### **Computer Club**

### Personal Digital Assistants

"Digital Assistant Devices, commonly called Personal Digital Assistants (PDA's), include the Amazon Echo and Goggle Home. These are essentially mobile devices that function as personal information managers and are common on handheld devices. You have them on your mobile phones, on your computers and tablets (e.g. Siri, Hey Cortana, OK Google, and Windows 10). But now they are available as separate, external Bluetooth speakers that can be placed



virtually anywhere in your home, or take it with you on the go. When a person speaks to a PDA, the device will do what you ask it to do, such as play a favorite song, provide information, deliver news and sports scores, state the weather, make lists and calendar appointments, control your smart home and even

order products, among other things!

Amazon makes the Echo, the Echo Dot, the Echo Tap and the Amazon Fire TV, while Google now has a similar device called Google Home. Just how do they work? These devices record information and temporarily store the recordings, sending them to cloud servers for processing.

Because PDA's can be used to provide reminders for such things as taking your medication, turning off lights and keeping appointments, their benefits can be well worth the investment. Here is an "information-only" comparison of the devices: Amazon Echo \$179, Echo Dot \$49 and Google Home \$129. If you are interested, or want to seek additional information, you can go directly to Google or Amazon's websites, or research PDA's online.'

Be sure to donate your used printer cartridges to the Computer Club! The computer club receives a cash back coupon for the cartridges from the Staples reward program. The coupon is then used to purchase supplies for the computer room or an individual member use the coupon and then give cash donation to the computer club. There is a box in the DVRC office and Read Hall where one can drop off the cartridges. This is a great recycling method and it helps the computer club.

The Saturday morning "Question and Answer" class at 9 a.m. is the only summer session meeting. It is a time to share with others who have questions, concerns, or unusual experiences with any Windows Computer or Android device. Several regulars have iPads and iPhones and can address issues with these devices. Not all issues are solved, but as in life we learn from failure and the effort used to explore the problem.

Ratification of Minutes: Janet Peterson moved to ratify the following minutes:

Board of Directors April 11, 2017 Minutes and Study Session Minutes dated May 2, 2017 Minutes. The motion carried unanimously.

Treasurer's Report: Ward Jennings, Treasurer. Financial reports on file in the office and posted on the official bulletin board. A special report showing a comparison of kee cards sold through April 30, of each year since 2011 is attached to these minutes on the website.

Administrative Services Manager's Report: Vicki Mitchell's report is on file in the office.

Standing Committee Reports and MCSO Posse Reports: Reports, if provided by the Committee Chairpersons, are on file in the office.

Old Business: None

**New Business:** 

Pool Furniture Replacement: John Pawloski, Sr. moved to authorize the Chairperson for the Buildings and Grounds Committee to spend an amount not to exceed \$3,000 to buy approximately three new tables, 16 new chairs, six new handicapped chaise lounges and restring several chairs for the pool areas. The amended motion carried unanimously.

Farnsworth Hall Marquee: Deb Rychlak moved to authorize the Farnsworth Hall Manager to purchase a new top to the Farnsworth Hall marquee for \$2,860 plus tax with an additional installation price of \$779. The new top shall state the Farnsworth Hall is available for rent and shall provide a telephone number. The motion carried unanimously.

Mission Statement Revision: Ward Jennings moved to approve a new mission statement "Our Mission is to offer events, activities and facilities for the enjoyment of our residents and maintain Dreamland Villa's status as a 55 + age-restricted retirement community." After some discussion about the use of the word "residents" in the mission statement, the motion carried unanimously.

Farnsworth Hall Website: Deb Rychlak moved to authorize the Farnsworth Hall Manager to utilize Larry John Wright, Inc. to create a Farnsworth Hall rental webpage for an amount not to exceed \$1,885. The Farnsworth Hall venue page will be used to advertise the community's event venue to the public. This page will display an attractive multimedia presentation to the visitor highlighting why they should book Farnsworth Hall for their next event. Features shall include a virtual tour that allows visitors to explore the venue from the convenience of their computer or mobile device, a slideshow of the venue with captions, a description of services and amenities available for a variety of event categories (weddings, parties, corporate, etc) and contact information for questions and booking, and a contact form. The motion carried unanimously.

New DVRC Webpages: John Pawloski, Sr. moved to authorize the Secretary/ Treasurer in coordination with the Website Committee and other interested persons to create a new home page for the DVRC website (cost not to exceed \$3,695) and two new interior webpages: A Directory of Services (cost not to exceed \$1,600) and a Real Estate Section (cost not to exceed \$2,000); additional details provided in the Dreamland Villa Website Proposal available on the website. The 2016-2017 Kitchen Sub-Committee Chairperson has authorized the use of

its restricted funds, approximately \$2,700, to cover the virtual tour and post production costs related to the new home page. Two questions need to be answered before the completion of the website work: (1) How will the content management or key word search causes our new website to be first or near the top of searches and (2) what would the fee be for monthly management of the website's content management changes. The motion carried unanimously as amended.

Bingo Revisited: Possible motion: John Pawloski, Sr. moved to provide the Directors advise and consent to create a new ad-hoc Bingo Committee to prepare a proposal to develop a new Bingo program to raise funds for DVRC and provide the Directors advise and consent to approve Charlene Grande as the ad-hoc Bingo Committee Chairperson. This motion does not establish a permanent Bingo Committee and this motion does not authorize anyone to move forward with any implementation actions. Charlene has stated that if the Directors authorized a new permanent Bingo Committee she is not willing to chair that committee. The motion carried unanimously.

Fire Suppression Equipment. (This was a late item for the agenda.) Based on a May 3, 2017 inspection report,

some sprinklers are missing and several sprinkler heads are inoperative. John Pawloski, Sr. moved to authorize \$2,140 of capital reserve funds to be used to pay Metro Fire Equipment to install new sprinklers in the Farnworth Hall mezzanine, closets located under the mezzanine and entry area, and replace eight sprinkler heads at both Farnsworth and Read Halls. The work shall also include inspection of check values and pipe obstructions. The motion carried unanimously.

The Dreamland Villa Website Proposal **Open Forum Comments:** 

Jackie Young stated she has passed the Kitchen Manager test and now has her Kitchen Manager License. Copper Heights Maricopa County

Zoning Hearing scheduled for May 11, 2017 has been cancelled by the owners of the

facility according to Beth Coons because people created such a "ruckus" that the Copper Heights owners felt they would lose their zoning request. Residents of Dreamland Villa provided more than 80 letters opposing the continued use of this facility of the 80 letters opposing the continued use of this facility as a drug rehabilitation facility for under-aged persons. The owners entered into a consent agreement, among other things, requiring them to (1) stop their residents congregating on the west end of their property, the primary source of foul language and cigarette smoke and (2) discontinue their residents walking through any portion of the Dreamland Villa Subdivision. Should they violate any portion of the consent agreement, the fine is \$1,000 per day. They have requested an eight month extension for the current permit in order to relocate their operation to a new building at 70th Street and Main Street in Mesa. The Maricopa County Board of Supervisors meeting scheduled for June 7, 2017 has also been cancelled.

The Directors agreed to meet for a Strategic Planning Committee meeting on July 11, 2017 to discuss the second quarter financial results, status of the new website's development and how to address the continued declining revenue that threatens the long term future of Dreamland Villa as we currently know it.

May 2, 2017, Approved Study Session Minutes

Welcome: Pat Clark, President. Pledge of Allegiance. Call to Order: 8:57 a.m. Roll Call: Ward Jennings, Secretary. Present: Deb Rychlak, Janet Peterson, Pat Clark, Ward Jennings, and John Pawloski, Sr.

#### Old Business:

**Gate in Farnworth Hall Fence:** Ward Jennings, Treasurer advised that the Board of Directors at its April 11, 2017 meeting authorized the purchase of four bollards, not to exceed \$800. The actual cost was \$400 and the bollards have been installed.

**Property Management System:** Ward Jennings, Treasurer advised that the new system is up and running, currently revealing that 92% of the dwelling units in the Dreamland Villa Subdivision have positive evidence that at least one person 55 years of age or older reside each of the DVRC dwelling units.

#### **New Business:**

**Pool Furniture Replacement:** John Pawloski, Buildings and Grounds Committee Chairperson reported that a number of plastic tables and chairs have been removed or stolen from the pool areas. John requested authorization to spend an amount not to exceed \$3,000 to buy three new tables, 12 new chairs, six new handicapped chaise lounges and restring several chairs.

**Read Hall Building B-East Roof Delamination:** John Pawloski, Buildings and Grounds Committee Chairperson advised that the maintenance staff would repair the damage.

**Review of Summer Projects:** John Pawloski, Buildings and Grounds Committee Chairperson advised that the Art room would be remodeled to include new cabinets made by the wood shop, sound proofing in the side walls, drywall repair and painting, new sink and faucet with a relocated sediment drain being added. In addition the Farnsworth Hall kitchen shall receive a complete cleaning, the exhaust hood and vent to the outside shall be professionally cleaned and inoperative fan parts shall be replaced. Sometime during the summer the pools shall be acid washed, specific dates shall be announced at a later time.

**Farnsworth Hall Marquee:** Jackie Young, Farnsworth Hall Manager, advised that she had renegotiated a sign company's previously low bid for a new top to the marquee and received a new price of \$2,860 plus tax with an

additional installation price of \$779. The new top shall state the Farnsworth Hall is available for rent and shall provide a telephone number.

Administrative Policy And Procedures Manual: Deb Rychlak, Policies Committee Chairperson presented a revised Administrative Policy and Procedure Subject: Facility Rental and Lease Rules and Fees Revision. The Directors requested that the DVRC Members Celebration rent be increased from \$200 to \$250. The policy should be revised to stipulate that this rate is for the kee cards hold only and not for extended family members. The Directors requested that the Policies Committee work with the Farnsworth Hall Rental Manager to review the existing Short Term Facility Rental Agreement (for a single event) with the intent of making the agreement shorter and more concise.

**Mission Statement Revision:** Ward Jennings, Secretary suggested the current mission statement is outdated and proposed four options. The Directors favored Alternative Four: "Our Mission is to offer events, activities and facilities for the enjoyment of our residents and maintain Dreamland Villa's status as a 55 + age-restricted retirement community."

**Copper Heights: Request to Maricopa County to Rescind the Senior Citizen Overlay (55+ age-restriction.)** Ward Jennings, Secretary, advised that the property owners of 152 N. 56th St., Mesa, have requested a zoning hearing to be held on Thursday, May 11, 2017, requesting Maricopa County rescind the property's 55+ age-restriction status. The zoning request would permanently permit the facility to continue to offer drug rehabilitation services to its less than 55 year old open facility residents. The Board of Supervisors hearing for the requested zoning change is scheduled for June 7, 2017. The DVRC office has received more than 50 hand written and signed letters from concerned DVRC residents. Ward, on behalf of DVRC, shall be present at the hearings to present the letters and demonstrate how disrespectful and offensive these drug rehabilitation residents have been toward our community's 55+ aged residents.

**Dreamland Villa Revenue:** Should the revenue continue to decline the result will be that Dreamland Villa will be unable to maintain the legal requirements to document its compliance with the 55+ age-restriction rules. Ward Jennings, Treasurer, presented several ideas for the Directors and attendees to consider addressing the declining revenue.

Photos of today's Dreamland Villa were presented comparing it to a multi-aged subdivision. Ward suggested the Directors and attendees consider this negative messaging as part of the 2018 annual fund raising drive to residents who did not make a 2017 financial contribution to DVRC.

Two groups of Real Estate agents who advertised in the 2017 Directory have received no new listings from our residents. That raises the question: Will the 2017 Directory advertisers renew their ads for the 2018 Directory? Those real estate agents have demonstrated a strong interest in keeping Dreamland Villa a 55+ age-restricted Subdivision but residents have not been listing with them.

Ward presented a four page proposal for a new website homepage with four interior links. The proposed new homepage would include a drone video overview, with voice-over and captioning, presenting the community's attributes to people not currently familiar with Dreamland Villa. One interior link would be for the existing website for DVRC residents. A second link would promote Farnsworth Hall rental to include the venue's virtual tour. A third link would present the Directory advertisers' names and advertisements which provide services for our residents and their homes. The fourth link would promote available rental properties and homes listed for sale wherein the listings properly reveal that Dreamland Villa is a 55+ age-restricted retirement community with requested one time \$400 transfer fee and \$175 per person recurring annual fee; fees necessary to keep Dreamland Villa a 55+ age-restricted retirement community.

The cost of the proposed new homepage and proposed three new interior links would be paid for by increased revenue related to the new web pages.

**Bingo Revisited:** Charlene Grande, Fundraising Committee Chairperson suggested the Directors approve a new ad-hoc Bingo Committee to prepare a proposal to develop a new Bingo program to raise funds for DVRC. Charlene said would chair the ad-hoc Bingo Committee if it was approved by the Directors. Charlene also stated that if the Directors authorized a new permanent Bingo Committee she would NOT chair that committee.

**Strategic Planning Committee:** Deb Rychlak read the responsibilities assigned to this committee in the Administrative Policy and Procedure manual and suggested this committee be convened to focus on declining revenue issues. It was suggested that Deb coordinate a meeting with Bruce Gile, Strategic Planning Committee Chairperson.
