Forty Years of Help Services Part 2 – It's History

The idea of a service organization designed to assist persons in need of expensive health care equipment was conceived by early Dreamland Villa resident, Fred Larsen, resulting from two unrelated incidents that had come to his attention. The first incident occurred in January 1973 when a friend of Fred's was provided a walker by the Church of the Master. No longer needed six weeks later, his friend returned the walker along with a check for ten dollars, a donation neither expected nor requested. The second incident occurred a month later when one of Fred's friends in Sun City was diagnosed with a terminal illness and was provided, on a loan free basis, many sick room items necessary for his care and comfort during his remaining days. The idea of retirees having access to needed sickroom and other health care equipment at no cost intrigued Fred, and he soon discovered that the items his friend was provided came from an organization founded by The Reverend E. Duane Thistlethwaite called Sunshine Services.

Fred met with The Reverend Thistlethwaite and explored the idea of establishing a similar organization in the Dreamland Villa area. As a result of these discussions, Fred returned to Dreamland Villa and formed a temporary committee to pursue the idea. For the next few months the committee discussed the idea with many of the residents here and made several trips to Sunshine Services. Finally, the committee recommended forming a similar organization that would not only serve the



residents of Dreamland Villa but also the residents of Velda Rose Estates. The committee initially received a donation of \$1,000 together with free legal assistance. The initial donation was used to acquire some used hospital beds, wheelchairs, walkers, etc. <u>continued on page 4</u>

This simply means that the State of Arizona recognizes our area as a "plus 55 adult living community" and as such, qualifies for most residential streets which are posted with 25 mile speed limits which increases safety and quiet. This also means that homes may not be occupied by families with any children under the age of eighteen, which also helps to insure our quiet peaceful neighborhoods.

Owning a home in Dreamland Villa gives you the option to enjoy special "Club Membership" amenities such as three beautiful swimming pools. The facility located at Farnsworth Hall, has a nearly Olympic-in-size swimming pool, a hot tub, changing restroom and shower facilities plus a large deck with lounge chairs for tanning or just relaxing in the beautiful Arizona sunshine. Two additional pools are located in the vicinity of Read Hall, which is our main club meeting room. One of these two pools is a large lap pool, and the second is a pool which is heated year-round for cozy enjoyment as the warm water soothes sore muscles and joints. This pool area also features a large hot tub and

dressing rooms for changing, and showering. But the pools are just the beginning of what's available to you at our Dreamland Villa Community Club. You have unlimited access to a fully equipped woodworking shop, a roomy billiard and ping pong room, a fantastic lapidary shop where common rocks are shaped, cut and polished

into beautiful clocks, pendants, and many other beautiful keepsakes. Our fully stocked ceramic craft area includes an instructor and a kiln for firing and finishing your creations.

You also have access to quilting, art, photography, and computer clubs where you can either learn a new talent or sharpen the skills you now have. Our shuffleboard courts recently were the location for a tournament where our club members won the trophy for top honors. They welcome newcomers and encourage you to enjoy having fun in the sun.

In addition, Dreamland Villa sponsors pancake breakfasts, potluck dinners, dancing to live bands and other special entertainment, plus single groups where new friendships can be developed.

The Maricopa County Sheriff has a satellite office right here in Dreamland Villa, and they patrol our neighborhoods and offer a special service to Dreamland Villa Club Members when they leave on vacations or return to other homes across the country. If you register at our club office prior to leaving for 30 days or more, the posse will check on the security of your Dreamland Villa home free of charge. (The posse is funded by voluntary donations.)

All this and so much more is now an option for you if you would like to become a card carrying member of the Dreamland Villa Community Club. Other resorts in the surrounding areas charge as much as four to six hundred dollars per person per month for similar amenities. For owners joining Dreamland Villa Club, Inc., there is just a one-time admission/transfer fee. In addition, there is an annual fee for each resident which is used to maintain the facilities.

Deadly Stakes by J.A. Jance

Think back for a moment to the mysteries you read forty or fifty years ago. The detective in his black trench coat is trying to light a cigarette with a damp book of matches while rain drips off his felt hat. Cradled between his ear and shoulder is the receiver of the payphone into which he is stuffing nickles, trying to put a call in to his "Chief." What a contrast this is to modern day police work.

In Deadly Stakes we join Ali Reynolds, former reporter, now a police-academy trained private citizen as she and her "crew" use the latest in computer technology to track down a murderer. Her beau, B. Simpson, is proprietor of an international data security firm, and with the help of his second in command, Stuart Ramey, use the latest gadgets, sometimes skirting the law to aid Ali in her quest to bring the killers to justice.

Unfortunately, Ali breaks a cardinal rule. Never go to interview a murder suspect alone. Ali is drugged, put into a trunk and hauled off to what is to be her final resting place. Not getting a response to his warning message about the suspect's husband, Stuart, B. Simpson and Ali's man of all work and retired British Marine, Leland Brooks, start looking for Ali. Using the latest technology Stuart accesses video cameras to find out in what car she might have been abducted. Then Stuart is able to use the GPS system in Ali's iPad which is still in her purse in the vehicle with her.

Fortunately, with all of these resources, the men who are



on Ali's side also have the resources to rent a helicopter and follow the kidnappers. When it comes down to it though, it is Leland Brooks using techniques he learned in WWII to bring down the murderer before he kills Ali.

I found Deadly Stakes to be one of the most engrossing stories J.A. Jance has written. Hope you enjoy it as much as I did

Easy Cooking

Pineapple Cheese Casserole

- 20 oz cans of chunk pineapple, slightly drained OR 1 fresh pineapple, cut into 2 chunks and 1 20 oz. can of chunk pineapple
 - Tablespoons of cornstarch
- 5 Cup of sugar OR 1/2 cup of sugar and 1/2 cup Splenda
- Cups shredded mild cheese OR 1 cup of shredded mild cheese and 1 cup of 2
- shredded sharp cheese 1 1/2 Stacks of Ritz crackers (crushed in the bag)
- 1/2 Stick of melted butter

In a large bowl, mix together pineapple, cornstarch, sugar and cheese. Spray a 9x13 pan or dish with butter flavored no-stick cooking spray and pour the mixture into the pan. Mix the crushed crackers with the melted butter and spread it evenly over the pineapple mixture. Bake at 350 degrees for ¹/₂ hour until the topping is slightly browned and the edges are bubbly. Enjoy! This is wonderful as a side dish with a ham dinner.




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Help Services conitnued from the cover



Their first piece of equipment was loaned out in September 1973. As more equipment was acquired, the need for a location to store and dispense the ever-increasing number of items became a priority. The Dreamland Villa Community Club came to the rescue providing the new organization use of a small room in the Read Hall Complex. Velda Rose Estates provided space for meetings of the Board and general membership.

In September 1973 the new organization, now formally known as Help Services, was incorporated as a non-profit corporation dedicated to serve the residents of Dreamland Villa and Velda Rose Estates, loaning sickroom and other types of health care equipment at no charge for as long as needed. The Articles of Incorporation and By-Laws were finalized and the initial Board of Directors took their seats. Help Services, Inc., was in business. It wasn't long before the organization was recognized as a charitable institution and was designated a 501 (c) (3) public charity by the Internal Revenue Service.

During the ensuing years Dreamland Villa grew; Velda Rose Estates grew; and Help Services also grew. Soon it was apparent that more space was needed to house the everexpanding equipment inventory. The original Farnsworth Office for Dreamland Villa, near the corner of Sales University Drive and Higley Road, became available, but money had to be raised to purchase the property. Donations were sought from residents of the two communities and neighboring businesses. A benefit show was held at Farnsworth Hall and "Luncheon Is Served", a special event, was arranged. Members sold refreshments at Craft and

Hobby Shows. In June 1975 sufficient money was finally raised to purchase the building at 5210 E. University Drive, our present location. With more storage space now available, more and different types of equipment were added to the loan inventory.

Dreamland Villa continued to grow; Velda Rose Estates continued to grow. Help Services kept pace. It wasn't long before space again became an issue. Much of the loan equipment inventory now had to be stored off site in space provided by the two community clubs and in storage utility trailers. Things became hectic when someone wanted to borrow a piece of equipment that was stored off site. It was determined that expansion of the present building was not feasible and that the only realistic option was to build a new building. Bill Hauser, President at the time, took the lead and a building fund drive was initiated in early 1984. The tremendous response made it possible to contract the Farnsworth Construction Co. to build, at cost, the facility now occupied. The Dreamland Villa Community Club again came to the rescue and provided temporary space in Farnsworth Hall during the construction. On November 30, 1984, the new building was dedicated and continues to be used today.

Help Services soon became the envy of the East Valley. In February 1989 at the Mesa Community College's 19th Annual Opportunity Fair, Help Services was presented with a plaque recognizing the organization's "Outstanding Volunteer Service - Senior Group -1989".

Since Help Services loaned it's first piece of equipment in 1973, use of its services by residents of Dreamland Villa and

Velda Rose Estates has steadily increased. In May 1976 it was estimated that more than 150 pieces of equipment were out on loan saving our members an estimated \$2,168 a month on outside rentals or purchases. Three years later, the estimated savings had grown to over \$3,300 per month. Today Help Services has inventoried some 92 categories of loan equipment, which accounts for over 1,400 individual pieces of equipment. On an average, nearly 800 of these items are out on loan at any given time, some for a number of years. Annually, just over 700 residents check out and return over 1,500 pieces of equipment. That amounts to a savings in health care cost of over \$75,000 per year. The estimated savings since Help Services loaned it's first item is one and a quarter million dollars. When Help Services first started, the loan equipment inventory consisted mostly of items attained from hospital surplus inventories. Today all equipment available for loan, unless an item is donated, is purchased new. Help Services has come a long way. Much of the recent growth resulted from the leadership of Joy Mortensen, who led the organization into the twenty-first century. Joy served as President from 1996 until 2012.

From one person's vision to the organization it is today, Help Services has grown and developed into a vital and crucial community service. Thanks to the foresight of people like Fred Larsen, Bill Hauser, Joy Mortensen and the other dedicated volunteers, Dreamland Villa and Velda Rose Estates has a benefit that other senior communities can only envy. Next month the final article will summarize the who, what and why of the Help Services organization.

The invitations to Dreamland Villa and Velda Rose residents to attend our 40th Anniversary Open House Celebration will soon be in the mail. The event will be held in Dreamland Villa Community Club's Farnsworth Hall from 9:00 AM to 2:00 PM on Saturday, November 9th. In addition to displays of the types of items we have to loan, there will be complimentary food, drinks, handouts and door prizes. Mark this date on your calendar now. And if you are a resident of one of these two communities and don't receive your invitation soon, please contact the Help Services' office at (480) 985-6021.



Greetings from lapidary! For those who don't know, lapidary is the art of taking rocks and gemstones and making jewelry from them. Here in Dreamland Villa, our Lapidary Shop does that, as well as making clocks that have a mosaic style of rock slabs for a face. We like to say that we knock the ugly off of rocks and reveal the hidden beauty inside. We are a fully equipped Lapidary Shop with two 24" slab saws, one 16" slab saw, two 10" trim saws, and four bench grinders for the grinding and shaping of slabs. We have two Cabochon grinding machines that can make beautiful pendents. We have a large tumbler and a flat lap machine. We also have two faceting machines that can make gemstones. Faceting is a very labor intensive and nerve wrecking endeavor and is not for the impatient. However, if you have the patience and the desire, it can be done. We have one person who does faceting right now. There was a gentleman who came in that used to do faceting who would like to come in and teach the art. He didn't leave a contact number; however, if that was you please come back in so we can talk and hopefully set up some classes. Our shop sells clocks and costume jewelry. We have many state clocks on the wall of the shop, and can make any state you may have in mind. If you have a vision for a clock, come talk to us. We love to do custom orders. If you can dream it up and it can be drawn on paper and cut out of 1/8" thick hardboard, we can make it! Or you can as well. The cost to make a clock yourself is \$15 which covers the material. There are plenty of members willing to teach you how. It is very costly to maintain the equipment in the shop, and 100% of the funds received from our sales, goes right back into the shop. We receive no funds from the Community Club. We also obtain funds by recycling aluminum cans. 
