



A Virgin River Christmas

A Virgin River Christmas is the fourth in the Virgin River Series which now includes twenty titles. Virgin River's tight knit community of Marine Veterans, their wives and others of the community are getting ready for Christmas with a huge Christmas tree cut from the forest and hauled down the mountain.

Into this scene drives Marcie, widow of Bobby Sullivan, a Marine who was mortally wounded in Viet Nam. She is hungry, broke, and in search of her dead husband's Marine Sergeant, Ian Buchannan. Ian has dropped off the face of the earth after corresponding with Marcie for several months after her husband's injury. She is on a mission to find him and discover why Ian stopped corresponding after he visited them in her husband's hospital room. She also wants to give him a set of baseball cards that had belonged to her husband, an interest that the two men had shared and discussed many times in Viet Nam. Marcie needs closure.

Jack and Mel, Preacher, Doc and all the other familiar local characters get involved in Marcie's search, and the repercussions as her sister, Erin, comes to take her home and save her from the mountain man she has found.

Ian is living in a remote, primitive one room cabin making his living selling fire wood and helping a moving company in the summer. He has grown a beard, keeps to himself and though he is not a complete hermit, few people know his name. Ian takes care not to draw attention to himself as he hides the hurt he carries with him.

It is near Christmas when Marcie finds Ian. At first he turns her away, but she stubbornly refuses to leave and when he discovers her nearly frozen in her car the next morning, he takes her in and nurses her through the flu.

As they get to know one another, Ian takes her with him on a Sunday when they go to church, the library, out to eat and end up in Virgin River where they meet her friends and share dinner. The changes Marcie see happening in Ian encourage her and gradually she begins to question him and learns what it is that sent him to the mountain away from friends and family and kept him there.

This is a heartwarming story at any time of year, but centered on the Christmas season with the impact of the Christmas message on their lives, it is a special story. Two more special people are added to the Virgin River cast.

Easy Cooking

Pistachio Chip Cookies

1 cup butter, softened

1 pkg. (8 oz.) cream cheese, softened

1 cup sugar

1 egg 1 tsp. vanilla

2 ¼ cups all-purpose flour

1 pkg. (3.4 oz.) instant pistachio pudding mix

1 tsp. Baking powder

1 cup dark chocolate chips

In a large bowl, cream the butter, cream cheese, and sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in egg and vanilla. Combine the flour, pudding mix, and baking powder; gradually add to creamed mixture and mix well. Stir in chocolate chips. Refrigerate for one (1) hour or until easy to handle. Roll the dough into 1 inch balls. Place 2 inches apart on greased baking sheets. Flatten slightly with bottom of a glass. Bake at 350 degrees for 10-12 minutes or until bottoms are lightly browned. Remove to wire racks.

Prep time: 15 minutes + chilling Bake: 10 minutes per batch Bakes: about 6 dozen Of all the cookies I prepare at Christmas, these are the most popular. They are requested for every holiday gathering.

Sneaking a look at my watch, I saw the time, 16:55, with five more minutes to go before the cemetery gates are closed for the day. Full dress was hot in the August Oklahoma sun, summertime was as bad as ever, the heat and humidity at the same level, both too high.

I saw the car pull into the drive, '69 or '70 model Cadillac Deville, looked factory new. It pulled into the parking lot at a snail's pace. An old woman got out so slowly, I thought she was paralyzed; she had a cane and a sheaf of flowers, about 4 or 5 bunches as best I could tell.

I couldn't help myself. The thought came unwanted, and left a slightly bitter taste, "She's going to spend an hour, and for this old soldier, my hip hurts like hell and I'm ready to get out of here right now!' But for this day, my duty was

to assist anyone coming in."

Kevin would lock the In gate and if I could hurry the old biddy along, we might make it to Smokey's in time.

I broke post attention. My hip made gritty noises when I took the first step and the pain went up a notch. I must have made a real military sight; middle-aged man with a small pot gut and half a limp, in Marine full-dress uniform, which had lost its razor crease about 30 minutes after I began the watch at the cemetery. I stopped in front of her, halfway up the walk. She looked up at me with an old woman's squint. "Ma'am, may I assist you in any way?" She took a minute to answer. "Yes, son. Can you carry theses flowers? I seem to be moving a tad slow these days." "My pleasure, ma'am" (Well, it wasn't too much of a lie.) She looked again. "Marine, where were you stationed?" "Vietnam, ma'am. Ground pounder. '69 to '71." She looked at me closer. "Wounded in action, I see. Well done, Marine. I'll be as quick as I can." I lied a little bigger: "No hurry, ma'am." She smiled and winked at me. "Son, I'm 85 years old and I can tell a lie from a long way off. Let's get this done. Might be the last time I can do this. My name's Joanne Wieserman, and I've a few Marines I'd like to see one more time." "Yes, ma'am. At your service."

She headed for the World War I section, stopping at a stone. She picked one of the flower bunches out of my arm and laid it on top of the stone. She murmured something I couldn't quite make out.

The name on the marble was, Donald S. Davidson, USMC: France 1918.

She turned away and made a straight line for the World War II section, stopping at one stone I saw a tear slowly

tracking its way down her cheek. She put a bunch on the stone; the name was, Stephen X. Davidson, USMC, 1943. She went up the row a ways and laid another bunch on a stone, Stanley J. Wieserman, USMC 1944. She paused for a second and more tears flowed. "Two more son, and we'll be done." I almost didn't say anything, but,"Yes, ma'am. Take your time." She looked confused, "Where's the Vietnam section, son? I seem to have lost my way." I pointed my chin "That way, ma'am." "Oh!" she chuckled quietly. "Son, me and old age ain't too friendly."

She headed down the walk I'd pointed at. She stopped at a couple of stones before she found the ones she wanted. She placed a bunch on, Larry Wieserman, USMC, 1968, and the last on Darrel Wieserman, USMC, 1970. She stood there and murmured a few words I still couldn't make out and more tears flowed. "Ok, son, I'm finished. Get me back to my car and you can go home." "Yes, ma'am. If I may ask, were those your kinfolk?" She paused. "Yes, Donald Davidson was my father, Stephen was my uncle, Stanley was my husband, Larry and Darrel were our sons. All killed in action, all Marines."

She stopped! Whether she had finished, or couldn't finish, I don't know. She made her way to her car, slowly and painfully. I waited for a polite distance to come between us and then double-timed it over to Kevin, waiting by the car.

"Get to the 'Out' gate quick, I have something I've got to do." Kevin started to say something, but saw the look I gave him. He broke the rules to get us down the service road fast. We beat her. She hadn't made it around the rotunda yet. "Kevin, stand at attention next to the gatepost. Follow my lead." I humped it across the drive to the other post. When the Cadillac came puttering around from the hedges and began the short straight traverse to the gate, I called in my best gunny's voice: "TehenHut! Present Haaaarms!" I have to hand it to Kevin; he never blinked an eye, full dress attention and a salute that would make his DI proud. She drove through that gate with two old worn-out soldiers giving her a send-off she deserved in thanks for service to our Country, and tears making my vision blurry. If we ever forget that we're one nation under God, then we will be a nation gone under. Amen

Old Business:

Discussion on the change in By-law Section 2 of Article 12 regarding 10% to 18% increase fees at the last Board Meeting. It was decided to modify this section. Motion(s) will be presented at next Board Meeting.

Update on status of various items by Earl Munday. The report is attached hereto and made a part of these minutes. (see two attachment A's)

Hot tub covers. Earl Munday will bring estimates on different types of covers at the next meeting.

Passing on shutting down Farnsworth Hall savings to Lane Allen's report.

Suggestions and complaints through the summer were few.

Memory brick update by Cyn Munday. The location has been set and design made. Copy of design attached to these minutes (see attachment B)

New Business:

Uniform Personnel Policy; Section B – Guidelines #2. A conflict regarding family members working in same department was discussed. Problem occurred as the Personnel Policy manuals being used were not updated. Motion(s) will be presented at next Executive Board Meeting. (see attachment C)

Adding a meeting for November 11, 2014 at 7:00 p.m. for all residents to attend.

Discussion on adding Pat Clark to replace Dan Collins on the Board until March 31, 2015 which would end Dan Collins term. Patty Thorpe handed out bio of Mr. Clark. The bio is attached hereto and made a part of these minutes. (see attachment D) Motion(s) will be presented at next Board Meeting.

Earl Munday brought up the possibility of reducing Board Members 12-9, discussion followed. John Palowski, Sr. suggested full-time representation of the Board throughout the year, discussion followed.

Set temperatures for Read Hall and Associated rooms was brought up and discussion followed.

Discussion on having an Attorney review documents that DVCC received from SESAC Licensing this past summer. This may be a scam.

Hiring a new attorney for the club was discussed. Research will begin to present to the Board at a later date.

Surveys from last May. Summarization

was presented by Lane Allen. The report is attached hereto and made a part of these minutes. (see attachment E)

Discussion on facility uses and sign-in sheets along with a new Key Card system. It was decided to look into the leasing part of the Key Card system that was presented to the Board last year. Read Hall usage by non members was discussed without resolution.

Lane Allen suggested that the Board look into having Facilities and Office alter operation hours. Possibly open later in the day and stay later, a couple of days a week. Discussion followed.

Board replacement terms brought up by Lane Allen and advised by Jim Cook it was against the law.

Credit card uses for office transactions was discussed.

Welcome Wagon was discussed. It was brought to the Boards' attention that Help Services will be doing the Welcome Wagon and DVCC was encourage to add goodies to Help Services' packets.

John's Villa's advertising truck is in a location that can be hazardous to others. Plan to check the lease regarding advertising and what approval is required.

Change dues from individual to households. Discussion only.

Our only source of income is from the donations and bequests we receive. And our only source of manpower is from volunteers who serve as monitors. Monitors are the individuals who assist you when you borrow and return equipment. We can't function without them. And we constantly need new volunteers to replace those that retire or move away. We especially need volunteers who can help clients load and unload the items they borrow from their cars. All we ask of each monitor is to volunteer one three hour day a week for two months. Not necessarily consecutive months. Depending on how the days fall, that's only hours a year. We need and it's a great opportunity to help others in our communities. 


The club meets each first and third Monday at 9:00 AM. in Room 2. Join us for fellowship and an informative time centered on photography.

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
