Town Hall Meeting

The Dreamland Villa Retirement Community held another of its Town Hall Meetings in Farnsworth Hall on Wednesday, March 21, 2018, at 6:30 p.m. A record number of 262 people attended. The entire program may be viewed by watching a video accessed on the front page of the Dreamland Villa org website.

After a short welcome by host Ward Jennings, Bruce Gile was introduced as the volunteer who has handled the Dreamland Villa residents' complaints for the last three years.

Four personnel from the Arizona Registrar of Contractors discussed their roles in investigations to protect the health, safety and welfare of the public through a regulatory system designed to promote quality construction by Arizona contractors.

Deputy Darvin Cartuciello represented the Maricopa County Sheriff's Office and spoke about issues impacting the Dreamland Villa Community. Following his presentation, Cliff Gagnon, Dreamland Villa Posse Commander, introduced other Posse Members and discussed their role in our Community.

Ms. Beth Coons of the Executive Board, Farnsworth Companies, addressed the pending April 2018 relocation of Unhooked at the Heights drug rehab facility, 56th Street near Main Street.

Darren Gerard, Deputy Director Maricopa County Planning and Development Department, and Charles Hart, Code Compliance Manager, spoke of the requirements to keep Dreamland Villa a 55+ age-restricted subdivision and addressed specific issues regarding Maricopa County Code Compliance. One specific item was again mentioned regarding code compliance. The County may take legal action, an abatement process, to clean up a property's debris, weeds and trash. However, the County does not have the funds to actually go onto a property and remove the debris, weeds and trash. Procedures are in place wherein the Dreamland Villa Retirement Community and its volunteers may legally take the abatement action and clean up a property.



We are now into three and a half years of this program and have sold 138 bricks to date. Each one has a story to tell and it's always so great hearing those stories.



Adjournment: The meeting was adjourned at 7:45 p.m.

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

Call to Order: 6:46pm by Johna Sharp, President

Roll Call: Kathie Chismar, Secretary. Present were Johna Sharp, Mary Newkirk, Larry Thoma, Kathleen Wissinger, Lynn Campbell, Earl Munday, Kathie Chismar. A quorum was present.
Old Business:

John's Villa: Johna Sharp, Larry Thoma, and Bob Westall met with Eddie and Barb to discuss closing the restaurant at the end of their lease. There is a receipt on file for equipment they own. Forming an Ad Hoc committee was discussed,

Farnsworth Kitchen Kevs: Mary Newkirk had a request for different placement of the keys due to missing items from the Farnsworth kitchen. Cathy Jageler, Bea Westall and Char Grande will meet to determine who should have keys to the kitchen and the new trailer. They will let Mary know how to control access in the future.

Administrative Service Manager Update: Johna Sharp advised that an offer has been made to Vanessa Diagle. She will start on Monday, April 9.

New Business:

Compliance: Bruce Giles discussed the issue with people under 55 residing in the community. It is up to our residents to work with the Dreamland Compliance Chair and the County to monitor the situation. Bruce advised that names of the complainant are kept confidential by Dreamland and the County. At the recent Town Hall, the representatives from the County advised there are no restrictions on the number of

people in a home or the number of cars on the street.

Kathie Chismar will try to find people in the community to work on the houses with abatement

issues. Char Grande will try to work with the Neighborhood Watch committees.

Pools: There was a discussion on extension of the pool hours at the Farnsworth Pool. The

pool is to remain closed at 6 pm until evening temperature are consistently at 70 degrees or above. There are problems at the pools with people not following posted rules. Inappropriate conduct or passing cards to guests or nonmembers should be reported to the office or pull a Kee

Card report to identify violators. Numerous bids were presented for repairs to the decking at the Farnsworth pool. A written warrantee is needed to guarantee work and license and insurances before proceeding.

Standing Committee Chairpersons: All chairpersons will remain in place with the exception of Compliance, Outdoor Activities, and Residential Sales and Marketing. Meetings between the Directors and the Committee Chairs would help to facilitate better communication.

It was suggested that the Committee Chairs should be on the Website and in future Dreamland Directories. It was suggested that the Directors names and email addresses should be in the

Arizona Corporation Commission: Earl Munday had copies of the documents required for the County. They can be faxed in. The Bank requires Approved Board minutes signed by the President from the April 11 Board meeting. When this is available, the Board will update the check signers with the

bank. Earl Mundy volunteered to be statutory agent. Closing Farnsworth Hall for the summer: Cathy Jageler has events scheduled during the summer. There does not seem

to be sufficient benefit to closing the hall. Adding line items to the Chart of Accounts: Bea Westall would like to add an account for the Kitchen in order to raise funds for a Farnsworth Hall kitchen remodel in the future. The request for a line item for the Volunteer Appreciation could be handled under a general category such as Member Benefit or Community Relations.

There was a discussion around the porta john set up at the Bocce Ball court. The porta john was ordered for 2 months, using funds that were contributed to from their restricted fund account by the bocce ball players. Future discussion will be needed for the possibility of extending the

Art Book Class To Be Offered Next Year

Next January/February 2019 sessions I will offer a 6-week class in making an Art Book. An Art Book is filled with beautiful pages that you will make with papers, watercolor or acrylic paints or inks and many different collage elements. Hopefully we will create two pages per session. So if you think you will take this class this is what you need to do to have a beautiful book and to successfully participate in the

PREPARATION FOR THE ART BOOK
Have a theme in mind; here's some suggestions or other ideas that appeals to you:

Short positive affirmations

One word of inspiration per page

Photo book of loved ones and family members

Favorite bible quotes

Poetry you write or love

Type some of your favorite quotes or words relating to your theme on computer – be creative with using the fonts available. Also print some with at least 48-point font size up to 72-point size. Create at least 12-images of your inspirational words, quotes or whatever your theme will be. If you have any scrapbook paper or construction paper print

some of them on these papers. If not, print on bond paper. You could try printing on rice paper too. (To do that, cut a piece of rice paper to about 8'x10' size. Tape corners to a regular bond piece of paper. Put tape on the center of the top

of the rice paper so it will go through your printer easily.)

TYPE YOUR TITLE OF THE BOOK IN LARGE
PRINT FOR FRONT COVER AND PRINT IT OUT.

Collect some items you may have around your house.

Collect greeting cards that might be used in the book look for fun creative cards such as Laura Burch's work or flowers or birds or anything that looks good to you.

Collection of pieces of yarn, ribbon, small pieces of fabric that might look good.

Charms, sequins, fun embellishments (that you may have from craft projects).

If none I'll have some; Bits of lace, paper doilies, to name a few ideas

Go to Michael's and get stick-on items in the scrapbook area that you really like.

If you have rice papers or any papers with texture bring some small pieces of those.

MUST HAVE MATERIALS TO BRING:

A journal book 6'x8" with watercolor paper pages (can be gotten at any art supply place - Jerry's Artarama, Blick probably Michaels.)

Watercolor or acrylic fluid paints, or inks

Brushes

Water container

Pencil and eraser

Sharpie pen – black ink and other colors if you wish. Fine point size.

One Sharpie pen with wide tip. Flat on one side

Glue – such as Yes Paste or Modge Podge or Elmer's Glue, Soft gel medium

Scissors

And of course, any of the above-mentioned items you can use to create a beautiful art book.

I will furnish a good many materials as well.

A happy summer to all from the Entertainment Committee and we look forward to another fun and exciting season beginning in October. We will see you then!






Pioneer Pepper and the Sunset Pioneers A Big Hit!






