#### President's Message

For those of you who don't participate in the daily coming and goings at the Dreamland Villa Retirement Community facilities, please join us. And, if you are not attending the monthly Board meetings or study sessions, you need to. They are held the first and second Wednesday of each month from October through May. Our last meetings before we break for the summer will be held on May 5th and 12th in Read Hall at 6:30pm.

Bring your kee card and come find out what's really going on in Dreamland.

I am extending this invitation because the survival of DVRC is up to all of us. While we are maintaining our financial obligations and are bringing in enough revenue to keep our facilities operating, we need to think about DVRC's long-term future. My goals have always been focused on rejuvenating Dreamland and bringing its office procedures and programs current with today's times. A strong base of operations and accurate reporting is essential for running any business, and we cannot keep operating in the same manner as we have. Times have

changed and so have the demographics of Dreamland Villa.

Let's look at what has changed. Dreamland's housing market has exploded. Prices for homes in Dreamland are now in the mid to upper two hundred thousand. There aren't enough homes on the market to meet the demand of purchasers. Developers are buying up and renovating our homes and selling them for major profits. Most of the apartment complexes surrounding Dreamland have been sold, and rental rates are increasing. Property management companies that once supported DVRC by paying the annual fee may no longer do so. We'll find out more this next year. Gentrification is taking place right now.

What is gentrification you ask? It is the process of urban development wherein a neighborhood or part of a city is developed in a short period of time, marked by inflated home prices and displacement of the original residents.

What does this mean for DVRC? It means that we need to start thinking about how we can engage the next generation of residents. We must upgrade our facilities, and we must provide the activities and events that will appeal to them. We cannot continue to operate in the same manner as we have. We must change with the times because those that do not change will get left behind.

I know many of you purchased in Dreamland because it is agerestricted and the fee is low, but residents that don't use our facilities feel they don't have to pay. We want to keep our senior citizen overlay and we want our facilities here when you retire, so you must support us now. We need your support, and not just financially. We need business savvy, computer literate, forward thinking people to help us; because a united community is necessary to keep DVRC financially secure. We need your input, your ideas, and your involvement.

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#### DON'T DO IT!



Please DO NOT TOUCH any of the equipment or valves in any of the pool areas. Recently after hours, someone turned on the pool water at our Farnsworth facility, flooding the area. Had the water been unable to escape the area, it could have ruined the new floor in the hall. They then shut off the water

to the entire building, which caused the spa heater to overheat and warp the heat pump mechanism. This costs DVRC unexpected expenses and forces us to close the pools.

Also, please **DO NOT TOUCH** the poles, nets or life preservers, or the nozzles in and around the pool. This equipment is required for us to keep our pool permit and keep our pools open. These items are not toys and must be replaced when broken. Someone recently broke a nozzle that pumps cool water into the Farnsworth pool which now must be cut out and replaced. The cool water is needed to keep the pools from getting too warm during hot temperature days. Do not mess with them! DVRC appreciates your cooperation.

# Swimming Pools and Hot Tub

Our Dreamland Office continues to get complaints about activity at the pools that goes against the rules. We are a community, so let's all play together nicely! If everyone follows the rules, it can be a pleasurable experience for everyone to enjoy. The rules are posted at each location, so please familiarize yourself with them. Read Pools: 7:30 AM to 10:00 PM Farnsworth Pools: 7:30 AM to 10:00 PM

Use your Kee card for entry and be sure to **SIGN IN!** 

#### Rules for Swimming Pools and Hot Tubs/Spas (collectively "Pools")

- 1. Only Members and their guests are permitted to use the Pool facilities. It is the Member's responsibility to instruct their guests on the Pool rules and to accompany them to and remain with them while at a Pool.
- 2. All persons using the Pool facilities must shower before entering Pools. Water-soluble sunscreen may be applied, so long as it is applied at least 45 to 60 minutes before entering the Pool area.
- 3. Children that are not toilet trained are not permitted in Pools. Children (up to age 16) must be accompanied by a Member at least 18 years of age or older. Children may only use toys in the Pools that cannot be sucked into the vacuum system and clog the filters and valves. The hours that children (up to age 16) may use the pools are: Read Hall Complex Pools 10:00 am to 1:00 pm only Farnsworth Hall Complex Pools 11:00 am to 1:00 pm and 5:00 pm to 6:00 pm
- 4. Running, diving, or horseplay is not permitted. The use of small inflatable items and noodles may be used provided they do not interfere with other swimmers.
- 5. Only standard swimwear is allowed.
- 6. Persons with open cuts, sores, rashes or wearing adhesive bandages are not permitted in the Pools.
- 7. Eating or drinking is not permitted in any Pool area except in designated areas. Absolutely no glass containers are permitted in Pool areas.
- 8. Smoking in Pool areas, dressing rooms and showers is not permitted.
- 9. Individuals under the age of 18 are not permitted to use the hot tubs (spas).
- 10. No scooters or bicycles are permitted within a Pool area. Please use the bicycle racks provided outside the gated pool area.
- 11. No portion of any Pool equipment may be used for anything other than the intended purpose. By way of clarification and not of limitation, no person shall be permitted to use the metal railings and ladders in Pools for any purpose other than for the entry or exit from the related Pool. (This includes, but is not limited to a prohibition on using the metal railings and ladders for exercise purposes.) Moreover, no person shall situate himself or herself in a Pool so as to impede or interfere with anyone entering or exiting a Pool from an intended entry or exit point.
- 12. Animals, except for service dogs, are not allowed in the pool area at any time.

There are no lifeguards on duty. To swim alone is dangerous. Swim at your own risk and enjoy yourself, but please be considerate of other people.



Just Mercy by Bryan Stevenson

This is a really interesting book that in a lot of ways made me really mad and also really sad. It's a true story about the injustice in our judicial system, especially against black and poor people. I was surprised at how recently this has gone on and probably still is to a very large extent.

Bryan is a lawyer who founded the Equal Justice Initiative, a legal practice dedicated to defending the poor, the wrongly condemned and those trapped in the furthest reaches of our criminal justice system. One of his first cases was that of Walter McMillian, a young man sentenced to die for a notorious murder he didn't commit. His story was featured on 60 Minutes a program that I watch every week on Sunday nights.

Some of the quotes that really moved me were: "The opposite of poverty is not wealth, the opposite of poverty is justice," and "The true measure of our character is how we treat the poor, the disfavored, the accused, the incarcerated, the condemned," and "The power of just mercy is that it belongs to the undeserving. It's when mercy is least expected that it's most potent, strong enough to break the cycle of victimization and victim hood, retribution and suffering.

A really moving book that leaves the reader with a lot to think about.



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

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
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
