## **CORONAVIRUS** (COVID-19)

All, please know that Dreamland Villa Retirement Community is adhering to the recommendations of our State and County Health departments and those of the Center for Disease Control (CDC). When there is more information, we will share it.

In the meantime, we ask that each of you take steps to protect yourself and those close to you. You can help stop COVID-19 by knowing the signs and symptoms:

- Fever
- Cough
- Shortness of breath

Seek medical advice if you develop symptoms or have been in close contact with a person known to have COVID-19 or have recently traveled from an area with ongoing spread of

COVID-19. The CDC recommends everyday preventive actions to help prevent the spread of respiratory diseases, including:

- Avoid close contact with people who are sick. Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth.
- Stay home when you are sick. Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue,
- then throw the tissue in the trash.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces using a regular household cleaning spray or wipe.
- Facemasks should be used by people who show symptoms of COVID-19 to help prevent the spread of the disease to others.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, especially after going to the bathroom; before eating; and after blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing. If soap and water are not readily available, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol.

## New Compliance Committee for 2020

Dreamland Villa Retirement Community has always had a compliance committee that worked to address complaints that residents have within our community. This committee has been more active and effective at times than others. Most recently Bruce Gile had been single-handedly trying to resolve conflicts or problems, until he became physically unable to do so. We are so grateful for Bruce's dedication to this cause! For over a month, we have formed a new committee of six people who have agreed to work on these issues. It is the goal of this Compliance Committee to help resolve situations that have come up which make it difficult to enjoy life here in Dreamland. Because as a Senior Community, don't we all just want to enjoy life?! If you have filed a complaint with the DVRC office, your complaint is on our radar and if we haven't already, we will be getting in touch with you!

In last month's Citizen, there was an article about RV's in driveways and front yards of homes. We want to start our monthly articles with that issue and will address various other complaints that come up in upcoming articles.

As was previously discussed, Dreamland's "rules" are really those of Maricopa County. MC ordinance 1114 is the ordinance addressing mobile homes, campers, RV's, etc. Some of its highlights state: 1114.1 "At no time shall the mobile home, travel trailer, aircraft, boat, camping trailer, truck camper or motor home be occupied or used for living, sleeping or housekeeping purposes..." 1114.1.2 "If a travel trailer, aircraft, boat, camping trailer, truck camper or motor home is located or stored outside of a garage or carport, it shall be placed in the rear yard of the lot or side yard of the lot, but not within the required front yard [Single Family Residential Zoning states that each residence must have a front yard of not less than 20 feet deep] except for loading and unloading purposes may be permitted for a period of time not to exceed 72 hours. Such storage shall maintain a 5-foot clear path around any structures."

So, all of that "legaleze" means that your camper, trailer, boat, RV needs to be stored in the back yard, or in the side yard, but cannot stick out past the front of the house. And there must be at least 5-feet all the way around it. So, if your neighbors are complaining about your trailer in the driveway or front yard, they have a legitimate complaint. It can be hazardous for backing out onto the street. And really, who wants to look at a camper instead of the beauty that surrounds us here in the valley?! Our committee thanks you in advance for coming into compliance with the Maricopa County Ordinances. We hope you're enjoying spring in Mesa!

Ratification of Minutes: Earl made a motion to approve the minutes of the February 12, 2020 Board Meeting and the March 4, 2020 Study Session Meeting Minutes. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.
