We recently partnered with Sunshine Acres Childcare's Home to assist them with funding through textile recycling. Phoenix Fibers is a textile recycling company located in Chandler. They will collect and recycle fibers. This is similar to our program for recycling paper. The fibers are used to make "GREEN" insulation. Every item gets a second use before entering the landfill, and no textiles are exported.

The Recycle Bin is located on the north parking lot near the DVCC Library. You may place:

- -all clothing, new, old, damaged
- -all linens including sheets
- -all towels
- -all types of shoes

For other large items such as televisions, furniture, appliances, electronics, antiques and kitchenware you may call to schedule a donation pickup at 480-981-4141.


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and other books can be found on the shelves on the north wall of the office. If you have a loved one that you would like memorialized, you can make a donation and fill out the information about them and their name will be in that book.

cheer everybody else up," by Mark Twain







Welcome New Residents

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

Arizona Travel Day Trips "Chili in the Pines"

One thing that's a must to do in the summer in Arizona when it's so hot is to try to go someplace once in a while to cool off. So when I learned that there would be a Chili Cook Off event in Pinetop Lakeside, I suggested to Glynn that we go. It was also happening on our wedding anniversary so we thought it would be a fun thing to do to celebrate... get outta town.

We left early in the morning and took Highway 60 east through Superior, Miami and Globe. We have spent a little time looking around Globe and like the town. Lots of people are starting to retire there and with housing prices pretty low; at this time there are some bargains to be had. It's an old historic mining town with lots of Victorian houses, cute cottages along with the newer construction type of homes. The Cobre Valley Center for the Arts in town features the work of local artists. Antique stores and the Salado Indian Ruins at Besh-Ba-Gowah Archeological Park are a few of the sites to see.

As we pass through this area we see interesting cliff rock formations that would delight any photographer's eye. Driving east out of Globe the landscapes turns to hills and shrub brush and low trees. And then... we come to the Salt River Canyon area. The breath taking winding road takes you down the deep canyon and then winds

its way up again to the other side. You pass through tall pine forestlands before reaching Show Low. As we passed through this area I was reminded of the Rodeo Chedski fire that raged near this area back in 2002. It was nice to see new growth and thriving vegetation.

Show Low is just a bit north of Pinetop Lakeside where our final destination was. It's a small community and home to many who have summer cabins in the many developments. It's big enough to have a Home Depot across the street from Lowes. There are plenty of RV resorts, cabins, businesses, restaurants and antique stores here, too.

The Chili Cook Off was sponsored by the Charlie Cook's Restaurant and held in the orchard park area behind the restaurant. This was their 14th annual cookoff. Chili chefs and aficionados from a number of states were in attendance. Booths were scattered throughout the park with different versions of chili. As we entered we paid an entrance fee of \$4.00 and were given a cup, a spoon and a voting card. The idea is to stop by each booth where you are given a small dipper of chili to taste. Then you eat it all and head on to the next booth you want to try. All in all we probably tried about eight different chili dishes.... most all very good. There was only one that had too much of a tomato taste and was too thick that I didn't care for much.

Once you have eaten all the chili you can or want, you place your voting card at the booth you liked the best. A few crafts people were present. The area has a bandstand and country western music added to the fun, carnival-like atmosphere. Proceeds from the event benefit a local charitable organization. The event attracted a large crowd, and we enjoyed our time there.

Luckily for us we have a relative with a cabin who let us stay with her for the night, but there are lots of cabins, and other accommodations that can be had for sleeping if you wish to stay.

For our anniversary dinner we decided to try out the local Thai food restaurant called the American Thai. It was dee..licious! I would recommend it to anyone who likes Asian food. The cook is from Thailand and she is married to an American who met her in Thailand. Wet Paint

"Tips for Painting with Acrylics"

Last month I gave some tips for painting in oils. Here are a few tips for those who would like to paint with acrylics. The tips come from <u>www.painting.about.com</u> website:

Acrylics are extremely versatile, fast-drying paints, and can be used straight from the tube like oils or thinned with water or a medium and used like watercolors. And a lot inbetween. Here are a few tips to help you get started painting with acrylics.

Tip 1: Keeping Acrylic Paints Workable

Because acrylics dry so fast, squeeze only a little paint out of a tube at a time. If you're using a 'normal' plastic palette invest in a spray bottle so you can spray a fine mist over the paint regularly to keep it moist, and thus usable. 'Staywet' palettes – where the paint sits on a sheet of wax paper place on top of a damp piece of watercolor paper – eliminate the need to do this, but generally don't have a hole for your thumb so are more awkward to hold in your hand.

Tip 2: Blot your Brushes

Keep a piece of paper towel or cloth next to your water jar and get into the habit of wiping your brushes on it every time you rinse them. This prevents water drops running down the ferrule and onto your painting, making blotches.

Tip 3: Opaque or Transparent Colors

If applied thickly – either straight from the tube or with very little water added – or if mixed with a little titanium white, all acrylic colors can be opaque. If diluted, they can be used like watercolors or for airbrushing.

Tip 4: Acrylic vs Watercolor Washes

When an acrylic wash dries, it's permanent and, unlike a watercolour wash, is insoluble and can be over-painted without fear of disturbing the existing wash. The colors of subsequent washes mix optically with the earlier ones. A watercolor glaze can be lifted out using water and a cloth.

Tip 5: Think Thin When Thinking Glazes

If you want transparent glazes, these should be built up in thin layers, so the colors beneath show through. Use the brush to spread the paint out thinly across the surface.

Tip 6: Împrove Flow Without Losing Color

To increase the flow of a color with minimal loss of color strength, use flow-improver medium rather than just water. **Tip 7: Blending**

Because acrylics dry rapidly, you need to work fast if you wish to blend colors. If you're working on paper, dampening the paper will increase your working time.

Tip 8: Hard Edges

Masking tape can be put onto and removed from dried acrylic paint without damaging an existing layer. This makes it easy to produce a hard or sharp edge. Make sure the edges of the tape are stuck down firmly and don't paint too thickly on the edges, otherwise you won't get a clean line when you lift it.

Tip 9: Washing-up Liquid with Masking Fluid

Masking fluid or frisket can be used with acrylics washes, as well as with watercolors. Be sure it's completely dry before you paint over it, and don't paint too thickly over it or you'll have to scratch away the paint to get to the masking fluid. Masking fluid will work on paper and canvas, but do try it out first before using it in a painting to get a feel for it. Once masking fluid has dried in a brush, it's nearly impossible to remove. Dipping a brush into some washing-up liquid first makes it easier to wash masking fluid out of a brush.

Tip 10: Using Acrylic Paint as a Glue for Collage

Provided it's used fairly thickly and the item to be stuck isn't too heavy, acrylic paint will work as a glue in a collage. Simply apply some to the surface, like you would glue.

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
