Dreamland Villa and Compliance with Maricopa County Rules

We've almost hit the middle of summer already, time flies even when we're staying at home more. Whether you're here in Dreamland or off to your summer escape, we hope you are enjoying your summer so far!

The Compliance Committee reminds you that even if you are away, you still must have arrangements to keep your home here in Dreamland tidy and kept up. We are seeing and hearing several complaints about weeds in yards. This time of year they dry out quickly and yards become ugly and unkept and even fire hazards. It's also a good indicator to criminals that either you are unable to take care of the yard or that you aren't at your home. The Maricopa Zoning Ordinance that applies is Section 1116. It states (paraphrased):

"You have committed a violation if you allow rubbish, junk, trash, WEEDS, filth debris or dilapidated buildings.... to remain upon property that you own or occupy, or upon sidewalks, streets or alleys contiguous to your property. Article 1116.2 states that it is also a violation to put any of the

above onto property which is not your own." This is especially pertinent to those who live along the Nature Trail, you are not welcome to dump your weeds and clippings onto the Nature Trail! The Maricopa County Abatement Ordinance No. 11 defines violating weeds as dried vegetation that is 6-inches or taller.

The 2020 monsoon season has begun, so weeds will pop up even in the heat of an Arizona summer. If you are unable to maintain your yard, please ask around for recommendations of landscaping people to hire from time to time. If you are away, we hope you already have made arrangements for this upkeep, if not, check in with the people you have watching your home and see if they can help find someone to do this service for you. The Dreamland Villa Office has a list of recommendations for several services, so give them a call, if need be.

Another prominent problem we have been aware of is the fact that people do not pick up the fruit from their citrus trees. The rotting fruit attracts rats...and rats multiply rapidly, infesting nearby homes. None of us wants that! PLEASE! If

you have citrus trees, be a responsible homeowner and make sure your fruit is always picked up and disposed of! This not only violates the above Section 1116 of the Maricopa code, it also violates the Environmental Health Code, Chapter 3, Regulation 1. If you are endangering your neighbors by ignoring the rotting fruit on your property, your neighbors may contact both of these Maricopa county agencies.

Finally, a reminder that Dreamland Villa does not have an HOA, so our organization cannot force any homeowner to comply with the rules we live by. However, Maricopa County does have ordinances and rules and will issue violations. It is always a good idea to file any complaints both with the Dreamland Villa Office and with Maricopa County Planning & Development Office. Contact information for them is www.maricopa.gov/planning for an online form or phone 602 506-3301. We always suggest being a good neighbor and discussing your complaint directly with the offender. If that doesn't work, use these resources to help keep Dreamland a safe, happy place to live!

In the event you have not been around the complex lately, here are a few of the tasks the guys have completed. Keep in mind this is not a complete list of everything; just a list of a few things.

Painted Read Pool deck, painted yellow lines on both pool decks (Read &

FH), touched up paint on all pool block fences at both complexes. 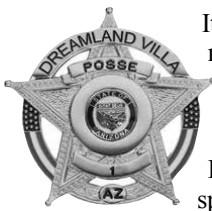
Think about "repurposing or upcycling" items, it will be good for the soul and enable us to bring in a few dollars.

6. Due to the COVID-19, clients may not use the restroom facility at Help Services.

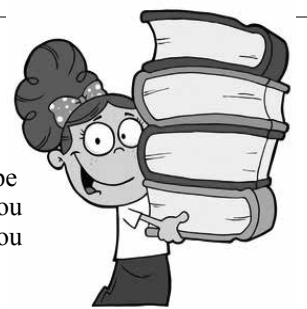

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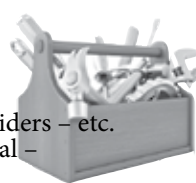

Report Results of the February 11, 2020 Director Election: Jill Holleque, Nominating Committee Co-Chair, read the results of the election held on February 11, 2020. Allees Cohrt, Sandra Eiker, and Johna Sharp were elected to the three open seats. The fourth candidate was Ward Jennings.

Johna thanked Aggie Forsyth and Kathie Wissinger for their service and Allees and Sandra took their seats at the Directors' table.

Nominations for President: Earl Munday nominated Johna Sharp as President. The nomination was seconded. Johna was elected unanimously. Dan Hampton nominated Earl Munday for Vice President. Report of 2019 Annual Audit: Earl made a motion to approve the 2019 Annual Audit Report. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

Budget Adjustments: Dan reported that no adjustments are needed at this time.

General:

Reopening Plan: Johna proposed that we open the pools on May 23, 2020. Please read and observe the rules that are posted on the signage at the pool and on the Dreamland website. Aquacise will not resume at this time.

Earl made a motion to open the pools with regular hours on Saturday, May 23 with posted signs. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

Outdoor activities, Fused Glass, Ceramics, Lapidary, the Wood Shop, Computer Room and Art Room can open on May 25 as determined by the monitors of those activities. Read Hall, the Exercise room, Pool tables, and multi-purpose rooms will remain closed. Potlucks and the coffee social will not resume at this time. Anyone attending open activities must use the pool bathroom facilities, as the Halls will remain closed.

Patty Thorpe announced that Help Services will open on June 1 on Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 9am until 12 noon, with restrictions. Masks are required. You can call

Patty Thorpe, Lou Hoosier or Mike Miller for more information. Their phone number is on the door at Help Services.

DVRC office staff is working from home. Call ahead for an appointment if you need to go into the office.

Earl made a motion to open limited indoor activities with restrictions effective May 25. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously. The Poker room and all card playing activities are to remain closed until further notice.

Library Book sale: The book sale is postponed until further notice.

Committees:

Space reallocation: Johna stated that we will need a committee to determine the future use for the Library building. If anyone is interested in serving on this committee, please contact the office or email the President.

Farnsworth Hall:

Sound System: Three bids were presented for improvements to the sound system in Farnsworth Hall. The improvements are needed to upgrade the antiquated system and increase revenue from future rentals. Earl made a motion to approve up to \$19,000 for the sound system and electrical work for Farnsworth Hall. The motion was seconded and passed with six in favor and one abstention.

Overhead Projector: An updated overhead projector is needed for our annual meeting and would be an asset for future rentals. Johna made a motion to approve purchase of an overhead projector up to \$4000 for Farnsworth Hall. The motion was seconded and passed with six in favor and one abstention.

Fire Suppression System: Rural Fire presented a bid to repair the Fire Suppression System at Farnsworth Hall. Larry will research the situation to determine what is really needed to meet code standards.

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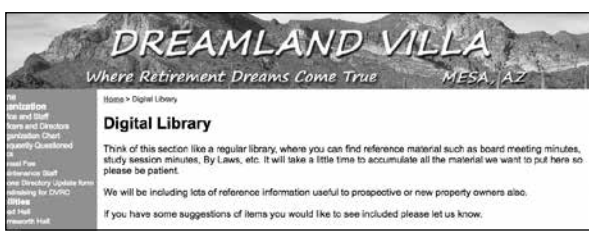
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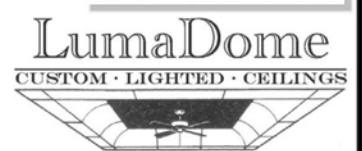
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
