

In the Company of Others by Jan Karon Father Timothy Kavanagh has retired. Several years previously he visited his ancestral home of Ireland with his cousin Walter and Walter's wife, Katherine, whose nickname is Sterling Moss due to her driving habits. Now Father Tim is bringing his own wife, Cynthia, with him to celebrate her birthday. Walter and Katherine are to meet them at Broughadoon, the fishing lodge he had visited with Walter ten years earlier.

The misadventures begin before this fun couple even reaches Broughadoon. Walter and Katherine are delayed by four days. Father Tim has a diabetes flare up before they leave home and has to pass up many of the proffered treats at the lodge. They have hauled along a carton of books they thought they couldn't get along without, and it has been raining for three weeks. When they arrive at Broughadoon in a battered old Volvo, the electricity is out because of the storm. Their candle lit dinner was lamb roasted in an oil fired cook stove. A bucket of hot water was provided for bathing before bed, and the rain continued.

The stay at Broughadoon was lengthened when Walter and his wife were delayed even more than anticipated, and Cynthia re-injured her ankle and was confined to the lodge while it healed. While they both regretted that they were unable to do the sight seeing they had planned, they kept busy. Cynthia discovered an historic diary written in the 19th century by the ancestor of a nearby neighbor. She and Father Tim get caught up in it and are able to relate it to the people they were getting to know. Father Tim's Episcopal collar was not completely accepted by the residents of this Irish Catholic community, but when things turn bad, they call upon him for counseling and prayer. This suited his workaholic tendencies just fine. There are fishing parties coming and going, a stolen painting to find, and an aging alcoholic neighbor to provide comfort to.

There were mysteries to be solved, long festering personal wrongs to be righted, and souls and bodies to be healed. Cynthia, a children's book author and illustrator, discovers in her enforced inactivity that she has a previously undiscovered gift for portrait painting. Throughout all these happenings, the ancient diary provides them clues to today's goings on as well as many hours of entertainment to help Cynthia pass the time away.

Before they leave, Cynthia's ankle heals enough to allow Timothy the opportunity to take his beautiful wife sight seeing and picnicking.

Easy Cooking

Creamy Potato Soup

Slices bacon

Potatoes, peeled and cubed (6 cups) Ribs chopped celery

1 Medium chopped onion

2 Large chopped carrots

1 Cup water

1 Tsp sugar

¹/₄ Tsp pepper

4 Cups milk

1 Cup whipping cream or half and half

In a large pot saute bacon until crisp. Remove bacon, crumble, and set aside. Add potatoes, celery, onions, carrots, water, salt, sugar, and pepper and some of the bacon drippings. Cook covered until veggies are tender, 10-15 minutes. Combine flour with milk and stir until combined. Add to potato mixture along with remaining milk. Cook over medium heat, stirring occasionally until thick, 10-15 minutes. Stir in cream and crumbled bacon. Heat thoroughly. May pour part of mixture into blender and puree and then retun to pot before adding bacon. Enjoy on these cold winter days.

Be responsible, VOTE!!

February 14th is Sweetheart Day, also known as Valentine's Day! Don't forget the favorite person in your life by giving him/her a valentine. As happened with so many "special" days of the year, it has become so commercialized, but it doesn't have to be. Remember when we were kids and we made our own valentines? Just red construction paper and a paper doily with some words from your heart are all it takes. This valentine would be treasured as no store-bought valentine could be. Or you could do as my husband and I do...we go to the card section of the store, each pick a card of our choice, hand it to your spouse to read, then put it back. Cheap but effective.

February is the month of presidents and bank holidays. For the traditionalists, there is February 12th, Lincoln's birthday. When I was a kid in Illinois, this was always a school holiday because he was from Illinois. Then February 22nd, which is George Washington's birthday, is celebrated on Presidents Day, the 3rd Monday of the month which includes all presidents. For Christians, Ash Wednesday is February 13th, the beginning of the Lenten Season.

I called my friend Andy Sable, a gastroenterologist, to make an appointment for a colonoscopy. A few days later, in his office, Andy showed me a color diagram of the colon, a lengthy organ that appears to go all over the place, at one point passing briefly through Minneapolis.

Then Andy explained the colonoscopy procedure to me in a thorough, reassuring and patient manner. I left Andy's office with some written instructions, and a prescription for a product called "MoviPrep" which comes in a box large enough to hold a microwave oven. I spent the next several days productively sitting around being nervous.

Then on the day before my colonoscopy, I began my preparation. In accordance with my instructions I didn't eat any solid food that day; all I had was chicken broth, which is basically water, only with less flavor. Then in the evening, I took the MoviPrep. Then they led me to a room full of other colonoscopy people, where I went inside a little curtained space and took off my clothes and put on one of those hospital garments designed by sadist perverts, the kind that when you put it on makes you feel even more naked than when you are actually naked.

Then a nurse named Eddie put a little needle in a vein in my left hand. Ordinarily I would have fainted, but Eddie was very good, and I was already lying down.

Eddie also told me that some people put vodka in their MoviPrep. At first I was ticked off that I hadn't thought of this, but then I pondered what would happen if you got yourself too tipsy to make it to the bathroom, so you were staggering around in full Fire Hose Mode. You would have o choice but to burn your house down.

New Business:

Possible new street signs for Dreamland. Lee Trevigne volunteered to check on city and county regulations regarding signs. Info is available on the Internet. This year's budget has no provision for new signs. He will make calls regarding the weed problem in DV.

Harry Cole has agreed to help Red Westall with the entertainment planning for Farnsworth Hall.

Discussion about charging/not charging/ asking for donations for events at Farnsworth Hall. Perhaps fewer activities would be better attended, and better advertising is needed. Up to date information is printed in the new Citizen and on the DVCC web site.

Thanks given to Patty Thorpe for the successful December Potluck and New

President reported that the two scout troops he asked declined to help with the nature trail clean-up. John Matthews will ask another troop.

Larry Wilkens chose Wednesday, January 16th at 9:00 AM for the first nature area clean-up day. He has some volunteers to assist. They will meet at Farnsworth Hall. Subsequent clean-up date/s will be chosen to complete the job and will be advertised.

"A letter from a concerned citizen" was read and all agreed it should be printed in the Citizen.

Dorothy Randall reported that members submitting articles to the Citizen need to submit them also to the Website. This will help keep the web-site up to date.







Bashas Art Gallery

I never really thought that I cared all that much about Western Art or Native American Art until I went to this absolutely wonderful Art Gallery. The Bashes Art Gallery has perhaps the largest collection of Western Art and Native American Art I've ever seen. Wow, have I changed my mind about that!

Walking into the lobby area my mind was blown away with the most impressive contemporary art of this type I've seen. Right away the bold colors and outstanding craftsmanship of sculptures will take your breath away.

As I walked through the gallery, I was transported in time in a sense that the artwork depicted so much of how the West was in the early pioneer days. I felt as if I could really get a sense of how cowboys and Indians or Native Americans really lived in those times. Nearly all the paintings showed life on the plains and prairies, the cattle drives, the campsites, villages, the horses, the buffalo hunts and so much more of the kind of lives they lived in old times. Fantastic portraits of the Native Americans; sculpture with minute details, all

A good many of the art pieces are painted by artists of a most talented group called the Cowboy Artists of American History. Included under a few of the paintings was the story behind the painting telling us the history and way of life as it was then. Transported in time, I was (as Yoda might have said).

The gallery includes many beautiful pieces of pottery of

both traditional and contemporary designs. One room has handmade baskets with so many different designs on each one. I'd bet there isn't one like another in the whole display.



Beautiful! The sculpture was amazing in its detail and depiction of the Old West. On display as well were some beautiful Native American made jewelry of turquoise, shells, coral and more. Many Native American tribes' artwork are

represented here including Hope Katsinas (or as I always called them kachinas).

The Gallery is only open Monday through Friday from 9:00 AM to 4:00 PM. Going there on side streets we encountered a lot of road work and closed streets. So I'd recommend heading out on Highway 60 to Country Club Drive. Go south on Country Club (although the street name changes into Arizona Avenue below Guadalupe) to Ocotillo Road. Turn right on Ocotillo to Bashas Road. and turn left on Bashas Road. A short distance on the right side you will see the Bashas Corporate Offices and the Gallery is located in their building. Parking is a bit limited but you can find one. They recommend calling before coming in case they close that day.... 480-895-5230. In addition, there is no admission charge to the museum.

On the way back we passed through downtown Chandler on Arizona Avenue and stopped by the San Marcos Hotel and had lunch. Downtown Chandler is a fun place. There were lots of small boutique places, restaurants, two winery bar/restaurants, a quilt store, a bakery, barber shop, Mexican restaurant and more. We ate at an Irish Pub restaurant and had a very delicious lunch.

Once a month they have an Art Walk on the third Friday of the month. February's theme is about science and technology. January' theme featured Music as Art. I think it's a place we will go back to for some fun.



Tip of the month: The best way to get rid of hot spots is to apply three coats of underglaze (Cover Coats).

Large areas to paint need large brushes. Using a small brush leaves streaks.

When doing eyes on an animal that you are going to glaze, do the eyes with ez strokes on the greenware. It is not advisable to use glazes to do the eyes as they often run. Concepts or Stroke and coats will work as they do not run.


