

Community Age Restrictions

To keep its 55+ age-restricted status, Dreamland Villa must comply with the governmental regulations including the August 4, 1980 Maricopa County Senior Citizen Zoning Ordinance Z34-80. This Ordinance restricts how the homes in Dreamland Villa may be used.

The Dreamland Villa Office must maintain records documenting who owns and occupies each dwelling unit in our Community's 18 Sections. The DVRC Office staff has now identified a number of homes that have under-aged occupants, a problem caused in part by the real estate community's failure to properly disclose our Community's unique characteristics.

If you are selling your home or know of someone wishing to buy a home in our Community, please contact the DVRC Office at (480) 832-3461 for the names of the PREFERRED REALTORS who DO KNOW and DISCLOSE the unique characteristics of our Community.

The DVRC Office staff has contacted every Realtor and Broker who have active listings in our Community, ensuring that they know of the unique characteristics that keep our Community agerestricted. In addition, the Office staff has contacted the Corporate offices of every title company actively working in Maricopa County, informing them that buyers and their Realtors may NOT "OPT-OUT" of submitting the required paperwork at closing - disclosing who the buyers are and whether

the dwelling unit shall be owneroccupied or a rental.

The DVRC Office staff is aggressively updating the Verification of Age/Occupancy Affidavits to show that Dreamland Villa is in compliance with the governmental requirements to keep our Community's age-restricted status.

Thank you to all the Dreamland Villa residents who have paid their 2023 annual fees or made a special contribution to support the 55+ Compliance processes.

If you are one of those residents who live in our Community and returned your Affidavit without contributing financially to maintain our 55+ status, please reconsider. It's not too late to send in \$100 to help keep our Community's agerestriction status.

Book Review



Call to Order: at 9:30 a.m. by President Malone

Read Hall parking lot reseal is scheduled for Saturday, December 17 and Sunday, December 18, 2022. Revisions to the Farnsworth Hall lease with T2 Presents, LLC have stalled and shall be revisited in early 2023. The metal roof fabrication and installation in the Read Hall swimming pool area has been delayed, in part by weather. The work should still be finished this month

Roll Call: Ward Jennings, Secretary. Present were Directors Joyce Canino, Patti Hanks, Steve Malone, John Pawloski, Sr. and Ward Jennings. A quorum was present

Ratification of Minutes: The Directors unanimously ratified the November 8, 2022 Board Meeting Minutes and December 6, 2022 Study Session Minutes and accepted the December 3, 2022 Special Membership Meeting minutes.

The Directors unanimously approved submitting the proposed revised By Law changes to the membership at the January 28, 2023 Annual Meeting.

The Directors unanimously approved the amended Policy and Procedures: Budgets and Accounting first adopted 10/14/2020. The primary revision impacts the accounting for restricted funds.

Read Hall Kitchen: The Directors voted three to two to approve the purchase and installation of a residential electric kitchen stove for Read Hall to be used as a warming oven for events exclusive to residents of Dreamland Villa. Patti and Joyce voted no, voicing concerns that non-members might be served food cooked on the stove creating a violation of Maricopa County requirements.

NEW BUSINESS:

Board Meetings: The Directors unanimously approved holding three 2023 Board of Directors meetings at Read Hall at 9:30 on Saturdays, January 14, 2023, February 11, 2023 and April 8, 2023 instead of on the second Tuesday of those months. All 2023 study sessions shall remain on the first Tuesday of each month.

Town Hall Meetings: The Directors unanimously approved convening two Town Hall meetings to be held in Read Hall, the first meeting 6:30 pm, Wednesday, January 18, 2023 and the second meeting 9:00 am, Saturday, February 18, 2023.

Audit Committee: With the Directors' advice and consent, Steve appointed Steve Vandez as audit committee chair and Joe Guzdziol and Marty Geiger as audit committee members.

2023 Operating and Capital Expenditure Budgets: The Directors unanimously approved the 2023 Operating and Capital Expenditure Budgets distributed at the December 6, 2022 study session. Both budgets shall be posted on the DVRC website and shall be updated as warranted.



FOOTNOTES

The traditional November 30, 2022 and year-to-date Profit and Loss Statement and detailed Balance Sheet may be found on the Dreamland Villa Retirement Community website: DreamlandVilla.org, Digital Library, Financial Reports. The font size is too small to read when five pages of financial statements are printed in the *Citizen*.

- 1. Undocumented Disbursements: The Footnotes to the July 2022 financial statements identified a number of undocumented disbursements. At that time, those disbursements were recorded in a new balance sheet account, number 12080, with the anticipation that those costs might be recovered from the directors who were recalled or the paid office employee. It is now clear that during 2022, there shall be no recovery of the undocumented disbursements. Therefore, the undocumented disbursements identified through July 16, 2022 were transferred from the balance sheet to a new account, 5300.96, in the November 2022 Profit and Loss Statement.
- 2. Restricted Funds 2023, number 2409, is a new account shown on the November 2022 balance sheet. Eleven new categories of special donations were received in November 2022. Rather than create 11 new accounts on the balance sheet to record these donations individually, these donations were recorded in this new control account. A separate EXCEL file shows the detailed accounting for these 11 donations
- 3. A new Schedule showing the 2022 Fixed Asset Changes has also been incorporated into the monthly financial statement.



Posse Corner

Recent posts on social media i.e., Nextdoor and the Dreamland Villa website on Facebook question what the Posse does and how we support the law enforcement groups (LEO's). For this edition, I thought I'd explain things in a "tier" format.

Tier 1- The residents- That's you folks who protect your homes with security systems or are vigilant in securing your homes as best you can by locking doors and gates, closing window shades, and keeping watch for unusual activities around your home. Your reports to emergency services (9-1-1) are

often the first indication trouble is brewing in the neighborhood. You are the eyes and ears of Dreamland Villa. Thank you!

Tier 2- Watch groups- You may be partners with another as you walk through the neighborhood perhaps checking on homebound residents or simply stopping by and alerting a friend of an open garage door or garden gate. If there is a neighborhood watch group perhaps you gather with others to hold meetings with LEO's to find better ways to safeguard your surroundings. Thank you also!

Tier 3- DVRC Posse- We patrol the streets and check homes while the residents are on vacation. Part of our patrol area is the Nature Trail (the SRP right of way), and both Farnsworth and Read pool complexes. When called upon, we assist the LEO's in searching for lost or missing persons, traffic control around accidents, and sharing recent criminal activity. The Posse does not carry weapons, but we have safety gear as needed to reroute traffic. The Posse owns the vehicles and all the gear. We can and will alert you when we believe you are driving too fast or endangering our residents with erratic driving. We've had to escort people off DVRC property when they've set up camping tents in unauthorized places. Hint: there are NO authorized camping spots in

Tier 4- Local law enforcement-Sheriffs (MCSO) and Mesa Police (MPD) are the crime stoppers and have detainment and arrest authority which the Posse does not. LEO's are also armed and authorized to use lethal force when human lives are in peril. They have patrol vehicles stocked with emergency and apprehension gear to stop illegal activity. Thank them if you get a chance.

Tier 5 and above include Federal, State, and County enforcement groups, State Troopers, FBI, ATF, etc. but let's not call in the National Guard yet. Believe me, if conditions warrant the use of these agencies the Posse will support them as well. Our job is to show a strong presence and protect Dreamland Villa to the best of our ability and resources. Our goal as a security unit is to protect you and your loved ones whenever trouble is near.

Tip of the Month-

Use caution when placing trash bins, free things, or parking on sidewalks around your home. Yard cuttings, trees, or other plantings should be picked up as soon as possible. People using mobility equipment need to have a clear path to avoid riding in the street. Don't leave valuables in parked cars or unattended when you finish for the night. Thieves will take advantage of situations and claim your stuff if given the chance.




