### Revised DVCC Bylaws

Earlier this year the Board asked the Bylaws and Rules Committee to review the Club's Bylaws in their entirety and to recommend changes. Over this past summer the Committee did just that. The Club's Bylaws were originally adopted in the early 1960s. Over the years since then they have been modified, added to, and deleted from over 280 times. That's an average of a little over three changes per year. That, in and of itself, is not a bad average. But when you look at when many of the modifications were made, you find that over 85% occurred during the late 1970s and early 1980s, and after 2005. That raises the number of changes to around 18 per year. That's a lot, and could even be considered excessive. Of the 45 sections contained in the original

Bylaws, only five remain unchanged after 50+ years. It is obvious, when the current Bylaws are reviewed, there has not been much attention given to the placement of like issues in relation to each other; nor has there been, in a number of cases, care given to ensure changes were clear and concise and were not in conflict with other sections. Many of the sections in the current Bylaws were revised with little or no attempt to ensure that the changes made reflected not only the concern or need that prompted the change, but that the latest standards, laws, etc., were minimally considered for inclusion in the modification.

The document the Committee has developed reflects correction of the problems outlined above, as well as the recommended changes the Committee has received; a review of the Arizona Revised Statutes and other applicable government laws and ordinances to ensure our Bylaws address all issues Bylaws for an Arizona non-profit corporation are expected to address; a review of current Bylaws format standards, and a review of existing sections for their continued appropriateness, completeness and clarity.

The proposed revision to the Bylaws will be on the agenda at the October Study Session and the Board of Directors meeting for review and endorsement. Because the Bylaws affect the overall operation and management of the Club, once the Board endorses the document it will be presented to the general membership for adoption. It's too early in the overall process to set a date for such a meeting of the general membership. However, once we are ready to present the revised Bylaws to the membership, it will be extremely important for as many voting members as possible to attend the meeting.

Additionally, the Bylaws and Rules Committee has proposed a Code of Ethics for the Board members. This Code will also be presented to the Board in October for their review and endorsement and then will be presented to the general membership for adoption, along with the revised Bylaws.

Look for future articles in the *Citizen* for the progress of these two projects as they move forward. Copies of both documents will be made available to the membership once the Board has completed their review.

### The President's Message

Board's rules and regulations by creating a committee on their own, without Board approval, to submit to the State of Arizona an Application for a Bingo License and by opening a checking account at the National Bank of Arizona using Dreamland Villa Community Club's tax EIN number without permission from the Board. The State of Arizona Department of Revenue Bingo Section has denied the Application for a Bingo License, due to discrepancies identified in the application. A copy of the letter from the State of Arizona Department of Revenue is printed in this October Citizen.

I believe that part of the problem has been that some new people on the Board have not taken the time to become familiar with the rules and regulations of the Board and seem to have a personal agenda which certainly does not represent being a team player. One of the questions I asked every candidate at the Meet the Candidates meeting on January 13, 2015, was "Do you feel you can work with the existing Board and be a team player?" Right now we have many things in

our warehouse that can be of use to help you recover from an injury or just make life a little easier. One of the most impressive things that I discovered at Help Services is Bob Bla1ock's work area. It's neat as a pin and, of course, every little thing is in its place. If you stop and borrow something, take a look at his neat shop while in the office.

By the way, if you ever get anything that has something wrong with it, stop what you are doing and bring it right back. Bob will fix it or you will be given another one. If you keep something out for a long time and it needs repairing, bring it in. Bob has the knowledge and the right parts and tools to fix it.

I don't mean to be redundant, but we have the following medical equipment and other things available to you just for the asking: wheelchairs (several kinds and sizes). Here's a true story that I would like to share with you this month. You know the statement above where I say "several kinds and sizes"? I really mean it! Last winter when my wife and I were helping out one Tuesday morning, a lady came in wanting to borrow a wheelchair. So the other monitor and I took her back to where we keep the chairs. She commented as we headed back to that department that she

doubted we would have what she needed. We pulled out a couple of chairs and the third chair was just what she was looking for - an extra wide one. A grin from ear to ear slowly appeared across her face. The moral of the story is, if you need it, we might just have it, or a close facsimile!

Now back to the job that I'm highly paid for. We have hospital beds, commodes, toilet risers (with and without hand rails), knee-walkers that fold, canes of different kinds (some quads, some folding, etc.), crutches and C-walkers. Hold the phone! Stop right here! I know we have C-walkers and plenty of them-more than we can use as loners, so if it works for you good folks, we would like to donate a

C-walker to someone to keep. If this sounds like something you would like to keep permanently or you know of someone who needs one out of the Dreamland Villa and Velda Rose Estates area, stop in and check with anyone in the office or any of the board



members. I'm working up a sweat here trying to get through this article. No more interruptions. We also have items for when the grandbabies visit, like baby beds, playpens, strollers, booster seats, highchairs and pull toys, etc. It's fun stuff for the little guys while visiting Grandma and Grandpa! Most anything you can think of, we have! So come in, take a look around, have a cup of coffee and maybe a cookie with the office folks and check out the inventory.

When I was a kid one of my favorite classes in school was history. I found the history of how Help Services got started, so I would like to share this with you in the monthly Help Services article. I am quoting now from the history found in the Citizen on our website. "The idea of a service organization designed to help people in need of expensive healthcare equipment was conceived by Fred Larsen in the early 1970s. A committee of community residents was formed to pursue the idea, resulting in September 1973 with the establishment of Help Services as a non-profit corporation. It was during that same month that Help Services loaned its first piece of equipment." Today, we currently have some 92 categories of loan equipment in inventory, which accounts for over 1,400 individual items. On an average, nearly 800 of these items are out on loan at any given time. Annually, over 1,500 pieces of equipment are checked out and returned by just under 1,100 clients. That amounts to a savings in healthcare costs of over \$75,000 per year. In the application itself, on line 8, the officers are listed as officers of the "Bingo Board". That is not a recognized organization potentially applying for the license. The "Bingo Board" is not part of a legal entity. Some of the officers listed are not included on the DVCC Website or the Arizona Cororation Commission Website which identifies the qualified organization and its board.

It appears that a sub-group of members including some board members of DVCC have attempted to preempt the authority of the Board of Directors to apply for the Class B license. I believe my instructions to Carol Cooper via e-mail dated May 28, 2015, were clear in that the Bingo function would be under the approval and direction of the DVCC Board of Directors.

Possible corrective measures would include the approval of the bona fide Board of Directors of DVCC. At that time, they may submit an ammended license application to this department with the required corrections and bearing the signature of the President of the Board of Directors, Paricia A. Thorpe. Upon receipt, this department can issue the license.

A second option would be consideration of a Class A license which is primarily for recreational purposes and does not have organizational or membership requirements. The negative aspect is that the games could only be open to residents of Dreamland Villa and the restrictions on the gross receipts.

A Class A license is allowed to take in gross receipts of \$15,600 each year which represents an average of \$300 per week if a weekly occasion is held.

At this time, the license application will remain in a pending state until a resolution is agreed upon.

The Girl on the Train

The Girl on the Train is Paula Hawkins' first thriller, and what a read it is. A word of caution to the reader. It is important to pay close attention to the name and the date of each chapter heading. Being somewhat of a speed reader/ skimmer, I missed that clue trying to figure out what was going on until I stepped back and started again. Then I got it.

In online synopsis and reviews, *The Girl on the Train* is compared to *Gone Girl* and *The Silent Wife* of recent years, and Alfred Hitchcock's 1954 thriller, *Rear Window*. This might lead one to believe it is a "can't put it down" book. It is.

For the last few months, Rachel has ridden the train into London and back every day in an attempt to hide her unemployment and growing dependency on alcohol from her roommate of two years. Her roommate, a long time best friend, has taken her in out of pity when Rachel's marriage dissolved. The ride on the train takes Rachel past her former home every day and she frequently sees a couple who would have been her neighbors on their terrace at breakfast. Soon, Rachel makes up names for them (Jason and Jess) and spins a happily ever after type of life for them.

In the meantime, Rachel's ex-husband has remarried and had a child. Anne, the new wife and mother, becomes hysterical and contacts the police when Rachel, in her alcohol induced haze, repeatedly phones and emails Tom, her exhusband. Rachel continues to ride the train daily, spending time at the library, parks and pubs until it is time to go back to her friend's flat, where she frequently arrives with at least a mild alcoholic buzz on. Reading the news on the train one day, Rachel connects the missing girl in the news with her fictional couple and finds out their names are really Megan and Scott. Vague memories of the evening Megan disappeared begin to emerge from Rachel's clouded mind. The lives of Tom and Anne, Megan and Scott and Rachel become closely intertwined as Rachel attempts to help the police solve the mystery of Megan's disappearance and death. The suspense builds as more and more details of the relationships of these two couples and their past come out - definitely a page-turner.

### Frozen Pumpkin Gingersnap Dessert

- 2 C. canned pumpkin 1 C. sugar
- 1 tsp. salt
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> tsp. ginger
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- $\frac{1}{2}$  tsp. nutmeg
- 1 C. chopped pecans <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> Gal. vanilla ice cream (softened)
- 36 2" gingersnap cookies
- Small container of Cool Whip

Place a single layer of gingersnaps on the bottom of a 9x13 dish. Mix together: pumpkin, sugar, salt, ginger, cinnamon, nutmeg and pecans. Fold in softened ice cream. Attorney General's office. She will speak on "Consumer Scams."
