Citizen Book Review

The Postmistress by Sarah Blake

In 1940 World War II has begun. Franklin, Massachusetts, a small village on the outer coast of Cape Cod, has a new Postmaster. Iris James is 40 something, single and is driven to do the best job she can do and to find a husband. Franklin's Dr. Will Fitch has brought home a new wife, Emma. Iris is a bold, strong lady and Emma a shy, unsure young bride. In London Frankie Bard is working with Ed Murrow, Erik Sevareid, and others to bring the story of the war home to America. No one in America wants to be involved or to admit that the war could have any impact on their lives.

No one, that is, except Harry Vale, Franklin's town mechanic and self appointed Civil Defense officer. Harry turns much of his business over to a helper and spends his days looking at the sea with binoculars, searching for German submarines. Harry is concerned that Iris's Post Office flag pole may act as a beacon to the Germans. He convinces her to write a letter to her superiors about lowering the flag pole to be below the roof line. They become friends and later become engaged.

Dr. Will and Emma listen, as most of the townspeople do to the nightly news broadcasts from Europe. They are particularly moved by Frankie Bard's stories of people on the street during the Blitz in London. When Dr. Will loses a patient, he feels that his family's bad luck is following him and doubts his wisdom of coming back to Franklin to face his demons. He writes to a hospital in London and is gladly welcomed to come and help in the effort to treat victims of the Blitz.

Frankie and Dr. Will meet in an underground shelter during the worst of the Blitz, and he is struck by a cab the next morning as they part. Dr. Will dies in Frankie's lap and as she leaves the scene is given a letter that was in his pocket addressed to Emma. Dr. Will had been trying to make sense of his life. Now Frankie tries to make sense of the war and spends weeks riding trains in Europe, recording and taking down stories of the Jews from all countries fleeing for their lives

Months later, disillusioned and exhausted, Frankie quits her job and returns home. After staying with her mother for a month, she goes to Franklin to deliver Dr. Will's last letter to Emma. She realizes after she gets there that several months after his death, Emma has not been notified.

In the end, Iris's efforts to protect Emma from bad new brings the three women together. Emma has lost her husband with a baby due, Frankie has given up her career in broadcast journalism, and the postmistress, Iris realizes she alone cannot protect the village from the war. The war goes on even as ordinary lives continue.


Arizona Day Trip Japanese Friendship Garden – Phoenix

I've always loved Japanese Gardens and often wondered and even thought it was possible to make one in my back yard using Arizona's native plants. Well, looks like I was on the right track. When I learned there was a Japanese Garden in Phoenix we just had to go. The Photo Club also thought it was a good location for photos, and we were not disappointed.



In the heart of Phoenix is a most beautiful Japanese garden called Ro Ho En which (in Japanese) means Ro – Heron; Ho – is the Japanese word for Phoenix bird and \mathbf{En} – Garden. As you enter the self-guided tour you find many traditional Japanese structures and objects mixed with native Arizona materials and plants. The ten foot tall, Kasuga doro, a stone lantern in the style



used in gardens, greets you as you begin your walk. Scenery along the path depicts low grasslands. Ponds with koi fish and Mallard ducks swim lazily in the water, waiting for you to feed them.

The Viewing Pavilion sets the site for oak and pine environment and a view across the pond to the waterfall. The waterfall is the highlight of the garden and evokes the feeling of a waterfall that would naturally occur in the mountains. The boulders were hand placed and came from Congress, Arizona. A perfect photo shot.

Along the path is a fork leading to the ro ji or traditional Tea House called Musoan. Only guests signed up for the traditional tea ceremony can enter. (Reservations are required and it cost about \$40). Nearby are more, but smaller waterfalls depicting mountain streams and falls. One of the traditions of Japanese garden design is to recycle materials to prevent waste. The slats

on the stream bridge were designed to resemble the foundation of a structure to symbolize the use of leftover material.

On the trail you will see the **shachi**. This is a mythical fish with the face of a tiger. Images of these ferocious fish are traditionally placed on the roof of important buildings as a charm against fire. Stone towers or Tasoutou is representational of storage places for Buddhist relics and seen on the way. Further along the path you will see the Yukimi doro, a short lantern with a large top placed at the water's edge so its flame will seem to float above the surface of the water.

As you move along the curved bridge (taiko bashi) more traditional Japanese items are seen. And it's the best place to feed the koi fish. Their bright yellow, orange and black markings certainly spark up the water. The zig zag or Yatsuhashi (bridge) is offset to ward off evil spirits which



travel in a straight line, or so goes the superstition's belief...a beautiful area and one of my favorites of the whole garden.

Next to the garden is a high rise condominium, and I would say the people living on the side of the garden have the best view in town. To get there take the Hwy.202 west merging onto the I-10 highway. Exit on 7th Street and turn right to McDowell. Make a left onto McDowell. At 5th Avenue make a left and travel down to Portland Street, make a left again and another left on 3rd Avenue. The Japanese garden is about a block on the right. Due to the one way streets and the light rail train, you have to do a bit of jogging around to get there. Price for seniors is only \$4. The garden is a trip I plan to take again. Arigato! (Goodbye) - see you somewhere in Arizona next time.



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

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
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
