



Now, I borrow one and do appreciate it. I wish there was an easier way of getting them in and out of the car, like they have on the backs of cars for the scooter, etc.


Weren't the rains nice? I was in a hard rain after the bad dust storm and got my car washed for free! It was a nice surprise for me. Someone commented on how clean my car was, when so many cars around us were really dirty. Nature does a lot of nice things as well as bad.

I read where we have a lot of new people that purchased houses in Dreamland Villa this summer. I hope that you all will come in and visit us at Help Services, at 5210 East University near the Gerber Furniture Store at Higley and University streets. Our warehouse is full of so many things to help in sicknesses and after knee, hip or ankle surgeries. We now have knee-walkers for after ankle and foot surgery recoveries, besides the different kinds of walkers and canes and even the wheelchairs. We also have the lightweight ones, the glider chairs, that you can use to push someone around at the zoo, the big swap meet and places that they might not be able to do all the walking around ----visiting people or maybe your spouse. People can go places that they might miss out in. We also have things for when babies come for a visit like baby beds, strollers, high chairs, playpens, potty chairs, even pull toys, and so much more. We have hospital beds (not electric) but nice and sheets for them. There are so many things that you may need so come in and look around to see what all we have for your use. There is no

cost, except what you may care to give as a donation for the use of what you use. We have always strictly worked from donations. An exception is when you use the hospital beds. They have to be delivered and set up by our men and there is a small charge for the delivery and set-up. We also have rollaway beds for when company comes. We also have air mattresses that some use on the floor for kids who are visiting.

"Music Is the Language of the Soul"

Would you know what a pipa is? What a frog scraper is? Where would you find an Ud, a Shegbureh, a Kangoma, or a Jabawai in the same building? Even heard of them? Well, neither had I. But there is a place to see and hear them. The Musical Instrument Museum (MIM) that's where. Here you will find over 10,000 musical instruments from all over the world in one location.

What a fascinating place! It is amazing how many different, interesting musical instruments there are in the world. No matter what country, what color, creed, religion there is, people all over seem to find a way to make music. No wonder music is the language of the soul.



The museum is really an all day trip or two just in itself. Divided by regions of the world there are twelve plus rooms full of instruments. Instruments from Africa, Middle East, Central and South Asia, Southeast Asia, Oceania, Latin

America, Europe, the United States and Canada are on display. There are a large variety of drums, lutes, flutes, guitars, and more. The people in these various countries used what was available to them from their environment and lands to create a variety of sounds to celebrate events, accompany rituals or just plain entertainment. It was amazing to think of how many variations of the same type of instrument were created by different people.

created by different people. As the brochure says, "Travel the world of music in MIM's five geographical Galleries. State-of-the-art audio and video recordings allow you to hear and see the creative spirit of people from every country in the world as they play their instruments. Attend a traditional Beijing opera. Celebrate a contemporary Ukrainian wedding. Pulse to the rhythm of Nigerian drums. And let the good times roll with Cajun zydeco."

When you come into the museum, after you pay your \$13 (for seniors) fee, you are given earphones so you can actually hear samples of the music from each country. Start out with the orientation video in the Orientation Gallery behind the guest services desk and then move on to the various rooms to view their displays. We started upstairs first touring the Africa, Middle East and all the Asian rooms. Then we moved on the Oceania and Latin American rooms. By this time I was pooped. Within these rooms each country had typical musical instrument and in some areas costumes and masks were on display. Videos in each area also gave you a taste of the people who played them and danced to their native music.

By the time we had finished these rooms we had walked ourselves OUT. Too tired to go further we missed the United States/Canada room and Europe room. We also missed the downstairs displays. While we went in on one afternoon, it is an all day event if you started out when they open and stayed until they closed. You might see it all in that case (maybe). For us, we will go back another day to catch what we missed. It's well worth it.

The museum also has a café, a gift shop, and a room for experiencing various musical instruments, as well as

the Mechanical Music Gallery and Artist Gallery. In the Artist Gallery the piano that John Lennon used to compose the song, "Imagine," is on display. There is also a Music Theatre with a full schedule of concerts throughout the year. The Target Gallery hosts special and traveling exhibits. The Conservation Lab provides an opportunity to see instruments being restored and preserved. If you like to volunteer, the museum has a program and is a great way to get involved.



It is considered the most extraordinary museum you will ever hear. Even Tony Bennett said, "MIM is my favorite museum in the world. Everyone needs to see it."

The museum is located on the southwest corner of Tatum Blvd and Mayo Blvd. Head up the I-101 north, exit on Tatum to the south and it's just a short distance from the freeway. There's plenty of parking and a short walk to the entrance.

That's it for this month...I'd highly recommend a visit to this museum if you have never been there. Next month we will see you someplace else in Arizona. Welcome back, neighbors.
