#### Counting Coup by Kelli Donley

This book is set here in Arizona and is about the Indian schools and how terribly they treated the Indian children. I really didn't know much about this and found it interesting. It's a really good book, easy to read, and well-written. It is mostly about Alma Jean and her sister Birdie who grew up in the 1950s in Kearney Nebraska. I found that interesting because I go

thru Kearney twice a year coming down here from Minnesota. Their dad is gone most of the time and their mom tries to keep the family together but isn't succeeding very well. The sisters find out from their pastor that they are about to lose their home because their dad hadn't paid the rent. They are sent to Arizona to make enough money to send home to their mom so she can keep her home, and end up working in the Indian schools, one here in Phoenix and one in Winslow. They thought they were going to a regular school. This is the second book I have read in the

last 2 months that made me really mad at what our government did to people. In 2010, Avery, Alma Jean's granddaughter, gets a call about Birdie and finds out that she is the one totally responsible for her care. This starts a journey that brings lots of surprises, some good, some bad. Some love is thrown in but mostly it's about discovering a past the sisters had never ever talked about to anyone. Toward the very end of the book counting coup is explained. I really enjoyed this book, and highly recommend it.

## Feeding Our Feathered Friends

## VILLA'S 55+ STATUS Phyllis Maynard

As many of us enjoy watching the local birds, it is nice to attract them with a feeder. The difficulty with feeding is it may be attracting the type of creatures we may not wish to see. Pigeons in particular can be considered a nuisance, and though Dreamland Villa is not Mesa City property, we should be considerate of the laws prohibiting their feeding in the city of Mesa. Another character attracted to birdseed is our local rat population. At this time of year, rats love the citrus, just as we do, however, seeds and nuts are their yearround fare.

Please consider what type of offering you put out to discourage these guests. Change to Thistle seed, and use a hanging feeder with a guard to only allow the little birds like finches, lovebirds, and sparrows close to the supply. The little birds scatter enough to feed the doves and quail. If you notice pigeons have come to dine, try not filling your feeder for several days until they move on. With the recent rain we have had, the birds have many natural sources of feed. Putting a guard on the hanger can keep rats out of the supply, and picking up fallen citrus reduces their access.

Keeping wildlife from becoming dependent on humanprovided feed is a great way to keep them WILD.
