The Financial State of Dreamland Villa **Retirement Community**

A March 2014 front page article in the *Citizen* asked the question, "Could Dreamland Villa Community Club Cease to Exist?" The article stated that Dreamland was struggling to get 50 percent of the residents to pay their annual

Today the prospects for Dreamland Villa's future are much more promising!

The 2017 membership declined 4.25 percent, substantially slower than the 11percent average decline during 2011 to

The revenue for 2016 and 2017 each year exceeded \$493,000 compared to 2014's revenue of \$380,651.

What has changed?

Starting in 2016, targeted messaging was sent to the three separate residential members, non-members and renters.

In early 2016 a request for a special \$125 contribution to keep Dreamland Villa a 55+ age-restricted Subdivision generated more than \$40,000 of additional

In early 2017 a rebranding campaign reminded real estate agents, their brokers and title companies that Dreamland Villa is a 55+ age-restricted Retirement Community, not a club. The result: 2017 revenue from the new home buyer's one time transfer fee is more than \$50,000, a 162 percent increase compared to the 2013 to 2015 average.

There was speculation that it would cost as much as \$150,000 to remove the Farnsworth Hall mansard roofs' asbestos shingles. Laboratory tests in 2017 determined that the shingles did *NOT* have asbestos. It will now cost less than a \$1,000 to refurbish these roofs.

Dreamland Villa produced its own 2017

Community Directory without cost to the members.

A new integrated property management system replaced three systems previously used. The system provides the 55+ reporting data as to who owns and occupies each dwelling unit in the Dreamland Villa subdivision and the residents' fee payment

Clearly more needs to be done in 2018. The Directors need to do a better job complying with the requirements set forth in the Arizona Revised Non-Profit Statutes and exercising financial discipline.

More residents need to be motivated to make financial contributions to keep Dreamland Villa a 55+ age-restricted Retirement Community. The real estate community and title companies need to be constantly reminded that the requested fees are essential to keep our Community 55+ age-restricted and financially strong.

Time to Renew Your Investment in Dreamland Villa

By now you should have received your annual Verification of Age and Occupancy affidavit in the mail. This form is vital for us to maintain the 55+ overlay that keeps Dreamland Villa's status as a 55+ retirement community. The Annual Fee Statement is included with the affidavit. This fee of \$175 per person per household is essential to maintain the 55+ overlay, maintain the facilities that preserve the value of our homes, and give you an

opportunity to vote on issues concerning our community. It is a bargain when compared to other 55+ communities in the

If you have a current Kee Card, you only need to pay the annual fee by January 31. The card you have will remain active. You can mail in a check with your affidavit or pay in person with your affidavit and check, cash or credit card. There is a \$4.95 additional credit card fee if you wish to pay with a credit card.

There will be volunteers available in Read Hall, next to the office, beginning on January 3 from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Monday through Friday, closing for lunch from noon until 1:00 p.m. Note: the office will be closed on January 24 for High Tea.
They will accept payments

and process new cards, if needed. They also have copies of the affidavit if you did not receive the form in the mail or if you misplaced the copy that was sent to you.

Payment of the annual fee must be made by January 31

to keep your Kee Card active.

The affidavit must be returned to the office to comply with Maricopa County and U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development Requirements for 55+ Subdivisions.
