The Veterans' Day Program will be held on Monday, November 12, 2012, at 8:00 AM at Farnsworth Hall. Normally, the program is held on November 11, but that is Sunday so it will be celebrated on Monday.

A ceremony of the posting of the military flags which include the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines, Coast Guard and Seabees will be conducted.

The special speaker is Colonel (retired) John S. Brower. Colonel Brower entered the Air Force through Officer Training School in July of 1973 and subsequently became a navigator in C-141 transport aircraft, rising through the ranks.

In 1997 Colonel Brower was selected to occupy the Air Mobility Chair at Air University and serve as a Professor of



Joint Warfare at the Air War College. In his final year at the University, Colonel Brower was selected as the recipient of the Wright Award, as the outstanding instructor at the War College and asked to be personal representative of the Air University Commander to the Headquarter Air Education and Training command. He subsequently served in this role for two years, retiring in July 2002 after 29 years of service. Colonel Brower will speak concerning the changes in the Military Services over the years.

Most recently, Thanksgiving Day in the United States is usually a family affair, complete with sumptuous dinners and happy reunions; however, it is also traditionally a time for serious religious contemplation, church

For those not familiar with what we have in our warehouse for you to use, you should come in and take a look. We have wheelchairs, crutches, even the knee-walker, commodes, toilet risers, bathtub transfer benches, rollaway beds, and even baby beds and high chairs, playpens and even a

few pull toys. We have hospital beds (not electric) that there is a charge for delivering and setting up, which you must set up a time for delivery.

Every Monday morning the nurses and ladies are here to take your blood pressure and keep a record for you. This helps between doctor calls.

Do keep healthy and happy.



Chili Cornbread Casserole

Easy Cooking

- Hamburger, browned, (drained) 1 lb 1/2 cup Chopped Onions Diced tomatoes (do not drain) 1 can Chili beans such as Bush's Chili Beans 2 cans (do not drain) Onion powder ¹/₂ tsp 3 tsps Chili powder Garlic salt 1/2 tsp Salt and pepper 1 cup Shredded cheddar cheese
- Additional cheddar cheese for batt 1/2 cup (optional)

2 packages Jiffy Corn Muffin Mix

Brown hamburger with onion and drain. Add tomato chili beans, and seasonings. Simmer for 15 minutes. F into greased 9x13 pan and sprinkle cheddar cheese on to Mix corn bread mix according to box directions, (I a some cheese to the corn muffin mix before pouring it top.) Pour corn muffin mix on top of the chili and chee cover completely. Bake at 400 degrees for 20 minutes until golden brown.


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Arizona Travel Day Trips "Off We Go into the Wild Blue Yonder

"Off we go into the wild blue yonder, flying high into the sun." Entering the Arizona Commemorative Aviation Museum at Falcon Field on McKellups made me think of the words to the Air Force song. As Glynn and I started our tour of the museum, we were impressed with the friendliness of the volunteers who greeted us.

After paying our \$10 each senior price for entry we walked into a large hanger filled with a variety of planes. The Red Baron – plane caught my eye right away. Brightly colorful and beautifully restored it was a beauty. Planes from before the World War II era through modern day planes are on display.

One of the tour guides was very informative and wellversed in his history and spoke about many of the planes. He introduced us to one of the owners, Billy Walker who owns the Stearman Model 75 Primary Trainer. He graciously let us take his photo by his plane. Many of the planes on display belong to private persons. The museum only owns six planes.

Most significantly on display is the B-17. According to the brochure: "B-17G Sentimental Journey entered service with the CAF in 1978. Arizona Wing members immediately undertook the chores of cleaning, polishing and repainting in WWII markings and honing the ship into excellent mechanical condition. They also initiated extensive crew training so that Sentimental Journey was prepared to fly with the CAF fleet. But even the aircraft's excellent condition wasn't good enough. Without four operational turrets, operational bomb bay doors, navigator and radio operator stations, Norden bomb sight and machine guns, Sentimental Journey was not an authentic Flying Fortress. Most people would have been content to continue the project bit by bit over several years but the Arizonans were eager to complete the restoration of all military systems used on the B-17's during WW II."

Falcon Field, where the museum is located, was once the #4 British Flying Training School during World War II. In fact, several memorabilia displays from Japanese, Nazi, German air forces were inside the hanger. A U.S. World War II uniform belonging to Arizona flyer, Forest "Doggie" Kline, was set up inside one display. From the looks of it he was a small man. Tribute is also paid to the Tuskegee airmen and the women's air force, WASPS organization. I was particularly interested in knowing that, unknown to a lot, women served unrecognized during World War II including some who died in service.

The Stinson L5 E Sentinel or Flying Jeep was a plane used to fly wounded soldiers off the battlefield which had a mock soldier inside to show how it was used. It really was a small plane holding a pilot and barely enough room for the wounded soldier.

According to the website: "On January 14, 1978, at a membership banquet for the newly formed Arizona Wing of the Commemorative Air Force (CAF), Colonel Mike Clarke announced the donation of a B-17G aircraft to the CAF for assignment to the Arizona Wing. A contest was initiated by the local media to name the aircraft, which resulted in more than 800 entries, with the ultimate selection of the name Sentimental Journey. The decision was made to use the most famous pinup picture of World War II for the nose art. Permission was secured from widower Harry James to add Betty Grable in her most tantalizing pose to complete the newly acquired bomber.

In 1985 ground was broken for the wing's first permanent hangar facility. With the new facility, repairs to Sentimental Journey could now be performed inside. The new hangar also started the annual fundraiser "A Night in the 40's Big Band Dance" event and is held each March. Sentimental Journey is on display at the front of hangar for photo opportunities along with other Warbirds. Many of the dance attendees come dressed in the styles of the 40's for the costume and dance contests. The annual dance draws over 1,400 guests."

A number of events are held annually at the museum: Dinner with the Legends - Friday, November 9th 5:30 -8:30PM. Hosted at the Hilton Phoenix East Mesa Hotel (1011 W. Holmes Ave, Mesa), the AZCAF invites you to join us for Dinner with the Legends and your chance to sit and dine with these remarkable people.

Fifth Annual Gathering of Legends - Saturday, November 10th (all day) The "Fifth Annual Gathering of Legends," is the largest gathering of military aviators in the southwestern United States. The event is designed to honor aviators who have participated in U.S. military conflicts during the past 69 years and serves as the museum's Veterans Day celebration. RAF Cadet Memorial - Sunday, November 11th at

10:30AM. On Sunday, November 11th the Commemorative

Air Force Arizona Wing will conduct a memorial service for 23 British Cadets who died during WW II while training at #4 British Flying Training School (today's Falcon Field) in Mesa.

The International Plastic Modelers Society will hold their international gathering in the museum hangar in early November. The event will feature plastic models of aircraft, ships, missiles, spacecraft, figures, automobiles, etc. as well as a model contest. Vendors will offer plastic model kits and other modeling supplies.

Details on upcoming events and the museum can be found at www.azcaf.org. The museum is located on the corner of Greenfield and McKellips. Winter hours are from 9:00 AM 4:00 PM. There is also a volunteer program should you be interested in helping out there.

In the maintenance hangar we were able to see volunteers working on planes and through the open door of the hanger we could see small aircraft landing at the field. A Bear Cat plane first made a low flying pass over the runway just to announce he was here...before coming in for a landing. What a sight. As a person who once longed to learn to fly, I was thrilled with the museum. It's worth the flight in fantasy. See you next month somewhere in Arizona.





of the original grant of the Virginia Company of Plymouth), the Pilgrims decided to establish their colony within the friendly territory.

That initial harsh Massachusetts winter killed approximately one-half of the original 102 colonists. In the following spring of 1621, the Indians, led by two braves named Samoset (of the Wampanoag Tribe) and Squanto (of the Patuxtet Tribe), taught the survivors how to plant corn (called "maize" by the natives) and how to catch alewives (a variety of the herring family) in order that the fish might be used as a fertilizer to growing pumpkins, beans, and other crops. Samsoset and Squanto also instructed the Pilgrims in the arts of hunting and angling. By the summer, despite poor crops of peas, wheat, and barley, a good corn yield was expected and the pumpkin crop was bountiful. In early autumn, for having survived, Governor William Bradford arranged for a harvest festival. Four men were sent "fowling" after ducks and geese. Turkey may or may not have been a part of the forthcoming meal since the term "turkey" was used by the Pilgrims to mean any type of wild fowl.

The festival lasted three days. Massasoit, local sachem or chief of the Wampanoag, together with 90 Indians from the various Eastern Woodlands

Tribes, participated in the ceremony. There can be little double that the majority of the feast was most likely furnished by the indigenous population. It is certain that they provided venison. The remainder of the meat, eaten outdoors around large tables, also probably included fish, berries, boiled pumpkin, watercress, leeks, lobster, dried fruit, clams, wild plums, and cornbread. The celebration of this first New England Thanksgiving is believed to have taken place sometime between September 21 and November

The event, however, was a one-time celebration. It was not repeated the following year, nor was it intended to be an annual festival. It was not until 55 years later that another Thanksgiving Day was officially proclaimed when the Governing Council of Charlestown, Massachusets convened on June 30, 1676, to weigh how to best express thanks for the good fortune that had secured the establishment of their community. By unanimous vote Edward Rawson, the Clerk of the Council, was instructed to announce June 29 as a Day of Thanksgiving. Yet again, this proved to be only a onetime event. In a similar fashion, the Day of Thanksgiving proclaimed in October of 1777 was also not intended to be a perpetual annual observance. Although it marked the first time that all 13 colonies were to join in such a celebration, it was equally a commemoration of the patriotic victory over the British at Saratoga. Nevertheless, over time, the notion of a Thanksgiving Day began to spread to other New

England colonies.

In 1789 President George Washington issued a general proclamation which named November 25 as a Day of National Thanksgiving. Many were opposed to the idea. There was an air of discord among the Colonies and a feeling that the hardships of a handful of Pilgrims hardly warranted a national holiday. In that same year the Protestant Episcopal Church announced that the first Thursday in November would be a standard annual day for giving thanks. Yet, for many years the United States had no regular national Thanksgiving Day, although some states independently observed a yearly Thanksgiving holiday. By 1830 New York had an official state Thanksgiving Day and other northern states quickly followed suit. In 1855 Virginia became the America's first southern sate to adopt the custom.

It was largely due to the efforts of one Sarah Josepha Hale (1788-1879) that America eventually recognized, on a united national level, the feast known as Thanksgiving Day. Editor of Boston Ladies' Magazine and later contributing to

Godey's Lady's Book, Hale dedicated 40 years of her life to a campaign which promoted the establishment of a National Day of Thanksgiving. Hale is credited with persuading Abraham Lincoln to make Thanksgiving a national holiday in the United States. In 1863 President Lincoln decreed that the holiday was to be observed on the last Thursday of every November. Hale, a prolific writer, wrote the famous children's poem, Mary Had a Little Lamb.

For the 75 years, which followed, each President in office formally proclaimed that Thanksgiving Day should be celebrated on that last Thursday, but in 1939 President Franklin D. Roosevelt set it for one week earlier. The President's reason for this change was that he wanted to help businesses by lengthening the shopping period prior to Christmas. Public uproar against this decision caused the celebration of Thanksgiving to be moved back to its original date two years later. In 1941 it was finally deemed an observation of Thanksgiving Day and that it would be a legal federal holiday.

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

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


