Dreamland Villa: A 55+ Age-Restricted Community

For Dreamland Villa to retain its 55+ age-restricted community status, it must demonstrate that it is compliant with the rule that at least 80% of the dwelling units are required to be occupied by at least one person who is 55 years of age or older.

A little history: The U.S. Congress created Title VIII of the Civil Rights Act of 1968 to establish certain prohibitive discrimination acts. Title VIII was amended in 1988 to expand the number of protected classes and create new enforcement procedures. One provision of the amendment created a discrimination exemption definition to allow housing developments restricted for persons age 55 or older. The Housing for Older Persons Act of 1995 (HOPA) revised the

definition of the original exemption. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) implemented its final HOPA rule effective May 3, 1999.

HUD delegated the HOPA rule administration to Maricopa County Planning and Development Department. On June 20, 1990, the Dreamland Villa Subdivision was certified as a 55+ agerestricted community. Dreamland Villa Community Club (DVCC) was assigned the responsibility to monitor compliance with the HUD HOPA rule and the Maricopa County Zoning Ordinance Chapter 10– Overlay Zoning Districts, Section 1006. SC (Senior Citizen Overlay).

The HUD HOPA rule requires that Dreamland Villa demonstrate its intent to

be occupied by persons 55 and older. To be compliant, at least 80% of the units are required to be occupied by at least one person 55 years of age or older. The Community must publish and adhere to policies and procedures that demonstrate its intent to comply with the rules issued by HUD for Verification of Occupancy. HUD's rule requires re-surveys or updates of each dwelling unit be taken a minimum of every two years.

DVCC has paperwork for the dwellings' occupants who purchased annual membership. Dwelling units in which occupants have not purchased membership in DVCC now need to complete a Re-Survey Verification of Occupancy Affidavit. These will be mailed out in early March 2016.

When you arrive at Farnsworth Hall to begin your Fun Run, check in at the starting line and you will receive a playing game sheet for as many hands as you wish to purchase. When you draw a playing card at each stop, it will be entered on your sheet. If you duplicate a card that has been drawn from a previous stop, you will draw a different card. After drawing your five cards and having a complete poker hand, return to the finish line at Farnsworth Hall to have a volunteer help you get your final poker hand recorded.

At last year's Fun Run we asked for input from our participants on how to improve this year's event and they came up with a couple of new additions to the Fun Run this year. First, the entry fee won't change. It will be the same at \$5 per hand,

but if you buy four hands for \$20 you will receive an additional hand free. The second change is if you need one additional card to complete a possible good hand, you will be able to draw a sixth card for an additional \$5.

The winners will be announced and prizes awarded prior to the start of the concert. There will be \$175 in cash prizes for the winners, along with gifts donated by local businesses and this beautiful quilt donated by our Quilting Club. Support Dreamland Villa and join us for the fun, food and music on March 12. Oh, and don't forget your mini massage. Crisis, Pursued by Disaster, Followed Closely by Catastrophe

Both a mystery and a memoir, the story of the O'Connor family on the run is a gripping tale. Mike O'Connor and his younger sisters, Mary and Fiona, grew up in Texas, Mexico and California. Products of a Boston Irish father and an English war bride mother, the children never knew when or why they might

After his parents fled Boston they settled in Texas. In a lower middle-class neighborhood, their father optimistically looked forward to better days. He was in building trades and eventually built them a new home in a remote area of Houston. The panic his parents displayed the day the Korean War started in June of 1950, when they were returning from a day trip to Mexico, was one of Mike's first memories.

Many times the family would pack up in the middle of the night and leave behind anything they couldn't stuff in the car. Sometimes the move was to another town. Other times they moved to Mexico, renting a couple of rooms from a lady in a tiny village. Mike's dad would work away from home for weeks or months at a time, usually sending money for their living expenses. Sometimes the money wouldn't come and things got really bad. When things were good, they moved into the city and Mike and his sisters attended either a school for ex-patriots or a Catholic school. When things were good, they had plenty to eat, nice clothes and piano lessons. When things were bad, they grew hungry, outgrew their shoes and clothes and walked to school.

Mike's parents were devoted to each other, but even though he knew they loved him and his sisters, as he grew older, he found it hard to trust them. He knew there were secrets they were hiding. In order to help his mother and sisters, at a young age, Mike took risks to make money to help with expenses when his father was away for long periods of time. Tourist visas to Mexico only last so long, and the paranoia his father displayed kept them dodging authorities.

In 1998, a year after his Mother had died, Michael O'Connor, now an investigative reporter, decided it was time to uncover the family secrets. His investigation covered over 50 years and documents on both sides of the Atlantic. He and his sisters found family they did not know they had and learned that the way they had lived was sparked mostly by his parents' guilt and fear.

Easy Cooking

Skillet Pineapple Upside-Down Cake

2/3 C. firmly packed light or dark brown sugar 1 (20-ounce) can pineapple slices (undrained)

9 maraschino cherries

2 large eggs, separated

3/4 C. granulated sugar 3/4 C. all-purpose flour

1/8 tsp. salt

1/2 tsp. baking powder

Whipped cream or vanilla ice cream (optional)

Melt butter in a 9-inch cast-iron skillet. Spread brown sugar evenly over bottom of skillet. Drain pineapple, reserving 1/4 C. of juice; set juice aside. Arrange pineapple slices in a single layer over brown sugar mixture and place a cherry in center of each pineapple ring, set skillet aside.

Beat egg yolks at medium speed with an electric mixer until thick and lemon-colored; gradually add granulated sugar, beating well. Heat reserved pineapple juice in a small saucepan over low heat, gradually add juice mixture to the yolk mixture, beating until blended.

Combine all-purpose flour, salt and baking powder. Add dry ingredients to the yolk mixture, beating at low speed with electric mixer until blended. Beat egg whites until stiff peaks form, fold egg whites into batter. Spoon batter evenly over pineapple slices.

Bake at 325 degrees for 45 to 50 minutes. Cool cake in skillet 30 minutes, invert cake onto a serving plate. Serve warm or cold with whipped cream or ice cream, if desired. Makes 8-10 servings.

Express Pineapple Upside-Down Cake: Follow original recipe directions for first four ingredients. Substitute 1 (9-ounce) package Jiffy Golden Yellow Cake Mix for next five ingredients. Prepare cake mix according to package directions, substituting 1/2 C. pineapple juice with 1/2 C. water. Spoon batter over prepared pineapple slices as directed. Bake at 350 degrees for 20 to 25 minutes or until a wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean.





Board Study Session February 2, 2016,

Treasurer's Report: Report on file in the office. The combined cash balance of the checking and money market account: January 31, 2015=\$305,449.50, January 31, 2016=\$302,575.67.

Administrative Services Manager's Report: Report on file in the office.

Standing Committee and MCSO Posse Reports: Reports, if provided by the Committee Chairpersons, are on file in the office.

Old Business:

Cell Phone Tower Lease: Bob Westall, Contracts Chairperson, informed the Board that he had negotiated a revised lease with Crown Castle, the company with whom DVCC has a current cell phone tower lease. The current lease pays DVCC \$864 per month with a three percent increase in five-year increments. Crown Castle agreed to a new lease paying DVCC \$1,200 for 240 consecutive months and a \$20,000 down payment at closing. The Board authorized Bob Westall to proceed with the lease and to provide the Directors a copy of the new lease for their review and approval as soon as possible. Motion carried unanimously.

Verification of Occupancy Re-Survey, Transmittal Letter and the third Realtor Letter: The Board agreed to move discussion of the proposed language to an ad-hoc committee chaired by Ward Jennings, meeting to be held at 3 p.m. Monday, February 8, 2016, at Read Hall. The committee is open to any DVCC member who wishes to attend. Motion carried unanimously.

New Business:

Motion: Earl Munday moved the Board accept the revised DVCC By-Laws dated February 9, 2016, incorporating the line items voted on and approved at the January 12, 2016, general membership meeting. Motion carried unanimously.

Motion: Earl Munday moved the Board approve the Activities Policy, as corrected, dated February 9, 2016. Motion carried unanimously.

Motion: Earl Munday moved the Board approve the revised Purchasing Policy dated February 9, 2016. Motion carried unanimously.

Motion: Earl Munday moved the Board approve the revised Website Policy

dated February 9, 2016. Motion carried unanimously.

Red Westall, Indoor Activities Chairman, discussed the exercise equipment needed. The Board agreed in principle, subject to review and approval, an initial lease of the new exercise equipment. The Board approved a DVCC Open House, starting at 9 a.m. Saturday, March 26, to show off to the Dreamland Villa Community the newlyremodeled exercise room and equipment. Motion carried unanimously.

Welcome: President Carylan McLean Pledge Allegiance

Call to Order: 9:00 a.m.

Roll Call: Present: Pat Clark, Carol Cooper, Charles Dubbs, Ward Jennings, Carylan McLean, Cyn Munday, Earl Munday and John Pawloski, Sr. A quorum was present.

Old Business:

Farnsworth Hall Swimming Pool: Lane Allen asked if money could be saved by leaving the Farnsworth Hall pool covered during cold, rainy and windy days or during the winter months; if the pool could be opened at 9 or 10 a.m. and closed at 6 p.m? The Directors concluded that the users should be surveyed and prior to the fall season, a policy should be developed addressing those pool hours.

Cell Phone Tower: Bob Westall, Contracts Committee Chairperson, addressed the current Crown Castle cell phone lease and the three percent every five years increase also indexed to the CPI. Bob invited the Directors to attend conference calls with other cell phone operators to determine if better lease terms could be negotiated.

Exercise Room and Equipment: Red Westall, Indoor Activities Chairperson, provided an update on the exercise room remodel and equipment replacement. The February 3 spaghetti dinner is a fundraiser to purchase a commercial grade treadmill, recumbent bike, free weights and stand, and refurbish the Apollo 250 weight machine. The anticipated completion date: March 1, 2016.

Bocce Ball: A separate discussion arose regarding the March spaghetti dinner to raise money to replace the carpet for the Bocce Ball courts

2016 Membership Sales: Through January 31, 2016, 1,474 memberships have been sold, an amount consistent with the 2016 budget projections.

U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD): Ward Jennings, Treasurer, discussed the HUD-issued Housing for Older Persons Act (HOPA) rule mandating a resurvey every two years of each dwelling unit's occupants. The Directors and attendees discussed various methods to obtain the required Verification of Occupancy Affidavits. In addition, the Directors acknowledged their consent for a proposed article to be published in the March 2016 issue of the *Citizen*.

Meeting with Maricopa County Sheriff and Zoning: Ward Jennings addressed the Tuesday, February 9, Community Forum to discuss the break-ins and zoning issues. Ward also addressed a home with weeds in the yard, owned by an 88 year old. Attendees suggested a Neighbor helping Neighbor program wherein residents of Dreamland Villa take care of our neighbors without the government's involvement.

Capital Improvement Projects: John Pawloski, Sr. stated that Read Hall pools are scheduled to be closed periodically for renovation work. The bathrooms at Read Hall are also scheduled for replacement of fixtures. Quotes are being obtained for the replacement, before summer, of two air conditioning units at Farnsworth Hall.

Brown Bag Lunch: Carol Cooper stated that 18 people from various clubs shared ideas at the January 2016 think tank discussion. A second Brown Bag Lunch is scheduled for February 10 at 11 a.m.

New Business:

Country Store: Carol Cooper, Fundraising Committee Chairperson, proposed a motion for the February 9, 2016 Board meeting. Extended discussion then took place as to how much money DVCC should charge for setting up and tearing down events at Farnsworth Hall.

Incorporate Approved Annual Meeting Motions into the Existing By-Laws: Earl Munday, Policy Chairperson, discussed

the incorporation of items approved at the general membership meeting into the By-Laws updated through May 12, 2015.

Revise Rules and Regulations: Earl Munday described forthcoming changes needed to address non-members attending activities in Read Hall, definition of members and the guest policy.

Approve/Revise Administrative Policy and Procedure Manual Section: Earl Munday:

a. Activities Policy: discussed the new policy regarding the general membership approved non-resident temporary guest pass.

b. **Website Policy:** discussed the significant amount of revisions to the existing Website Policy and concluded the word "application" in Paragraph II.B.3 required clarification.

c. Dues and Fees Policy: discussed the general membership's approval of a flexible membership policy. The Directors agreed that a written policy should be developed by those members interested in being involved, and the variance/waiver policy should be effective for the 2017 dues year.

d. Purchasing Policy: The purchasing limit for the Maintenance Foreman, Administrative Services Manager or Committee Chairperson was raised from \$500 to \$750.

Raising Membership Dues: Carol Cooper proposed the new Directors being seated at the April 1, 2016, meeting consider raising dues \$5 per year for the next three years to offset increasing expenses.



Fused Glass






Legends of Country Music


