Very few of our Dreamland Villa patrons know that we also have a section of DVDs and VHS tapes. I recently checked out a very good but little known DVD called The Clearing starring Robert Redford, Helen Mirren, and Willem Dafoe. It was suspenseful and surprising until the very end.

Redford is the CEO of a successful car rental company he started many years ago. Mirren is his beautiful but bored wife. Dafoe is a kidnapper. You can guess who gets kidnapped. Guess again! It's Redford.

I found this movie to be very different from the usual kidnap victim versus the bad guy. Dafoe plays a sad soul in a difficult place. His family must move back with their in-laws because he lost his job. He feels empathy for his victim. Redford is not the expected egomaniac. Mirren is immediately surrounded by her children and the FBI but still manages to maintain her calm demeanor. Sometimes I almost expected that she might be behind the whole scheme.

Robert Redford is not the charming con man of The Sting or the outlaw Sundance. He is sixty or more years old in this role and it shows. That doesn't stop him from giving a first rate performance as a man who has finally decided to give his life the joy it has been missing and pay attention to the family who needs him.

Helen Mirren is not quite the same beautiful lady we saw in The Queen. She has the same lonely grace without having the untouchable attitude. In some scenes you see the rowdy Calendar Girl while in others the pain of a neglected wife.

All in all, this movie is quietly eloquent in its own way. A successful man only needs his wife for so long while he is on way up: then she can become unnecessary in many ways. He needs to feel young again. She has to still feel needed. It isn't that they don't still love each other, but after thirty years, well, you know the story.

## **Easy Cooking**

#### **Peach Angel Dessert**

2 tablespoons cornstarch 1 cup water 2 tablespoons corn syrup

1/4 cup peach, apricot, or orange gelatin powder 1 loaf-shaped angel food cake  $(10 - \frac{1}{2})$  ounces

1 package (8 ozs) reduced-fat cream cheese 2/3 cup confectioners' sugar 2 tablespoons fat-free milk

frozen reduced-fat whipped topping, thawed 1 carton (8 ozs) sliced, peeled fresh or frozen unsweetened 3 cups

sliced peaches thawed

In a small saucepan combine sugar and cornstarch. Gradually whisk in water and corn syrup until smooth. Bring to a boil. Cook and stir for 1 – 2 minutes or until thickened. Remove from the heat; stir in gelatin until dissolved. Cool to room temperature, stirring several times.

Cut angel food cake into nine slices. Line an ungreased 13 x 9 Inch dish with the slices; set aside. In a large bowl beat cream cheese and confectioners' sugar until smooth. Gradually beat in milk. Set aside 1/3 cup whipped topping for garnish. Fold remaining whipped topping into cream cheese mixture; spread over cake.

Top with peaches. Pour gelatin mixture over peaches.

Cover and refrigerate for at least four (4) hours. Cut into squares.

Top each piece with about one (1) teaspoon of reserved whipped

Topping. Refrigerate leftovers. Yield: 15 servings.

One piece equals 215 calories, 4 g. fat, 9 mg cholesterol, 157 mg.sodium, 40 g. carbohydrate, 1 g. fiber, 3 g. protein

# Key to Preventing Moldy Berries

Berries are delicious, but they're also kind of delicate. Raspberries in particular, like they can mold before you even get them home from the market. This is more tragic than paying \$4.00 a pint of local raspberries, only to look in the refrigerator the next day and find that fuzzy mold growing on their insides.

With fresh berries available we can tell you how to keep them fresh! Here's a tip I'm sharing on how to prevent them from getting moldy in the first place.

Wash them with vinegar

When you get your berries home, prepare a mixture of one part vinegar (white or apple cider probably works best) and ten parts water. Dump the berries into the mixture and swirl around. Drain, rinse if you want (though the mixture is so diluted you can't taste the

vinegar,) and pop into the refrigerator. The vinegar kills any mold spores that might be on the surface of the fruit, and voila! Raspberries will last a week or more, strawberries go almost two weeks without getting moldy and soft. So go forth and stack up on those pricey little gems, knowing they will stay fresh as long as it takes you to eat them. Enjoy and you're so Berry welcome.

# Arizona Travel Day Trips

Who doesn't like trains? Can't think of many people who are not fascinated by them. We sure are. Since we happened

to have a couple of complimentary passes, we decided to take a ride on one. The Verde Canyon Wilderness Train leaves the station out of Clarkdale, Arizona. It's about 220 miles from Mesa to Clarkdale, so we decided to leave early to be able to stop or wander where we pleased.

The Verde Canyon Railroad is an historic train whose route winds through a scenic canyon from Clarkdale to the ghost ranch of Perkinsville. The canyon is the home to bald eagles and is only accessible by rail. The route runs between two national forests and is adjacent to a designated wilderness area. It is advertised to be "Arizona's longest-running nature show."

It's a bit pricey with rates for senior coach fares at \$49.95 plus tax, but well worth the four hour ride through some beautiful scenery not to mention the thrill of riding on the train. The schedule varies throughout the year so it's best to check the website. For instance, in January and February it only runs on Wednesdays and Saturdays, but on the days it does run, it leaves at 1:00 PM and returns about 5:00 PM.

The ride up I-17 toward Flagstaff was pleasant. The turn off to Cottonwood and Clarkdale is Highway 260 just outside of Camp Verde. Not having been to Camp Verde, we decided to take a little detour into town to check it out. Nice little place, a

retirement home for many.

Not far from the train station we passed through Old Town Cottonwood. I was really excited to see how they had fixed it

Soon we were off on the train ride and enjoying views of mountain cliffs, rivers and eagles. One of the guides said they had seen a black bear with three cubs and a mountain

lion a few weeks ago. There are open cars situated between the regular cars so that Glynn was able to go out and photograph many of the sites along the way. We spotted an eagle in a tree which Glynn was able to get a good shot of. We passed over rivers and saw lots of interesting cliffs with layers of geology that I know nothing of but find interesting. It was a beautiful, comfortable temperature day and riding outside was fun.

Each car has beverage and snack service manned by our tour guide who pointed out various special named rock formations along the way. There is an Elephant Rock and a Godzilla Rock to name a couple. The train goes through one




