Read Hall Complex lap pool be ratified by the Board. The motion was passed unanimously. It was then decided to refer the total issue of the pool water temperatures to the March Study Session. Non-Member Use of DVCC Facilities - Lyle Wood opened a discussion regarding the use of non-public DVCC facilities by non-members. The issue was deferred to the March Study Session.

Please Don't Feed the Critters

Over the past three months, the DVCC office has received several complaints of residents feeding feral cats, pigeons and other wild birds, and leaving food out that could attract other wild animals, such as skunks, rats, fox or coyote. These complaints are turned over to the Maricopa County Code Enforcement Office or to the County Health Department. One of our DVCC residents has trapped six skunks in his back yard near 61st Street and Dodge since Thanksgiving 2011.

Contrary to the notion that feeding homeless animals and wild animals is an act of kindness, the opposite is actually the case. Feeding birds, for example, causing them to drop their natural tendency to be alert, makes them easier prey for cats, dogs, and other natural predators. Have you noticed how our quail population has diminished in recent years? Feeding feral cats will increase their ability to give birth to even more unwanted kittens (one female cat may have 3 or 4 litters over the course of one year) which are then destined to suffer from disease and die premature deaths. In 2009 Maricopa County had an estimated feral cat population of more than 20,000. Many United States municipalities have passed laws banning the feeding of feral cats. Wild animals such as skunks, rats, fox and coyote hang out in neighborhoods where food is plentiful, either naturally (those birds and feral cats being fed by humans) or where humans leave out food.

These feral or wild animals are also a danger to the humans in the neighborhood. Rabies from animal bites is a real threat to humans and their pets, and infectious diseases from the droppings or feces of birds, bats, cats and other mammals are a serious health concern. Along with disease and physical damage to property, these animals also bring disturbance and nuisance to the neighborhood with their noise, commotion and smell (skunk or cat urine). Birds, feral cats, and wild animals are a health and safety issue for you, your pets, and your fellow residents.

The financial cost of ridding your property or neighborhood of these unwanted "guests" can also be prohibitive. It is important to remember that most county animal services in Maricopa County and elsewhere no longer provide assistance in cases involving feral cats, wild animals, and wildlife management. If you have a wildlife problem or need to get rid of feral cats or wildlife, need an exterminator or exterminating company, pest control or critter trapping or traps or wild animal prevention in Maricopa County, you will need to call a privately owned wildlife removal company and pay a fee for these services.

Please do your part to be a good neighbor – Please don't feed the critters.

TIP: The best way to get rid of hot spots is apply three coats of underglaze (Cover Coats).

Large areas to paint need large brushes. Using a small brush leaves streaks.

Don't thin your glazes with dirty water. If the water has greenware clay in it, it can cause your glazes to pop or peel or crawl. Wipe down bisque with a damp sponge before applying glazes. A little bit of dust can also cause glazes to pop!
