#### **BOOK REVIEW**

This Tender Land by William Kent Krueger

Another book I couldn't put down. This story is set in 1932 during the depression when a lot of people are struggling. Odie, who is 12, and his older brother Albert, who is 16, are orphans. Although they are white, they are sent to an Indian school in southern Minnesota. It is NOT a nice place. The couple who run it and some of their workers are cruel to the children. There is one teacher, Mrs. Frost, who is kind and she has a young daughter Emmy who the boys befriend. Also in the story is Mose who is an Indian boy whose tongue was cut out after his parents were killed. Mrs. Frost is killed in a tornado, her husband had died a few years before her. These 4 children run away and the book is about their adventures, as told by Odie, as they canoe down the rivers looking for safety, a place to belong and peace. The people they encounter, some good, some bad, are very interesting. Each child has a different dream, but together they are a family and really look out for each other. There are lots of twists and turns in the story. A lot of surprises but a real feeling of how the magnificent American landscape connects us all, haunts our dreams and makes us whole.

I highly recommend this book. This is the first time I have recommended a second book by an author. This is quite different from most of Krueger's books but well worth the read.

#### Why Pay the Annual Fee? Dreamland Villa's 55+ Status

Keeping Dreamland Villa an age restricted community requires a concerted effort by DVRC's office staff. Eighty-five percent of one staff member's time is spent researching and updating the records that are required by Maricopa County to confirm our compliance with the Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and Housing for Older Person's Act (HOPA) regulations. Compliance means retaining a notarized Age Affidavit for each home within the Dreamland Villa subdivision.

Each year Maricopa County requires that DVRC complete a verification of this compliance. HOPA requires that we re-survey our residents every two years to ensure that 80% of our community's homes are occupied by residents who are 55 years of age or older. The regulations are that one person residing in the residence must be at least 55 and no one 18 years or younger can live in the home for longer than 90 consecutive days. There are special circumstances that allow for exceptions to this rule, but they must apply for a permit with Maricopa County. Residents should report violations to the office to ensure that we remain compliant with the HOPA regulations. Violations are reported anonymously to Maricopa County.

In 2021 there were over 600 homes that did not fill out Age Verification Affidavits. Part of the process is keeping track of houses put up for sale. Our staff receives a report of MLS real estate listings on a regular basis. If a realtor lists a Dreamland home and does not state that it is in a 55+ community or that there are no fees involved, they contact the realtor to get the MLS listing corrected. They also provide the title company with the DVRC Age Verification Affidavit stating that it must be signed and notarized at the time of sale. If the form is not returned, our staff must track it down or contact the new owner to get one. If the home is sold by owner or deeded to a relative, then staff must track down that information and obtain the proper documentation.

Reports must be run regularly because our compliance numbers can drop below 80% in just two months.

Our database tracks the age verification dates and when the two-year date expires, additional research is needed to find out if the home is still owned by the same person or persons. Research includes a search of Maricopa County records to find out if there is an ownership change. And, if needed, a background check is conducted to see if at least one occupant is 55 or older. If the new occupant cannot be identified and there is no response to staff inquiries, then the home is no longer compliant. This is a problem.

We need to know that you're still living in Dreamland Villa. When annual fee notices are mailed out, an Age Verification form is included. If you choose not to support DVRC, you need only input your name and date of birth on the paper and return it to the office. If you support DVRC you can pay your annual fee online at www.Dreamlandvilla.org or return the form to the office along with your payment. Please note that only the current year's form and the original notarized affidavits are kept on file. All other verification docu-

ments are shredded and discarded.

A large portion of our annual income is spent on personnel expenses. Staffing is required to maintain our compliance requirements as well as perform bookkeeping and maintenance responsibilities. DVRC cannot operate without your financial support. When you pay the annual fee of \$190, you are not "joining" DVRC or joining a club. You are paying to support the staff required to maintain your community's facilities and to retain your community's age-restricted status. As a bonus, you get access to the pools, activities, and official meetings. You need to provide your financial support if you want to keep Dreamland Villa a senior citizen community for the enjoyment of all its residents. If DVRC is not able to support itself, your facilities will erode, and the processes and programs required to retain our compliance will not be maintained. Even if our facilities are sold off, staffing and computer programs will still be required if we want to stay in compliance with the 55+ Status. Don't wait until it's too late. Support your community today.

#### January 8, Town Hall Meeting Take-Away

Overwhelmingly the 160 residents who attended the Town Hall Meeting want Dreamland Villa to remain a 55+ age-restricted Community. Of those attendees, 139 had paid 2021 and/or 2022 annual fees.

The following are the take-away points from the meeting's attendees and the surveys completed at the meeting.

\$100 was the most frequent annual amount attendees suggested as a contribution to keep our Community 55+ agerestricted.

The Affidavit should be on a form separate from the Annual Fees renewal form.

One "membership" should be offered to those supporting our Community's 55+ Age-Restriction and a different "membership" offered those who wish to use the facilities and activities.

- Payment plan options should be better defined and communicated. Attendees said they would be better able to pay the annual fee if "installment payments" were available.
- Advise renters of the activities offered by DVRC.
- Suggested more aggressive action be taken to get owners of rental properties to provide financial support to DVRC, suggesting rents be increased \$15 per month so renters could be offered a kee card.

- Rent out DVRC spaces, such as the parking lot.
- Inform residents of the DVRC activities available in the summer and offer more evening activities.
- Keep the office open more hours, Monday through Friday from at least 9 am to 1 pm AND one night at week.
- Additional observations:
- The existential threat to the future of our Community is its declining financial support from our Community's residents. The question, "How do we increase the residents' financial support for DVRC?" was not answered.
- The 160 attendees who attended the meeting was an excellent turnout! And exceeded the 100 Agendas and Surveys that were provided. Poor planning on my part.






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
