### Non-Resident DVRC Membership, A Little History

Since November 8, 2011, when Dreamland Villa had more than 3,000 members, the By Laws allowed non-voting social memberships to be offered to persons not residing in Dreamland Villa.

By December 8, 2015 the By Laws arbitrarily allowed the residents of some apartments not located in Dreamland Villa to have non-voting social memberships. However,

non-voting social membership privileges were not extended to residents of single-family homes located outside of Dreamland Villa or other apartments located in the proximity of Dreamland Villa.

The current By Laws allow the non-DVRC resident memberships to have the same rights and privileges as resident members

A Dreamland Villa resident resides on a lot in one of the Dreamland Villa's 18 sec-

tions. The term "Associate Membership" is meant to apply to non-DVRC residents, as did the previously used term "non-voting social membership". More equitable, logical, and consistent methods are being discussed as to the criteria of and who may be non-resident members.

By Law changes were made by the Board of Directors, without membership approval, until January 16, 2016. After that date only the membership approved By Law changes.

### President's Message

In past articles, I have spoken about increasing membership revenue by increasing the annual fee and the addition of a new membership class of associate members that live outside the confines of Dreamland Villa 18 sections. In this article, I will be presenting you with another option to bring revenue into the Dreamland Villa Retirement Community treasury.

Dreamland Villa has assets that can provide for the care and maintenance of Dreamland Villa. These are physical assets such as the property that is part of the Farnsworth Hall footprint, the south parking lot that lies between 6116 and 6132 Butte Street as illustrated by the diagram below. Potentially we believe that this piece of property could bring in excess of \$100,000 from its sale before the corporate taxes are paid.


The Board is currently in the process of separating this piece of the Farnsworth property from the current plat. The process to achieve this plating requires that we provide an official survey for the County of the lot area and obtain approval from the County Board of Supervisors for new plats for the separated property and Farnsworth. Many questions still need to be addressed to achieve this outcome, but we are working on each of them.

My objective is to have this property designated as residential and present it to the marketplace for the construction of a new home in our community. This of course requires the approval of the DVRC membership to sell the property. The revenue generated from the sale of this property will help in providing for the future expenses of Dreamland Villa in finding ways to generate new revenue sources either from additional memberships or rental of Farnsworth and Read Hall.

Those who use and love our Nature Walk may already know there is a noxious weed that is intrusive on the Walk called the Stinknet, a weed that is very invasive. To begin to eradicate this weed will require spraying a herbicide at least twice a year to control its invasion. This is a costly investment estimated to be approximately \$9,000 to have a commercial company spray the entire trail.

Many members of our community contribute to the Nature Walk specifically through donations and we certainly appreciate this effort, and these funds will be used to assist in payment to eliminate this weed. Anyone who would like to provide additional funding to assist in this effort please feel free to donate by sending your check, cash, or providing a credit card to the office for your donation. Anything large or small will be deeply appreciated. Donations made to the Nature Walk can only be used to maintain the trail and will not be used for any other DVRC function.

So, for those of you who live in Dreamland Villa but are not members and care about the Nature Walk, I ask for your donations as well. Anyone who would be interested in assisting in maintaining the trail please leave a message at the office for Mel Brown of your willingness to volunteer.

If you are doing yard clean up the waste should not be thrown on any part of the trail, so please properly dispose of all yard waste. Enjoy the nature trail and let's keep it a nice place to walk and enjoy the beauty of the desert.

The August 2 fire at a salvage yard in West Phoenix points out the need to control dry brush and weeds on your property. Initial investigation leans toward the spreading of fire through the grass to structures on the adjacent property.

During patrols, the Posse has noted similar hazardous conditions in the utility zones/alleys West of 54th Street, North of Albany/ Boise streets. Tinder, dry grass, and brush in these areas raise the potential for destructive structure fires!

For these reasons, the Posse has suspended patrols in the alleys until the brush is removed to the fence lines of the properties affected. We will survey the conditions from the end of the alleys but will no longer risk a hot exhaust or vehicle spark igniting a potential disaster for these homes. Patrolling on the paved streets of Dreamland Villa will continue as usual.


