PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Steve Malone, DVRC President

Well, 2024 has arrived. As a tradition, many will be making New Year's resolutions. For me as President of Dreamland Villa, I resolve to continue moving forward with the improvement of our community. My hopes and desires are that all of the residents of Dreamland will work together to uphold our community's values of a clean and special place to live. Most importantly, to maintain our 55+ age restriction.

I will remember 2023 as the year where patience prevailed. Looking at the accomplishments during the year, we have a new Kee card system that works, resulting in no more physical keys to open the gate at Farnsworth Pool. We saw the renovations of the pools; a new heater, roof, and AC unit replacement at Read Hall, and a new pool heater at Farnsworth. In general, I think 2023 was a year of refurbishing Dreamland Villa. The lesson learned from this is that we have to continually maintain our property. We cannot stay penny-wise and dollar-foolish.

Many of you have already renewed your membership fees for 2024 and let me say thank you. Those who have not, please renew before January 31, 2024. Your financial contribution

supports the 55+ and maintains all the amenities that Dreamland provides. Take advantage of this great offer to pay your fees and receive a coupon book to use with our surrounding community merchants. This will help support them and save you money. For those of you who are reluctant to join the Dreamland Villa facilities, I encourage you to provide a donation to retain our age-restricted 55+ community.

Later this month on January 20th at 9:00 am at Farnsworth Hall, the annual Dreamland Villa Membership Meeting will be held. The agenda will include several amendments to the Bylaws. This meeting will also include the presentation of candidates to fill two vacancies on the Dreamland Villa Board of Directors. Each candidate will be allowed to introduce themselves and answer a series of questions from the membership.

The Board of Directors will be requesting that the membership approve the sale of the Butte Street parking lot at the Farnsworth complex. A more detailed explanation for the need to sell this property is in this edition of the Citizen under the title of "Capital Expenditures" written by Ward Jennings, our Treasurer. Please read this article and those from previous Citizen issues and plan on attending the Board Study Session and the regular Board Meeting on the first and second Tuesdays in January.

The proposed amendment to Article XI

Membership and Fees may draw significant interest from the membership. The board is proposing to offer a non-voting Sponsored Associate Membership to Dreamland Villa for those who live outside its boundaries. The Sponsored Associate member means that someone from our community who is a member can sponsor a friend or family member for DVRC membership. The individual must complete an application and be approved by the board for membership. The total number of individuals who may be allowed to have a sponsored membership will be set at 50 per year. Stipulations for membership include; they are non-voting, and they may not hold office as a director, either elected or appointed. They are not entitled to bring guests to any of the Dreamland Villa amenities, activities, or facilities including the swimming pools and hot tubs.

To assist you in preparation for the January 20th meeting you may obtain a voting pamphlet from the office or the dreamlandvilla.org website. This pamphlet will provide you with the intended purpose of the changes as well as the specific language.

ABSENTEE VOTING FOR BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Absentee voting will take place at the DVRC office starting February 5, 2024, running until 4:00 pm February 12, 2024. Except for housebound or bedridden members, absentee



voting must be completed in the DVRC office. Office hours for absentee voting will be from 9:00 am to 1:00 pm, Monday through Friday, except on Monday, February 12, the office will be accessible until 4:00 pm for vote processing.

You must present your Kee card to vote.

A housebound or bedridden member may request an absentee ballot by calling the DVRC office during regular business hours. A member of the Board of Directors or the Board's designee will take an absentee ballot to the member's residence. The member will then complete the ballot, place the ballot

in the provided envelope, and seal the envelope. The Board member or designee will then return the sealed envelope to the DVRC office and place it in the absentee ballot box.

CAPITAL EXPENDITURES

Capital expenditures are repairs, replacements, or remodels costing more than \$2,500 with a useful life estimated to be one or more years.

From January 2015 to March 31, 2018 (39 months), an average of \$63,000 of capital expenditures each year was invested in keeping DVRC's facilities and equipment operational and in good working order.

From April 1, 2018 to July 16, 2022 (50 plus months) DVRC spent less than \$28,000 in total for capital expenditures still in use today, deferring to the second half of 2022 new investments in capital expenditures.

A list of the last 18 months of repairs, replacements, or remodeling costing \$220,000 is attached to the December 31, 2023 financial statements, Digital Library, DreamlandVilla.org. As a result of these capital improvements, money market funds have decreased to \$137,000. (Note: \$205,000 of the money market funds was from non-recurring sources: \$62,000 from the estate of a former member and \$143,000 (after taxes) from the sale of the former library.)

In addition to funding capital expenditures, the money market (capital reserve) funds may be needed to supplement recurring operating revenue if the 2024 annual fee income is not sufficient

to cover DVRC's recurring operating expenses.

The maintenance staff estimates that DVRC will need to spend an additional \$216,000 for capital expenditures over the next five years. (See 2024 Budgets in the Digital Library, DreamlandVilla.

However, DVRC only has \$137,000 available in its money market account. Therefore, the Board of Directors is being proactive by asking the membership to approve the sale of a residential Butte Street lot, with proceeds to be deposited into the money market account. 

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

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
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
