THE POSSE CORNER

I sincerely hope that the people of Dreamland Villa take the time to read this, as it directly affects our community. As you know, in January of this year, Sheriff Paul Penzone very publicly suspended the MCSO Posse Program. His reasons were stated as being inconsistent training and incomplete hiring procedures. Even though each member of our posse did all the training the Sheriff's Office required and have served our community and the people of Maricopa County well for many years, we were also caught in this blatant attempt to dismantle the posse. At present there is only one person in Dreamland Villa Posse cleared to patrol. Many of our other members got tired of waiting and resigned, some are waiting for MCSO to finish their paperwork, or in the case of one of our most highly trained members, with over 35 years on the police department in Canada, was told that he was ineligible to patrol our community as he's done for years.

Many other communities find themselves in similar circumstances and are fed up with the lack of patrolling on their streets. Posses, including Sun City, Sun City West and Sun Lakes have disassociated themselves with MCSO and are patrolling their communities as private citizens in cars that no longer reflect the Sheriff's Office, but as a security organization. Their members are still volunteers, and rely on the generosity of their communities with a once a year fund drive, as our posse has done for years. With those funds, they maintain their vehicles, provide uniforms, pay for their own gas, pay for the training for their members, pay for their insurances, and maintain their equipment. In order for Dreamland Villa Sheriff's Posse to become Dreamland Villa Posse, there would need to be a consensus of approval among the residents in Dreamland Villa. To that end we are having an informational meeting where the details would be shared and ideas exchanged. The date will be June 12, 2019 at Read Hall at 11:30 am. We hope to have another meeting in the fall in

order to include more of our winter residents. Please plan on attending.

Let me be clear on this. The Sheriff's Posse will never be the same again. In the past you've enjoyed having your houses checked while you're away, your streets patrolled frequently, and have retained a sense of security other than the occasional MCSO deputy wandering though Dreamland Villa, your choices are limited. You may 1) pay for a full-time security company to do this, 2) go without security or 3) do what the previously mentioned communities have done. Please think about what you'd like to do, and plan on attending the meeting. There's no guarantee that we'll get back the members we've lost. However, it should hopefully make it easier to get new members with perhaps a week of formal training, then in-house training. Otherwise, it may take 6 months, or more, of waiting to get MCSO acceptance, then at least 3 months of training before they even step into a car!

Our equipment is on a loan-free basis. Roll Call: Kathie Chismar, Secretary. Present were Kathie Wissinger, Larry Thoma, Earl Munday, Johna Sharp, Dan Hampton, Aggie Forsyth and Kathie Chismar. A quorum was present.

Ratification of Minutes: A motion was made to approve the minutes of the April 10, 2019 Board Meeting Minutes, and the May 1, 2019 Study Session Meeting Minutes. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

April 2019 Treasurer's Report: Dan Hampton, Treasurer. Dan presented a new format for the monthly budget report. This will be posted on the bulletin board and in the Citizen.

Members may request a copy of the detailed report from the office.

He reviewed adjustments to the budget based on our experience from January through the end of April. A motion was made to accept the Budget Adjustments for May 2019. The motion was seconded. The motion was passed unanimously.

Administrative Services Report: Jack Babb, Administrative Services Manager. A copy of the report is available in the office.

Standing Committee Reports: Copies of reports, if available, are on file in the office.

Sheriff's Posse Report: Cliff Gagnon reported on the status of the Maricopa County Sheriff's Posse. He presented

the possibility of creating an independent Dreamland Villa Posse that would be independent of the County and independent of DVRC. This will be similar to groups currently forming in Sun City and Sun City West. It would be funded completely by donations. He has submitted an article for the June Citizen and plans to hold a meeting on June 12 in Read Hall at 1130 a.m. Another meeting will be held in October. They will be looking for volunteers. Please attend a meeting if possible, to get more information.

Contracts: Marantha Church Contract: A motion was made to accept the Lease Agreement with Marantha Community Church. The motion was seconded and passed unanimously.

New Business: No new business.

Old Business:

Security Cameras: Larry Thoma reported that Leroy is collecting information on costs and options. He will have more time in the off-season for the project.

Pool Signage: Earl Munday presented new sign-in sheets and suggestions for new 3' x 4' posted signs. Suggestions were made for

improved verbiage. Jim Dougherty offered to work with Earl to obtain new posted signs or to work with the signs currently posted.

Aquacise is held at the Read Pool at 8:30 a.m. as of May 1.

60th Anniversary Celebration: Jim Seaman presented suggestions for a 3-day celebration of Dreamland's 60th Anniversary in 2021. He suggested several events over Friday, Saturday and Sunday in late February or early March 2021. Among the suggestions:

A rummage sale and car show with the clubs presenting displays inside Farnsworth; a bocce ball tournament; a poker run; concerts at the Farnsworth Bandshell; casino night; a booklet with ads documenting Dreamland's history. We need to contact sponsors to assist with financing the celebration. He stressed the importance of publicizing the events with flyers in the Citizen and mailings.

We need volunteers for these events. We need someone to schedule a meeting so that we can form committees to start planning for this event.

New Business:

Financial/ Budget Review: Dan will meet with Jack to review the financial data from January through the end of April to make appropriate adjustments to the budget.

Personnel: Kathie Wissinger suggested that the Personnel Committee should realign the review dates for all employees so that the reviews would be held in the off season. The committee will meet all standard review dates for new employees and will be sure that no one has a review too soon or too late during the alignment period, but once they are aligned, the annual reviews will be standardized.

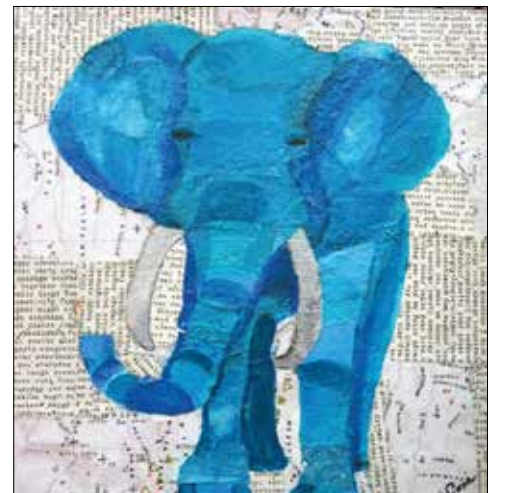
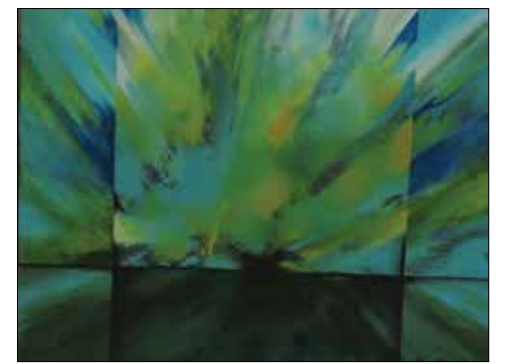
Wet Paint

Terri Tiehen, the club secretary volunteers to write Newsletters for the computer club and you can find current copies of it in the office. The following article was researched and written by Terri for the Newsletter a couple of years ago, but it is still an issue to consider, even today.



“Digital Assistant Devices, commonly called Personal Digital Assistants (PDA’s), include the Amazon Echo and Goggle Home. These are essentially mobile devices that function as personal information managers and are common on handheld devices. You have them on your mobile phones, on your computers and tablets (e.g. Siri, Hey Cortana, OK Google and Windows 10). But now they are available as separate, external Bluetooth speakers that can be placed virtually anywhere in your home, or take it with you on the go.

When a person speaks to a PDA, the device will do what you ask it to do, such as play a favorite song, provide information, deliver news and sports scores, state the weather, make lists and calendar appointments, control your smart home and even order products among other things!

Amazon makes the Echo, the Echo Dot, the Echo Tap and the Amazon Fire TV, while Google now has a similar device called Google Home. Just how do they work? These devices record information and temporarily store the recordings, sending them to cloud servers for processing.

Because PDA’s can be used to provide reminders for such things as taking your medication and keeping appointments, their benefits can be well worth the investment.” -- Terri Tiehen
