Proposed Changes to By-Laws

The Board of DVRC is planning on submitting proposed changes to the By-Laws to the General Membership at the annual meeting on January 11, 2020 at 10:00 am at Farnsworth Hall. Those changes affect three By-Laws;

- Deleting the requirement for Bonding of DVRC financial persons as our insurance covers that issue.
- Changing the requirement to appoint the nominating committee in October by at least November to allow more time to get volunteers for this com-
- Clarifying the Length of time that newly elected board members will serve so that there will be less turnover of board members and more carryover of experienced board members from year to year.

Safety Tips from The Dreamland Villa Posse


Please do not park on the sidewalk! Many of our residents get around using walkers, scooters or chairs. Vehicles up on the sidewalk make it difficult for them to able pass.

This notice was delivered to houses on Colby and Decatur Streets that back up to the Nature Walk.

IMPORTANT NOTICE REGARDING NATURE WALK

Tuesday, October 22nd, representatives from Dreamland Villa and Velda Rose Estates met with two Federal employees from Western Area Power Administration (WAPA) about over grown vegetation along our Nature Walk. WAPA is responsible for the high-power lines that run down the center of the Nature Walk owned by Dreamland Villa Retirement Community and Velda Rose Estates.

WAPA apologized for letting this area grow to the extent that it has. This is a safety issue and needs to be taken care of ASAP.

Major removal by WAPA of vegetation in this area is planned and will begin around the second week of November. They are sensitive to the feelings of the community, as well as adjacent home owners. They will work with us after the project is complete to plant low clearance vegetation in areas that seem bare after the process.

There will be an outside contractor doing the removal of the vegeta-

tion. They will not begin work before 7:00 am and will remove and dispose of all vegetation they cut.

Please do not disturb these workers, they have a job to do.

Any questions you have may be directed to the office and they will contact me if necessary. There will be no cost to the developments of Dreamland Villa Retirement Community or Velda Rose Estates for any of this work.

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





Learn To Bead Class And Make Envelopes




