They anxiously await the letter with this information that has been sent from Calcutta, but it never arrives. They have to have a name for the birth certificate, so they name him Gogol, the last name of the father's favorite author. That's where the title Namesake comes from. Gogol hates his name because it is so different from all the other kids' names in school and they have trouble pronouncing it etc. When he is old enough, he goes and has it changed to Nikolai, which is the first name of this same author. The book follows the lives of the parents and Gogol. I learned more about the culture of India which was interesting. POSSE CORNER

This month's edition of the Posse Corner deals with a sensitive subject for us all. Wildlife creatures are in our neighborhoods and around our homes more often than we realize. Coyotes, gray foxes, snakes and Gila Monsters are part of our desert landscape and considered predators. Javelinas are also present in many areas as they forage for food. Many of you are unaware these animals are protected under Arizona State laws. Whether we like it or not, you can't take action to poison or otherwise harm them. Please advise your neighbors of this should they indicate a desire to poison, trap or harm desert wildlife in and around our community. Contact the county or city authorities as needed when you have a predator issue around your home.

City of Mesa Animal Control 480-644-2268

Unfortunately, domestic animals are targeted by predators as food. Please keep your pets safe from harm by whatever means you have at your disposal. Avoid confronting predators directly and report the incident if you feel threatened. If you find dead animal remains on public streets or utility strips, call these agencies listed above to take care of the problem. But if a dead animal is on private property the responsibility falls to the owner to resolve. When you discover the remains on the nature trail, please contact the DVRC office or the DVRC Posse to investigate and resolve. As a patrol officer I would look for tags or license info on the animal remains and make an attempt to contact the owner. Ultimately, I will bag the remains and follow posse protocols to dispose of them.

Our winter visitors will soon prepare to return to their alternate homes for the summer. The new "House Check" form is available at the Posse office, in a gray box by the Posse office door across from the DVRC Main office. Please fill out the form and drop it into the black mail box to the left of the forms box. The Posse looks forward to watching over your residence while you are way. Short or long term, we will keep an eye on things while you are gone. There is no charge for our

House Check service.

TIME FOR A TWO-LEVEL MEMBERSHIP

Proposal by: Steve Malone

Do people living in Dreamland Villa have the feeling there are two groups of residents, those who are members that enjoy the activities and amenities that the community offers and those who are non-members? It is time to change this division because everyone living in Dreamland is a vital part of this community! We all need to participate in maintaining our community as a clean, safe, welcoming place to live.

As a fairly new member of the Dreamland Villa community, it has taken me some time to start to understand the workings of our retirement community. I have come to learn, that many of our residents are younger, not of retirement age or continue to work by choice. This certainly has changed the dynamics of Dreamland Villa.

In addition, our social lifestyle has changed drastically with the explosion of technology. Just think how the cell phone has changed how we communicate with one another. We do not even talk on the phone anymore, we text. I know you have seen a family in a restaurant, and everyone is on their phone doing something other than communicating with each other.

This has led us to lessen our personal contact with others. We are not comfortable with face-to-face contact. But let us not forget our last two years of covid that has really changed our lifestyles.

So how do these things effect Dreamland?

Put simply, the membership of Dreamland Villa Retirement Community is declining. The membership has al-

ways provided for the administration and verification of the 55+age-restricted community status, kept the Non-Profit status with the IRS, maintained the facilities, activities, entertainment, clubs, and amenities. These things cost money which comes from membership dues.

So how can we shore up the cost of running Dreamland Villa? Is the answer recruiting new members?

Many of our residents do not want to pay the membership fees because they do not use the facilities such as the "pools," and this is understandable.

My understanding of this mind set leads me to look for other avenues to encourage participation by all residents in our community. I think everyone living in Dreamland Villa is proud of our community. Just look at how well our homes are kept. This a great community and I know we all want to keep it that way. One of the best ways to do this is by ensuring that we maintain the 55+Age restricted community status.

My approach to achieve this is to have everyone contribute to the cost of 55+age status process. I know many of you have been making donations to Dreamland for this purpose and we thank you.

I would like to propose another option to encourage more of our residents to contribute. By establishing another level of Dreamland Villa membership, which I call Residential Membership. It works like this: every dwelling in Dreamland would be a member and would be asked to pay dues for their residence for the support of the 55+age restricted commu-

nity status. The amount of the fee would be based upon the cost to administer the Program. The fees will be based upon office cost, times the percentage of time the Office spends on the program. In the first year of this new membership, we will have to project the number of the 3,000 dwellings in Dreamland Villa that will become Residential members. I understand that we cannot require membership.

The Residential Members would be able to cast one vote per dwelling on issues that the Board of Directors designate as 55+age restricted community voting issues at the Annual Meeting.

The current members that support Dreamland Villa's operations and facilities will be Identified as Active Individual members and will continue to provide for Dreamland's financial support. Active Individual membership will retain all the current benefits offered by Dreamland Villa through its facilities, activities, entertainment, clubs, amenities, and organizational privileges found in our By Laws.

I understand that not everyone will want to support Dreamland Villa, but I hope you will. I want to see us build on our community camaraderie and foster community spirit; it can happen with everyone's help. Seeing all of us on our front porches greeting neighbors in the evening will give us all a growing sense of pride.

This effort will take time so stay tuned and please provide me with your thoughts or concerns.

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
