What Really Happened to Past Bingo?

The other day I was confronted by a friend of mine who is aware that I was involved with bingo in Dreamland Villa for just over five years before it ceased to function midway through 2010. This friend showed me a letter from an attorney that was sent to several DVCC Board members charging them with a number of improprieties relating to their submission for a license to reinstitute bingo in our community. My friend also said he had heard a number of what he considered to be false and misleading statements about why bingo was shut down five years ago. I was amazed by the lack of truth in what he told me he had heard. I can't and won't speak to the current efforts to reestablish bingo in Dreamland Villa, but I am more than qualified to set things straight about the previous bingo program.

Back in 2006 several of us, including the then President

of DVCC, took over the bingo program, licensed under the name of Dreamland Villa Bingo, was sponsored by the Dreamland Villa Community Club. Despite the sponsorship by DVCC, the two had to remain totally financially and operationally

independent of each other. State law required that there had to be a Project Coordinator and that one of the bingo officer positions had to be filled by an officer of the sponsoring organization. During the five-plus years we worked the bingo program, the DVCC President on the bingo board was also the Project Coordinator, thus satisfying the Gaming Commission requirements.

When we took over bingo, payout per game was generally around \$25. Bingo was held one evening per week. Within six months we had our license upgraded, so that we could offer greater payouts and also retain a percentage of the game fees for equipment upgrade and other program development. It wasn't long before we had accumulated sufficient funds to allow us to buy more sophisticated bingo gaming equipment from a local church. A couple of TV sets were donated to provide improved visibility of the balls selected for the players. We were also able to increase our payouts to \$50

per game, more or less the same as what other bingo games in the area were paying at the time. Our attendance rose to an average of 100-plus players per evening session.

In late 2009 and early 2010, however, we began to see a decline in attendance while other games in the area seemed to continue to thrive. We reached a point where the sale of game cards no longer sustained the \$50 payout. We had no choice but to reduce the payout back to \$25 per game. Attendance continued to drop and eventually forced us to subsidize the \$25 payouts with funds from our retainage fund. It was also during that time that the volunteer group that sold soft drinks and snacks to the players finally said, because of lack of revenue being generated, they were quitting. The straw, though, that broke the camel's back was the resignation

and departure of the DVCC President. Since she was our game's Project Coordinator and also the required sponsoring board officer on the bingo board, we were forced to temporarily suspend bingo.

No one on the DVCC Board stepped forward to fill

the required vacant positions. In fact, we were just plain unable to get volunteers to help, period. The same group had been running the bingo program for over five years without a break, except for the common summer break all bingo programs in the area took during June, July, and August. Every week, for 39 straight weeks a year, we had to be there; no time off during the bingo season. Because of the apparent lack of interest in bingo we finally said that's it - we are retiring, and did. The funds that remained in the bank account were eventually used to pay for needed projects at DVCC and Help Services and the bank account was closed. The equipment we acquired is in storage and is still owned by Dreamland Villa Bingo.

Finally, just to set the record straight, in 2009 one member of the bingo group walked off with a sizable amount of money from one evening's take. That obviously hurt us but was not, by any means, the reason we shut down the games.





The Doctor Wore Petticoats by Chris Enss

"Women Physicians of the Old West" is the subtitle for this enjoyable, informative work. In the early years of our country, just being able to convince a school that you were able to learn the same thing as the male physicians in training was often a vast uphill battle. In the 1800s many men, and even some women, were of the opinion that the female was capable of nothing more than child raising, needlework, and household skills. Not only did the female have a delicate physical makeup, their minds were weak as well! These stories tell of the courage, dedication, and love that these women brought to their work.

It did not matter if the female doctor was a physician, surgeon, midwife, or dentist, she was not considered equal to the task. It was a battle, first to get admitted to a medical school. After that hurdle came the battle with the professors and fellow students. Some were actually ejected from classes because the instructor refused to have a female in the class. Sometimes the fellow students were so demeaning it became difficult to face the classes. Once the diploma was earned, another problem arose.

Sometimes, the new female doctor was able to return to a hometown where she was already respected and known. More often, the new doctor was off to a rough new place where her services were needed, such as mining and timber camps. However, sometimes the injured or ill were more inclined to ask for the services of a barber or blacksmith! If she were to follow in the footsteps of a husband already in a medical practice, or another trusted woman physician, life was much easier for the new doctor. Gradually however, with time and hard work, these women doctors all became respected members of their communities, and many of them returned to school again and again for further

Each chapter of this little book is devoted to a female medical professional of one type or another. They are well researched and documented, with great stories of their hardships and determination.

The Fundraiser Committee has decided to open a Country Store. We have been in the process of finding vendors, setting dates, and getting things organized. We plan to open at 9:00 AM and close at 2:00 PM - just in

time for Christmas shopping!

Non-DVCC members will pay \$8.00 for the first table and \$5.00 for a second table. DVCC members will pay \$5.00 for the first table and a second table will be \$2.00. You must show your membership card. If you need electrical, an additional \$2.00 will be charged. There will be an envelope on your table showing the amount you owe and the money will be collected before 9:00 AM. Second-hand merchandise will not be allowed.

No cooking will be allowed by vendors in the Country Store. Appropriate permits and licenses must be placed on the table if you are displaying and sampling any food products. Outside units, such as a trailer with food merchandise displayed, are allowed as long as you take up only one (1) parking space. There will be a small area for outside vendors and they will be parked at the west end of Farnsworth Hall. They will need to provide their own table and chairs. The cost for outside vendors will be \$15.00 per space.

The Committee will need a copy of your State and Federal Tax forms. We welcome all new vendors. Think about joining us for the first season at Dreamland Villa. We look forward to a good year and will work on making the Country Store run smoothly and painlessly.

Right now we have many things in our warehouse that can be of use to you if you have injured yourself, had surgery, or are disabled in some way. If you are not familiar with Help Services equipment, you should slip in and take a look around the warehouse. You probably would be amazed. Bob Blalock is keeping everything well

organized and nothing goes out that is not in "apple pie'

If you ever get anything that has something wrong with it, stop what you are doing and bring it right back. Bob will fix it or you will be given another one. If you keep something out for a long time and it needs repairing, bring it in; please don't try to fix it yourself. Bob has the knowledge and the right parts and tools to repair it.

Once again, what we have are: wheelchairs (several kinds and sizes), hospital beds (not electric), commodes, toilet risers (with and without hand rails), knee-walkers that fold, canes of different kinds (some quads, some folding, etc.), crutches (some with arm rests), and we have items for when the grandbabies visit, like baby beds, playpens, strollers, booster seats, highchairs, pull toys, a little tricycle, and a little car that the grandchildren can sit on and ride. 
Hiking Group


