### Forty Years of Help Services


Part 1 – It's Time to Celebrate

Forty years ago this month Help Services loaned out its first piece of health care equipment. Since then, the organization has grown and today loans out, annually on a cost free basis, over 1,500 pieces of sick room and health care equipment to some 700 individual residents of Dreamland Villa and Velda Rose Estates. That may sound impressive but we have only scratched the surface. Over 85% of the residents of these two communities have yet to take advantage of the services Help Services has to offer. That is why Help Services is hosting a

Each and every resident of Dreamland Villa and Velda Rose Estates is an automatic member of Help Services. All staff and the members of the Board of Directors are members, volunteers from the two communities.

September arrived, and soon many of the residents who have spent time in other areas of the country will start returning, and Dreamland Villa will take on the vibrant pattern active activities it is famous throughout the

winter and spring. We remind everyone that you are invited to our regular Board meeting in October on the second Tuesday of the month. We appreciate your input and participation.

This summer our maintenance crew has been very busy with normal upkeep and repairs required to maintain the high quality of our facilities. All three swimming pools have been drained and acid washed and the pool filters have been cleaned and replaced. Our residents enjoy our beautiful pools year-round, and we appreciate your patience when we need to close a pool for a short period of time for maintenance. The large floor at Farnsworth Hall was stripped and re-waxed to keep it beautiful. We hold so many activities at Farnsworth Hall including weddings, dances, sports activities, dinners, talent shows, etc. that keeping this facility in good condition is a big job. This summer the roof at Farnsworth Hall had to be repaired as well as some of the seven air-conditioning units. The floors at Read Hall and in the ceramics area will also be stripped and re-waxed prior to October. These are also heavily used areas. In addition, the palm trees around our facilities have been trimmed and maintained. Three lower roofs at Farnsworth Hall have been replaced and are now in top condition.

Some effort has been put forth to upgrade and beautify our pool areas by adding some artificial plants and new touches of landscaping. This fall new indoor-outdoor carpet was added at the Farnsworth pool facility and at the new John's Villa outdoor patio that will be opening at the Read Hall pool. We ask that food and drinks be kept confined to the restaurant patio area and not be brought out onto the pool lounge areas. This fall a major painting and repair effort will be undertaken to spruce up our main buildings and pool areas as well. In addition, our back flow and emergency sprinkler fire systems have been tested by Metro Fire Equipment to insure their proper function and working conditions. We are pleased to report that our local sheriff's posse members are doing a wonderful job of patrolling the home areas and neighborhoods and have found no significant crime problems. It is such a comfort to know that we are in a protected area with local law protection 24 hours a day. We thank the posse for their dedicated service.

Please be aware that in October our office will resume its normal operating hours from 8:00 AM – 12:00 Noon and 1:00 - 4:00 PM in the afternoon. Jackie and Irene will be happy to greet you and answer questions. They do a tremendous job of keeping track of expenses, handling special requests and emergency situations, and just making sure that things run smoothly from day to day. We welcome those who are returning and thank all of our year-round residents for the way you pitch in and help and the way you support the fun facilities and activities at Dreamland Villa Community Club. We tip our hat to Boy Scout Troop 755 for the special Eagle Scout project that they completed on our Nature Trail area. I will tell you more about this in the October newsletter.

It has been a full active summer and will be an even more exciting and eventful time in the months ahead. Get involved and enjoy living as a part of this great facility!

#### The Road to Grace

by Richard Paul Evans

The Road to Grace is the third in a series of four books about the journey Alan Christoffersen began two days after his wife's funeral. His wife, McKale, had been thrown off a horse, broken her back and some time later died of complications

During McKale's illness, Alan had stayed home to care for her. Alan soon discovers that in his absence, his business partner has stolen his clients and he is forced into bankruptcy. Alan soon lost his home in Seattle and his car as well as his business and his friend. For some reason he decided to set out on a walk to the farthest thing he could see on a map that he could walk to: Key West, Florida.

In The Road to Grace, the third book in the series we join Alan in Custer, South Dakota. On his back he carries a pack with a sleeping bag, a few clothes, a supply of water and a little food. His aim is to walk twenty miles every day. Some days he stays in a motel or hotel. Some days, far from the nearest town, especially in the west, he camps out finding shelter where he can. Occasionally he spends the night with a local resident that he gets to know in a grocery or convenience store.

Along the way, Alan is occasionally delayed by people and events. His wife's estranged mother stalks him in high heels and a dress for several days, nearly killing herself in an effort to explain herself and seek the "grace" of forgiveness from him, her only link to her dead daughter. Near Mitchell, South Dakota, Alan becomes dizzy and collapses beside the road. He is rescued by an elderly Jewish man, an Halocaust survivor. After a visit to the emergency room, Alan recuperates under the care of Mr. Leszek and learns about forgiveness. There he decides he must forgive his former business partner.

A few days later, Alan encounters a group of Red Hat Ladies at the hotel where he is spending the night. He meets a number of interesting people in Iowa and Missouri where he enjoys the small towns off the freeway. From a tramp named Israel he learned the difference between hobo and tramp. In Hannibal, Missouri, Alan goes on a ghost tour and from an elderly man who has been looking for his dead wife for forty years, he learns about the bitterness that comes from refusing to accept that loss.

Near St. Louis, Missouri, Alan again falls ill, collapses beside the road and wakens in a hospital bed. He has been admitted, his former secretary is beside his bed, and his father has been called. X-Rays reveal a brain tumor. Talk about a cliff hanger! I want to read the other three.



### Easy Cooking

#### MARSALA CHICKEN – Serves 4 people


Chicken, 8 skinless, boneless thighs, cut thighs in half. (Breast may be used, but thighs are better choice.) Flour chicken and brown on both sides. Do not try to cook complexly. Spread in pan and while hot sprinkle with Marsala Wine - be generous, may also use a little in the Sauce, assuming you have not been nipping while cooking!

Sauce Preparation: 3 cups of Chicken broth 1 can of Mushroom Soup 1 cup of chopped onions 1 cup of diced mushrooms

Cook until onions and mushrooms are done.

Option: ½ cup Mozzarella shredded cheese may be added to sauce at this time.

Place chicken in baking dish, pour sauce over chicken, and bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes and serve over rice.

### Arizona Day Trips

**Butterfly Wonderland**

There's a new attraction in town...Butterfly Wonderland in Scottsdale. It opened in June this year and is already attracting a lot of visitors.

The \$18.30 per person senior entry fee is a bit steep but well worth it. After purchasing our tickets getting our ticket scanned and hand stamped, we proceeded into the building just in time to be seated for the 3-D movie.

It was a beautiful show about the life of the monarch butterfly, Dana, named for her botanical name,"danaus plexippus". Dana is first shown as a caterpillar who lays her eggs on a milk weed plant in Texas. Dana's daughter hatches and grows from a caterpillar, to form a chrysalis in which she becomes the next generation butterfly. She mates, and lays her eggs further north in the U.S. The next generation, Dana's granddaughter, then flies further north and seeks out milk weed to mate and lay her eggs.

This generation, Dana's great granddaughter, also hatches, repeats the process to become a butterfly, but there is a difference. This fourth generation is a much stronger butterfly and has the instinct to take the long, long flight south to the next breeding ground in southern Mexico to wait out the winters of the north. Her generation of monarchs will then fly back to the north to begin the process all over again. Monarch butterflies go through four stages during one life cycle, and through four generations in one year. There is a more detailed story of their lives and migration at www. monarch-butterfly.com. The 3-D movie is one of the best experiences of this attraction. At times you could swear the butterflies were going to fly right into your face.

After the movie we moved into an "emergence gallery" room. Behind glass, there were a good 30-40 different



chrysalis pods hanging and waiting to hatch. Inside were a few hatched butterflies in varying sizes and types.

Once we had finished with this room, we were let into an anti-room where the guides cautioned us not to touch the butterflies and to watch where we put our feet. We were allowed into the butterfly atrium and what a treat! It seems many butterflies will land on the sidewalks and are easily stepped on. Sure enough right after we went into the

room, we saw where someone had not been watching. It was quickly taken away by one of the butterfly guardians.

It felt like a rainforest! There were water misters spewing mist and the humidity was quit high. But the butterflies were prolific. Everywhere you looked they were flying around, eating at special designed stands of fruit and juice soaked fabrics and on the flowers. Flowers, plants, a small koi pond with waterfall adorned the area. There was even a butterfly shaped bench, which of course, everyone wanted to have their picture taken on. To me the prettiest and most abundant butterfly was the Morpho peleides or Blue Morpho which is a


neotropical butterfly. Its bright blue wings were spectacular.

After we had seen all the butterflies and taken all the photos we wanted, we then moved on into the Butterfly Café for a snack lunch. From there in the next room are exhibits of ant and bee colonies behind glass as well as a few desert critters. The displays were quite small and not that active or

The next room to visit is a small aquarium featuring fresh water fish from the Amazon. Most of them were very small but beautiful colors. In the center is a petting pool with small stingrays that you can touch if they come up to the top of the water. Last but not least, is the gift shop. Lots of pretty things featuring ... guess what? Butterflies, of course.

Children were everywhere. This is a fun place to take visiting grandchildren; however, if they are not interested in the movie as one little boy sitting next to me at the theater was, they can voice their displeasure very vocally. So, if you prefer fewer disturbances you might want to go during the week. The Butterfly Wonderland is open seven days a week. More information about it can be found at www.butterflywonderland.com. Annual memberships are available and special discounts for members are too. To get there from Mesa take the 101 north to Via de Ventura (exit 43), turn right onto Via de Ventura and you can't miss the building. It stands out in the middle of the Pima-Maricopa Indian Community,... there are no other buildings around it.
