Veteran's Day November 11th, 2022 "Is Freedom Free"

I chose the topic of "Is Freedom Free" specifically because I think many people in our country are taking freedom for granted. They have no idea what it takes to maintain it. They do not think of the men and women in our Armed Forces who serve our country, not just in times of war, but each day.

I would venture to say that most of you in this room do not take our freedoms for granted, however, we need to remain on guard as freedom is elusive.

Although many of us have done our part in the fight for freedom, that fight does not end when we take off the uniform. We must continue our duty to maintain our right to freedom. Our duty now is to pass on our knowledge and wisdom to our children and grandchildren, that this precious thing called "freedom" takes effort, dedication, vigilance, and support.

Our wisdom provides us with the knowledge that differing views can be allowed to be expressed, because of the freedom of speech granted in this country. Words are free but it is how they are used that can cost us. In many other countries, differing views

are not allowed and in many cases dealt with severely

We must continue to be diligent so that our freedoms are not eroded away slowly over time. Our job is not to determine what is right or wrong in someone's speech or action. We are to ensure they have the right to speak and participate in actions conducted within the legal boundaries.

Why is it that mankind goes to war with one another? I think the answer is simple, one side wants the other to do something the other side does not want to do. They are threatening their freedoms. You would think in this day and age we would have enough common sense to know that nothing good comes from war for either side. Normally, the thoughts and feelings of both sides become hardened and impenetrable, and nobody will listen or compromise to solve the problems.

We can certainly see this today in the conflicts in Ukraine and Russia. One side is trying to take the freedom of another, for what? It is not my intention to get into a political debate here but our country itself is going through some of these same concerns.

For many of the veterans in this room, our service was either mandated by the government through a draft system or we volunteered of our own free will. In my case, I heard the message from our government that we were fighting to prevent the spread of communism in South Vietnam. I am not sure that I understood the price that would be paid for the right to freedom. To this day, I still question our presence, but a soldier's duty is to comply with orders and that is what we did.

Those on the front lines bearing the burden of freedom have changed dramatically over the last 30 years. The individual service person today is a volunteer professional military soldier.

To illustrate this, during the Vietnam War 8.7 million men and women served in that conflict with 47,434 paying the ultimate price. Our most recent wars in Iraq and Afghanistan have seen 192,000 and 775,000 total forces with 4507 and 2461 deaths.

What we do not see in these numbers is how many of these individuals served 1,2,3 and more tours of duty. In my mind, it is incomprehensible to think of the toll this has taken on these men and women. These veterans have repeatedly put themselves in harm's way over and over again.

I can only imagine the horrors that they have seen. The reason I have addressed this subject is fewer and fewer people are willing to offer themselves in the fight to retain freedom. I think if you ask any one of these veterans the question "Is Freedom Free," you will see the answer in their faces.

So, on Veterans Day, the day for those who survived war, let me say thank you to all of you. Thank you to our families; the mothers, fathers, brothers, sisters, husbands, wives, and children, who paid the ultimate price at home worrying about the unknown. The phone call or someone knocking on the door telling them their loved one has been wounded or passed.

How can we express our gratitude to all the veterans? My simple answer is to remember there is a big price to pay for freedom. Cherish this country as it is the land of the free and the home of the brave.

The world is watching! God bless America.

Anthony Pagano Filed Another Lawsuit

Anthony Pagano, a former DVRC Board of Directors President and member, filed another lawsuit, dated November 3, 2022 CV2022-094844, which was served on DVRC's Board of Directors President Steve Malone on November 8, 2022. The lawsuit demands that DVRC rescind Pagano's two-year membership suspension.

On November 7, 2022, the Superior Court denied Pagano's request for Preliminary

At its November 8, 2022 Board of Directors meeting, President Malone was authorized to retain legal counsel to respond to the meritless lawsuit.

It was an easy read and really interesting. I highly recommend it.





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






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FROM THE BOARD

BOARD MEETING November 8, 2022

Welcome: Steve Malone, President

Pledge of Allegiance

Call to Order: at 9:30 a.m. by President Malone,

General Announcements: Steve mentioned the forthcoming Veterans Day program.

Roll Call: Ward Jennings, Secretary. Present were Directors Joyce Canino, Patti Hanks, Steve Malone, John Pawloski, Sr. and Ward Jennings.

Ratification of Minutes: The Directors unanimously ratified the corrected October 11, 2022 Board Meeting Minutes and the November 1, 2022 Study Session Minutes.

Treasurer's Report: Ward Jennings, Treasurer. Ward mentioned that 57 fewer households paid the \$400 transfer fee than paid the \$150 escrow fee. That reduced DVRC's revenue by \$22,800.

Office Manager and Standing Committee Reports: Office Manager, Policy and Procedures Committee and Coordinators for Maintenance, Compliance and Sales and Marketing provided reports.

OLD BUSINESS:

Tabled were appointments for Committee Chairs and Coordinators.

Tabled were discussions on the revisions to the Policy and Procedure: Annual and Initial Membership Fees Transfer Fees – Defined, amended 1/15/2022 and Annual and Initial Membership Transfer Fees. Amended 1/15/2022. The Policy and Procedure Committee is determining whether the two policies may be combined into one Policy.

The Directors unanimously approved a motion to be presented to the Membership for their vote at the January 28, 2023 Annual Membership Meeting: Former directors Anthony Pagano and Johna Sharp shall have their memberships suspended until they make restitution for the \$105,124.14 legal fees they caused DVRC and its members to be billed. (\$54,896.22 of the legal fees has NOT yet been paid).

NEW BUSINESS:

Website: The Directors unanimously approved a motion to request the Website Committee Chair and/or the webmaster, not later than Wednesday, November 9, 2022, to move the minutes in the 2022 Recall link to the correct location in the dreamlandvilla.org website's Digital Library section Membership Meeting Minutes (includes Annual) and Board Meeting Minutes and REMOVE the 2022 RECALL link.

Lawsuit: Anthony Pagano has filed a lawsuit against Dreamland Villa Retirement Community and DVRC's President, Steve Malone, served just before the start of this meeting, demanding to have his DVRC membership restored. The Directors unanimously agreed to authorize President Malone to forward the lawsuit to the corporate attorney, if he deems appropriate.

Members' comments: The meeting's attendees felt it would be appropriate to provide Anthony Pagano another hearing, open to ALL members. Other attendees asked why Pagano would show up at his next hearing when he failed to show up at his last hearing. Pagano once again violated DVRC's governing documents when he filed a lawsuit against DVRC, a breach of the By Laws, Article XI, Section 8.

Read Hall Parking Lot Resealing: A \$10,000 proposal has been received to reseal and stripe the parking lots on both the north and south side of Read Hall. Four Directors voted yes to proceed. Joyce voted no expressing concern that the forthcoming costs to repair the Read Hall pools were of a greater importance than the parking lot.

Open Forum Comments: The City of Mesa's legal department is working on a right-of-way easement to access their sewer lines located between 64th St and Recker Rd. 40 feet of their sewer line is located on DVRC's portion of the Nature Walk.

Adjournment at 11:10 a.m.

FOOTNOTES

The traditional October 31, 2022 year-to-date Profit and Loss Statement and detailed Balance Sheet may be found on the Dreamland Villa Retirement Community website: DreamlandVilla.org, Digital Library, Financial Reports. The font size is too small to read when five pages of financial statements are printed in the *Citizen*.

Income Taxes:

At 12/31/2021, \$52,500, had been accrued and reported on the Balance Sheet, Accrued Income Taxes Payable, account 2200. The related expense reduced 2021's Total Equity. In October 2022 the actual 2021 taxes were paid to the IRS (\$31,863 including \$699 in late payment penalties) and to the Arizona Department of Revenue (\$7,321), for a total of \$39,184. The unpaid amount of the 2021 Accrued Income Taxes Payable reduced the 2022 Profit and Loss Statement's Income Tax Expenses, Account 5501.1, by \$13,316.

\$12,920 in 2022 Estimated IRS Taxes (Form 990-T) were also paid in October 2022. This resulted in the Profit and Loss Statement's Income Tax Expense account (5501.1) has a credit balance of \$396 (\$13,316 accrued in 2021 less the \$12,920 paid for 2022.)

Depreciation Expense and Accumulated Depreciation:

The CPA firm preparing the 2021 Income Tax returns recommended DVRC record Depreciation Expense as reported on the 2021 Tax Return. This resulted in increasing Accumulated Depreciation: Buildings, Balance Sheet account, 1170, by \$46,140 and reducing the 2021 Total Equity, account 3030, by the same amount.

Buildings and Accumulated Depreciation:

The sale of the DVRC-owned building at 5502 E Butte Street resulted in CPA a recommended \$40,000 reduction in the Balance Sheet's Buildings, account 1120, and an increase to the Accumulated Depreciation - Buildings, account 1170, by the same amount.

The Balance Sheet amounts for accounts 2201, *Building Remodeling Restricted*, \$2,574.31; 2403.4, *Funds – From Library*, \$2,612.91; and 2408, *Kitchen (Restricted)* \$9.546.06 were transferred to the Profit and Loss Statement's account 4003, Donations – Unrestricted.

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

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
