This project was evaluated as a significant community recreational area which runs through a number of Dreamland Villa home sites and is used by outdoor enthusiasts throughout the year.

The project had to meet the guidelines of the Boy Scouts of America so a special write-up had to be submitted by Ethan for approval prior to the project starting. Once approved, Ethan had to enlist other boys in the troop as well as parents and leaders to assist. Next funds had to be raised and materials purchased. "Over \$600 had to be raised. It took a lot of organization and planning," said Ethan. "We were excited to take on this project because I realized that it would give me leadership experience as well as organizational skills and be a service to the community," said Ethan. The benches along the trail were in

serious need of repair requiring the



removal of old wooden slats and hand rails. A total of 117 hours was invested in this project during the height of the hot summer sun. As the weeks moved on redwood panels were installed, sanded and sealed. In addition, a number of signs identifying flowers and plants in the area were designed, created and placed along the trail.

"This was a very helpful project," said President Mathews. "It has enhanced and beautified the Nature Trail that so many people and visitors will enjoy for years to come. We salute Ethan and Troop 755 for this contribution to the community."

Forty Years of Help Services Part 3 – Who, What and Why We Are

This is the third of three special articles designed to acquaint the residents of Dreamland Villa and Velda Rose Estates with the history of Help Services and to provide you with insight as to what the organization does and how they do it. Last month I wrote about Help Services' history. This month let me tell you about our organization, how we function, how we are financed, and what you, as residents and members, can do to help us.

Help Services, a non-profit Arizona corporation founded in 1973, serves the residents of Dreamland Villa and Velda Rose Estates by providing them with the opportunity to use medical and sick room equipment and physical and health aid items on a loan free basis. The medical and sick room equipment available for loan is sufficient to nearly set up a hospital room in a residence. Most medical and

1 can sliced	potatoes
¹ /4 cup	butter or margarine
1/3 cup	flour
¹ / ₂ teaspoon	salt
¹ / ₂ teaspoon	ground poultry seasoning
3 cups	milk
1	9" two-crust pastry
Melt butter in s	aucepan. Blend in flour, salt, and seasonings.

Add milk gradually. Stir and cook until mixture thickens. Add a little more milk if too thick. Add turkey and vegetables. Pour into pastry shell. Cover with top crust. Seal and flute edges. Slit top in several places. Bake at 425 degrees for 35 – 40 minutes (until golden brown). You might want to put foil around edges so it doesn't burn.

Desert Rivers Audubon Recognizes Dreamland

Dreamland Villa Nature Walk is being recognized by Desert River Audubon, a local chapter of the National Audubon society, with Dreamland being presented with a sign of that recognition on Saturday, November 9, 2013, at 9:00 AM on the west side of 56th Street between Colby and Decatur on the Nature Trail. The Desert River Audubon will conduct a tour from that starting point. You are more than welcome to join the ceremony and tour.

Desert Rivers Audubon is a local chapter of the National Audubon Society and is, therefore, first and foremost a group of people who love birds. Studying birds, however, should lead to a more acute realization of birds as just one aspect of the natural world and foster an appreciation of the whole system, the habitat in which those birds, and we humans, survive.

The Desert Rivers Habitat Recognition Program grew out of our wish to acknowledge those people who were willing to help our native wildlife prosper by making a commitment to turn some part of our landscape into a natural habitat. The criteria are simple, do you plant native plants? Do you provide water and shelter for insects, birds and animals? Do you keep your watering requirements to a minimum? Simple to say, but not always simple to implement. Our website, <u>www.desertriversaudubon.org</u> has an "Audubon at Home" page where you can read more about the requirements that lead to a habitat being recognized as wildlife friendly. There you can also find sources of help if you want to turn your own backyard space into a wildlife friendly area.

Balancing the needs of the wildlife and the aesthetic feelings of gardeners can be challenging so we are therefore tremendously pleased to make this award to the Dreamland Nature Trail and to include the Trail in our November 9th Tour de Bird. This is an event designed to educate people on making their landscapes wildlife friendly by sending them on a self guided tour of several backyards and public habitats to show them different styles and approaches.

We look forward to the day and hope your Trail will prove an inspiration so that others will learn how to share our desert home with our native flora and fauna.

The Tour de Bird Event is on November 9th - tickets are \$10 obtainable from any Desert Rivers Event or from our website.

Desert Rivers also offers free monthly birdwalks at the Gilbert Riparian Preserve on the 3rd Saturdays starting in October and the Veterans Oasis Park on the 1st Saturdays starting in November. We also have free monthly nature programs on a variety of topics at the Southeast Regional Library on the 2nd Tuesdays at 7pm from September through April. We have free monthly owl walks at Zanjero Park in Gilbert on the 4th Saturdays all year long. The walks start 1 hour before sunset. sick room equipment is loaned for as long as it may be needed. Some restrictions, however, may apply. There are also items that may be needed when house guests or the grandchildren visit. These items include roll-a-way beds; play pens, baby beds, high chairs, and strollers. These non-medical items generally have a maximum loan period

for of 30 days.

Help Services is an organization of and for the community and operates under the direction of a Board of Directors elected from and by the residents of Dreamland Villa and Velda Rose Estates. All residents of the two communities are automatically members of the

corporation. Directors are elected for three-year terms and may, if they so choose, run for successive terms. The committee structure is employed to facilitate the many activities that keep the organization functioning. A team of volunteers mans the office each day Help Services is open. All serve without pay. We do, however, pay someone for delivery and pick up services of certain equipment items as well as for cleaning and sanitizing those returned.

Help Services is financed solely by donations and cannot continue to exist without support from the communities it serves. Help Services is neither a welfare organization nor a private club. It is not affiliated with nor does it receive any money or subsidy from federal, state or local governmental agencies. Help Services is a local community organization, with 100 percent of all donations received used to fund operations. Help Services is a 501 (c) (3) public charity, and all donations are tax deductible.
